"The committee returned from the Pittsburgh district strongly in favor of some Americanization bill. I have thought for a long while that congress must do what it could to help stimulate Americanism. That is a common ground upon which we all can stand and is a rallying point for all. When you find that in some of these mills over 50 per cent of the workmen can not read, write or speak the American language; when it is necessary in these mill districts to publish orders in all kinds of languages, it is time for the American people, represented by the American congress, to give consideration to some plan of affording these foreign citizens an opportunity to learn what the institutious of America stand for and to become Americanized.

Good Material to Work On. "We saw young fellows who only had a smattering of our tongue, who impressed us as splendid material out

of which to make American citizens. "Two bills are now pending before the committee of which I have th honor to be chairman, dealing with this question. The committee meets this week to take them up, and I earnestly hope that one or both of them may be reported out of the committee and may be passed by congress before adjournment.

"Eight and a half million people in this country over ten years of age cannot speak, read or write the American language. To the correction of that condition every citizen should resolve to do his part."







PIE, THE POPULAR DESSERT.

In spite of the fact that ples and pastry have been condemned as indigestible, the sentence has never

been passed upon them, for they still hold forth on all bills of fare. Plain Custard Pic. — Line a pie

tin with a good, rich crust, having the rim stand up above the plate. Fill with a custard mixture, using two beaten eggs, onethird of a cupful of sugar, a pinch of salt and two cupfuls of milk. Finish with a grating of nutmeg and bake at first in a hot oven to set and brown the pastry, then lower the heat to cook the custard. An orange filling may be made by using the juice of an orange with the grated rind, adding milk enough to make the two cupfuls of liquid and proceed as in custard ple. A meringue on a ple always adds to its appearance as well as making it more nourishing.

Lemon and Apple Pie.-Add a cupful of sugar to half a cupful of chopped apple, one beaten egg, one-fourth of a cupful of rolled crackers, two tablespoonfuls of lemon juice, the grated rind of a lemon and one tablespoonful of butter. Bake with two crusts.

Date Custard Pie.-Cook a third of pound of dates, washed and stoned. with two cupfuls of milk in a double boiler. Rub through a sieve, add two beaten eggs, salt and sugar if needed. with a few gratings of nutmeg. Bake and cover with a meringue in which four or five marshmallows are placed.

Prune Pie.-Soak three-fourths of a pound of prunes in cold water, stew until tender, cool and stone. Arrange them in a lined pie plate, add half a cupful of sugar, two tablespoonfuls of butter and the juice of half a lemon. salt, two tablespoonfuls of flour and the juice from the prunes. Bake, cover with a meringue and brown.

Rhubarb and raisins make a good combination for a ple filling. Use a half a cupful of raisins to two cupfuls of rhubarb, sugar, salt and flavoring with two tablespoonfuls of flour to thicken the juice to keep the pie from boiling over. Cover with a crust and bake in a slow oven.

WAR RECORD OF LEVIATHAN

Monster Transport Carried Many Thousands of Soldiers to French Ports.

The giant transport Leviathan, following her arrival in New York harbor with Gen. Pershing and troops of the First division, brought to a close her important service in helping win the war. The big ship, after being refitted for passenger service, is to be turned back to the United States shipping board, the agency which seized it when the United States entered the the heaten whites of the eggs; stand war. While the future of the ship is uncertain, it is reported that she will be assigned to American passenger trade between New York and

the future of a service to Hamburg. The Levinthan, formerly the Vaterland, the second largest ship in the world, was interned in New York by the Germans in 1914. She was "wilfully damaged" to the extent of more than \$1,000,000. After being reconditioned by American engineers, she was assigned as a transport, aud durrag and since the war made 19 round trips on the Atlantic, carrying a total of 185,500 soldiers, of whom 98 321 were carried overseas through submarine infested seas. She was always a mark for U-boats, but her speed and the armament with which she was equipped saved her.





#### DODGE COUNTY CATTLE WORTH SIX MILLION

Assessor of Incomes, A. H. Busse witz, Dodge county, Wis., has furnished some interesting figures regarding the number of head of cattle in the county.

assessment made this year as of May 1st, shows that there were about 83,-000 head of cattle in the county at that time over four months old. Out of this number about 56,000 are cows and about 27,000 are tour months and under and bulls. The value of the 83, 000 head of cattle is placed at a con servative estimate, \$6,725,000.

Automobiles assessed in Dodge county as of May 1st, were 5,405, and it is a safe estimate to say that since that date not less than 600 have been sold to persons in the county, which will bring the total of automobiles at this time to 6,000 owned in the county or one automobile to every 8 persons living in Dodge county.

On an average each automobile is probably worth at least \$1,000 which gives a total of \$6,000,000 that is invested in automobiles in the county .-Dodge County Banner.


