

ways be different from the original," declared Senator Husting, "but the people may rest assured that it will safeguard their every

right and interest." While the court held that the state had no right to charge a license or franchise fee for water-

power rights it did rule that it power rights it did rule that it has the power to say whether or not dams may be built. Under the new law, if passed, the grant-ing of rights to erect dams will be one of the questions that will be included, it being the purpose of the framers of the measure to prevent the indiscriminate erecion of dams without care thought to the safety of life and
