



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

#### MOLASSES IN SAILING SHIPS. Arrangments for Getting Rid of Lov

Grade Louisiana Product. Arrangements are now being made to utilize the entire production of low-grade Louisiana molasses which has hitherto been a waste product and has been dumped into the Mississippi, Bayou Lafourche and other streams in order to get rid of it. This molasses is of so low a grade and of so little value that it will a grade and of so little value that it will not bear transportation, but a few years ago English and French distillers discovered that it could be used to advantage in the manufacture of rum and other liquors. Last year an English firm took no less than 50,000 barrels of Louisiana molasses, and it did so well that it was expected to increase the exports this year. The Boer war interfered with the business season and will cause its rearrangement on entirely new grounds.

Low-grade Louisiana molasses has to be carried at the very lowest rates, and the Boer war has taken so many vessels from the Atlantic trade to be used in the transportation of men and provisions to

transportation of men and provisions to South Africa that rates have gone up. In view of this fact, the British dis-In view of this fact, the British distillers have sent representatives to New Orleans to see if some arrangement cannot be made whereby the molasses will receive low freight rates. The plan that will be pursued will be to utilize sailing vessels in the trade, as time is no object in the shipments. A line of sailing vessels will, therefore, be put on between New Orleans and London especially for the transportation of molasses, and it is believed that not only will the poor grade be worked off, but the good grades, which rank far above the molasses produced in any other country, will be induced in any other country, will be in-troduced to Europe.

We have got very mfortably situated, with considerable reparation for a crop, and all hopeful. think this is a very fine country, and the past season's crop is not an exotion, which they claim not, I believe is is going to be the wheat field of West. It is filling up fast. In this waship last spring there were tweny-five quarter sections of land vacant, ad to-day there is not one: I can stand my house and count ten houses ere there was not one last spring, ith six more to go up this spring. This is only a sample of what is going all round. We intend to build a irch next summer, right close to my ce, so we will be strictly in line. It uld have amused you to have been e last spring. There were crowds of and seekers, and sometimes in the spring the prairie is not very inviting, and of course lots were discontented. There was one in the crowd who jumped on me for putting a letter in the paper, only for which he never would ave come here, and he was very hosile, but eventually he got a place and o-day claims he would not take a thou-

sand dollars and move out; so I am glad he is satisfied. 


