BOY'S TERRIBLE DEED.

Infatuation for a Woman Led to Attempted Murder and Sulcide at Elgin.

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 3 .- Mrs. Annie Schrieber, 28 years old, and her 14-yearold nephew, Bruno Meilke, who disappeared yesterday, were found on the streets of Elgin, Ill., this morning. The boy was dead, having been shot through the head and heart, while the woman had bullet wounds in the eye and breast. The affair is the culmination of an in-

fatuation between the two which has asted for months. A letter written by Mrs. Schrieber, in which she threatened to shoot him if he dared to smile on another woman, was found in the boy's pocket by his father a day or two ago. Trouble ensued and yesterday the two disappeared. Written in pencil on the kitchen table at the Schrieber home was a message in the woman's handwriting stating that they

would not be seen alive again. At the hospital the woman revived and made a statement. She said Meilke shot her and himself. She disclaimed any guilty relations with one another, but other. She blamed her sister, Meilke's mother, for the trouble causing the trag-

edy. Another wound was found on Meilke, the bullet having probably en-

A ROMANCE OF CRIME.

After a Lapse of Quarter of a Century a Portage Crime is to be Avenged.

Portage, Wis., Oct. 30 .- It is understood that Perry Richardson, the man who was arrested at Elroy on a charge of having committed a murder at this place half a century ago, is to be brought ting in his home on Franklin street, to here for examination as soon as the legal formalities can be attended to. News of Richardson's arrest, based as it is said to have been on the alleged murderer's having given his right name (after having lived twenty-five years or more un-der an assumed one) in order to get a pension, was a surprise to the people of this city, for the crime had almost passed out of the recollection of the oldest in habitant.

In the absence of legal documents it is impossible to say with certainty which of a couple of crimes Richardson stands accused, the prisoner still being detained at Mauston, but there is no doubt in the minds of the authorities here that the Gates murder is the basis for the arrest.

Story of the Crime.

Story of the Crime. On September 13, 1869, Schuyler S. Gates, an old man who had resided near Kilbourn, was murdered, supposedly by two men, Hugh Smith and Perry Rich-ards. Both men fled and were never ap-prehended. Gates had been robbed a short time before by the notorious Pat Wildrick gang of about \$2000 after hav-ing been bratally beaten and left for dead.

Gates and his wife were moving to Muscoda, and his while were moving to Muscoda, and as it was a down-river trip they had their household effects on two boats, which were lashed together. Wildrick and his accomplices followed the boats down the river to the place of their first might's tions, where they their first night's tie-up, where they robbed Gates and outraged his wife... Wildrick was arrested and held in \$5000 bail by Judge Stewart. A change of venue was afterward taken and the de-fendant was released on \$2000 bond.

fendant was released on \$2000 bond. After his release Wildrick came to Portage, where he was detected in the act of committing a highway robbery. He was arrested and sent to jail. Dur-ing Wildrick's preliminary trial for this offense Gates, his former victim, was murdered at Kilbourn. He was an im-portant witness against Wildrick at his coming trial in the circuit court and it was believed he was murdered by Wild-rick's gang. Smith and Richardson left the country. the country.

Two days later a mob of masked men came to Portage and overpowered Sher-iff Sorrenson and Deputy Sheriff Koer-ner, took Wildrick from the jail and hanged him to a tree near by. So quiet-ly was the deed performed that those residing in the neighborhood were not aware of the action of the mob until notified by the sheriff after it was all over. No arrests were made for the lynching, as none of the mob were known to the officers.

TOBACCO KILLS CHOLERA.

Germs of This Disease Can't Live Five Minutes in Smoker's Mouth.

Defenders of tobacco smoking fail to make use of the most powerful arguments in its favor. Hitherto the most that has been claimed in favor of smoking was a certain subtle, beneficial effect on the digestion and a soothing effect on the nerves. It has been learned recently, from the

report of investigations of the effects of eco during the epidemic of cholera at Hamburg, that cholera microbes could not exist in the mouths of smokers. There were no living bacteria after twenty-four hours in cigars made up with water containing 1,500,000 cholera

germs to the cubic inch. There were no traces of microbes to be found in any of the cigars manufactured at Hamburg in the time of the epide ic. The microbes die in a half to two .ours' exposure to smoke of Brazil, Suu.atra or Havana acco. The smoke of any cigar kills microbes. Experiments show that tobacco. in five minutes after beginning to smoke the microbes in the mouth are killed. Another fact established is that none of the persons employed in the tobacco facat Hamburg contracted cholera.-New York Press.




