Roll the Ratio of Taxes will be Lower This Year

S700 FOR ROAD WORK

Valuation of Property is Higher This Year. Village Fathers Decide to Raise \$700 for Village Taxes Which will be Used in Maintaining the Streets of This Village

According to the assessment roll which has just been completed. The rate of taxes is lower than last year, and the valuation 'of property higher. Valuation the property in the year 1910 mounted to \$692,383,00 and assessed at the rate of 79 mills, while this year it is \$710,898.50 and as-

To be Cleared up Soon The confusion existing as to the proper designation of hog diseases is to be cleared up in Chicago this week at the annual meeting of the Live Stock Sanitary Association, when the committee appointed last March to devise a proper nomenclature, makes its report. Dr. M. P. Ravenel, head of the department of bacteriology at the University is one of the three members of the committee.

The confusion in nameing bog diseases has resulted from the lact that the term hog cholera has been applied to two distinct diseases one caused by a germ and the other by a poison, or virus, which cannot be detected even with the most powerful microscope. D. RESIGNS M'NAMARAS GET PRISON SENTENCE

Life Term for James; 15 Years

Escape From Death Penalty Not Due to Any Extenuating Circumstances -Grand Jury Will Ask Bro-

Los Angeles, Cal.-James B. Mc-Namara was sentenced to life imprisonment for dynamiting the Los Angeles Times plant and causing 21 deaths.

His brother, John J. McNamara, secretary-treasurer of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, was sentenced to 15 years in the state penitentiary for dynamiting the Llewellyn iron plant. Judge Bordwell, in pronouncing sentence on the younger brother, said he extenuating circumstances, but that

A few hours after they were sentenced the word went forth that subpoenas would be issued for both men to appear before the federal grand Standard Oil Company of New Jersey jury to divulge further details of their dynamiting conspiracies.

The government of the United States, in its desire to secure a proper observance and enforcement of the so-called neutrality statutes of the federal government, issued directions to the appropriate officers to exercise a diligent and vigilant regard for the requirements of such rules and laws. Although a condition of actual armed conflict existed, there was no official recognition of belligerency involving the technical neutrality obligations of international law.
