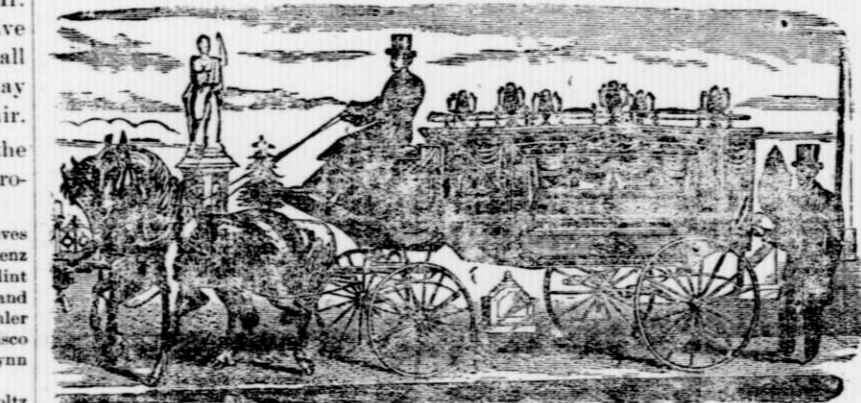

The entertainment concluded at 11 o'clock when the room was cleared and dancing indulged in till early Thursday morning.

Daily Life in Germany.

The following is an extract from a private letter from an American lady sojourning in Dresden, Saxony, to her brother in Syracuse, N. Y.:

Germany is a country burdened with taxation and the support of an enormous army. Men, women, children and animals have the very utmost exacted of them. All work hard; all are scantily warmed and fed. It seems to me that the poor do almost as well by their animals as by themselves. I notice that when a horse stands out without a blanket, it is because the man is too poor to have clothes enough for himself, and often the man's coat is put over his dumb fellow worker. I have great sympathy for the working classes here. Our stylish "butler" gets \$5 a month (20 marks, that is less than \$5) and the maid servants \$2.50 to \$3 a month, and all are taxed twice a year. Few of the working classes have meat to eat oftener than once or twice a month and then the cheapest. Economy is carried to a point never dreamed of by us, and this is favored by the currency. Pennings are the great staple of currency and it takes 100 of them to make 25 cents of our money. The working class feel that from two to five pennings is quite an expenditure and forthrightly. The shops are filled with articles of corresponding value, and it is simply marvelous what a few pennings will buy. Never did I see a nation of such willing workers, nor a people who could live upon so very little.—Christian Advocate.

The Village Election.

The entire village ticket, as published last week, was elected last Tuesday without any opposition to speak of except for marshal, the vote upon which was as follows: David Casey, 56; Fred. Andrae, 22; Chas. Schaefer, 10. The vote for judge of the Thirteenth judicial district was as follows: Warham Parks, 12; James J. Dick, 41; Thomas C. Martin, 8. The vote for Ronjet Marshall (who had no opposition) for Justice of the Supreme court was 28. The lack of opposition, together with the fact that many were in doubt as to their right to vote in both the village and the town, accounts for the small total of 91 votes polled.
