



Deer may be killed in all but thirty-eight of the seventy-one counties of the state. The last legislature added the county of Door to the list in which deer may be taken. In Milwaukee county the hunting of deer is prohibited, but it is not likely that there are any wild deer in that county. In Dane county, however, which comes under the ban, there are wild deer, especially in the western part of the county.
