D. C. CREGIER DEAD.
Former Mayor of Chicago Who Took
Prominent Part in World's
Fair Matters.
Chicago, Ill., Nov. 10.—After an illness
extending over two years, Dewitt C. Cregier,
formerly mayor of Chicago, died last night
at 7 o'clock at the family residence,
415 E. Chicago street. The cause of his death
was kidney trouble with
dilatation complications.
Dewitt Clinton Cregier was born in
New York city June 1, 1829. He was the
son of a prominent lawyer. Cregier,
his mother being the daughter of a
well-known French shipmaster who
died after several years' residence with
the merchant marine of New York.
Mr. Cregier came to Chicago in 1853 to
superintend the erection of the first
pumping machinery for the Chicago wa-
terworks. For twenty-five years he was
chief and designing engineer of the water-

HOUSE AND SENATE.
Chicago, Ill., Nov. 10.—Dispatches to
the Associated press up to 11:35 a. m.
from 347 out of 557 congressional distri-
cts show that the Republicans have
elected 184, and the Democrats and
Fusionists 164. There are still ten doubtful
districts.
Washington, D. C., Nov. 10.—Chairman
Belmont of the Republican Congressional
committee, believes this morning that the
Republican majority in the next house
will be 220.
He figured on only ten last night, but
is now convinced that the manifest drift
in the West and North is toward the
Republican party.
Mr. Belmont says that the gains in the
West are due to the desire of the people
to reform administration, and to ex-
press their satisfaction over the return
of prosperity.
The Republicans carried five districts
west of the Missouri which they hardly
hoped for, but they were offset by the
loss of three in the Missouri, one in
Massachusetts and one in Massachusetts
Mr. Belmont's original calculations as the
result of the election were 220 to 190.
At Democratic congressional head-
quarters, he had no new figures this morning.
The committee chairmen are all
claiming that the returns from many dis-
tricts are not yet received, but are deter-
mining the vote for the West and North
which were charged to the Republican
management by the Democratic manag-
ers.
