



could stand to affect the moral stature of this and succeeding generations of Americans, the U.S. supreme court declared unconstitutional the use of public school systems to help any religious group spread its faith.

Religion and government, the de-cision said, "can best work to achieve their lofty aims if each is left free from the other within its respective sphere.'

The ruling upheld a protest by selfprofessed atheist mother, Mrs. Vashti McCollum, that a system of religious teaching in Champaign, Ill., schools breaks down the wall between church and state.

Delivering the main opinion, Justice Black held that under the facts shown the compulsory education system in Illinois "assists and is integrated with the program of religious instruction carried on by separate religious sects." He said pupils legally required to go to school for secular education are released from some of that legal duty on condition that they attend religious

"This is beyond all question a utilization of the tax-established and taxsupported public school system to aid religious groups to spread their faith." It was an issue that parents as well as all other U. S. citizens would do

well to consider. There were two facets which would

bear reflection: The supreme court's decision confirmed a long-standing and honorable theory in the U. S. that there should be no interference between church and state and no influence exerted by one on the other. The ruling would seem to safeguard the nation against the two extremes of a state-controlled church or a church-controlled state.

But at the same time, the broad language of the decision failed to recognize the historical importance of religion in creating civilizations and forming and molding nations. Western civilization grew out of the Christian church. Divorcement of the cause and effect now could be dangerous.

Economical Buying Cuts Costs for Homemakers

WASHINGTON-According to a recent poll, the topic in which the people are most interested today is the high cost of living. This despite competition with communism, Taft, Dewey, the weather, and why who jumped out of a hotel window clad only in a filmy night-

I managed to get myself into the middle of a controversy on that

It all started when the wife of a machinist in York, Pa., wrote me of her difficulties in making ends meet on her husband's net salary of \$53.40 a week (incidentally, bureau of labor statistics informs me that 50 per cent of the workers employed in manufacturing industry earn less than this York ma-

Her family includes a boy of 15 and a girl of 6. She outlined her weekly

budget as follows:

own home)	.36

She pointed out that this total left very little for clothing, dentist and doctor bills, and nothing for the new stove, washer, vacuum cleaner, refrigerator and furniture they would like to have. And "Don't forget," she admonished, "There are a lot of people worse off than we are."

I used her story in a broadcast, and this is the reaction I recevied from other women correspondents:

An Oakland, Calif., housewife wrote: "When you mentioned that family who spent almost three-quarters of his salary for food, I just had to "sound off" or bust. Either this is an exaggeraation by the wife or she is guilty of woeful ignorance of proper dietary requirements. In these days of shortages, I'd like to ship folks like these over to England where we have relatives, who could (perhaps!) 'larn 'er' a thing or two about the wanton selfishness of such extravagance."

This woman goes on: "My husband and I manage nicely on \$10 a week for two. I enclose details to prove it. (She did)." And she adds: "I can remember no evening in years when my husband failed to compliment me on his dinner.

She suggests that women who can't cook should attend classes to discover that the "chemistry" of food preparation can be "fascinating and, oh, so rewarding." She herself gained knowledge in public school night cooking classes that enabled her to run a small tearoom in the lean years from 1930 to 1935, and which from 1941 to 1945, helped her to save 40 per cent of her husband's salary.

Another woman writes concerning a Dearborn, Mich., homemaker who fed "and fed well" her family of six on \$75 a month last September. Now, since food prices went down, this woman planned to revise her budget downward. She spent \$71.82 for food in November, \$58.85 in December and \$55.35 in January of this year.

As a sample of her meal planning: On a Saturday noon, (she writes) she may feed her three girls, aged 11, 4 and 2 years, egg sandwiches on bread spread with oleo (mixed with canned milk), a whopping big fruit salad made from pears, plums and peaches she canned last summer, and big glasses of milk. A supper menu might be macaroni and cheese, a vegetable salad, home-made chocolate cookies and fruit

A woman from Detroit, Mich., whose family is the same size as that of the York woman's, writes that is costs her only \$20 a week to feed her family. And that, she says: "Includes a carton of cigarets for my husband, all my soap supplies, polishes, cleansers and additions to my pantry shelf. We average one pound of butter a week, two dozen eggs, 10 to 14 quarts of milk, steaks and chops once a week. My husband takes his lunch-two or three sandwiches, one or two pieces of fruit, lettuce, sometimes another raw trols applied to ME though are ruinous, vegetable, cakes and cookies. At least we're all in good health and rarely have colds. It can be done easily if you apply yourself and figure ahead.

And this is accomplished, mind you, in Detriot, where according to labor statistics, is cost upwards of \$3,293 a year for a family of four to live modestly.

Wife Achieves Near Miracle

Even more impressive is the foodbudgeting record of a homemaker here in Washington, D. C., where, says BLS it costs more to live than it does in 33 other major cities of the country. This woman, wife of a navy captain,

has a family of seven to feed-herself, her husband, her mother and father, and three strapping boys aged 18, 16 and 13. Also two cats who are fed frozen horsemeat. She spends between \$21.80 and \$31 a week, and with prices lower, expects her costs to go down. My first thought was that probably suppose.

she shopped at a navy commissary, but she does not. She saves money by buying apples by the bushel, oranges by the crate, flour by the 100 pounds and cheese by the five-pound brick. She also "puts up" fruit, jams, jellies and

My assistant is prone to scoff whenever I receive one of the I-can't-manage-on-what-my-husband-makes letters. She's been keeping track of monthly food bills for herself and her husband since September of last year. She spent \$31.28 in the month of September; \$31.54 in October, \$37.56 in November; \$53.36 in December (she had a dinner party for 14 people, and another Christmas day dinner with turkey, et cetera for 7 people, and that upped the bills); \$45.39 in January, and \$29.69 in February. She says the February food bill dropped significantly because they took advantage of the price dip and bought cheaper butter, eggs, flour, et cetera.

Her food bills do not include their twice-a-month "eating out" which costs

She explains that her monthly food costs are low because: (1) They buy milk at stores instead of having it delivered; (2) don't eat much butter; (3) her husband doesn't demand meat at every meal. so they have dinner dishes like souffles, baked beans, hearty soups, baked eggs; (4) they shop once a week, going perhaps to five or six different stores to take advantage of special sales items (of course persons without a car couldn't do this); (5) she uses canned milk for coffee, and to make puddings and cream sauces; and (6) she says she never wastes ANYTHING. (I can

believe that!) With such a variety of figures to choose from, there isn't much basis for getting into a stew about budgets. What it seems to boil down to is that the bill-of-fare is a fair subject for argument, but doesn't leave a man too much to get his teeth into. A good deal seems to depend on

I JOINED the crowd gathered on the the lake above the dam. "Who are they searching for this

time?" I asked as I pushed closer to the rail.

"Young Doc Warren," several answered at once.

I had never seen young William Warren, but I knew about him-the whole town knew about him. He had joined the army with our National Guard. The boys were still singing his praises. His wife had told the officers that he had left home early, before she and the children were up. He had come home late after an emergency operation, seemed unable to relax, and had spent a restless night. She had awakened while he was dressing and asked if he had a call. He explained that he was just going out to clear the cobwebs from his mind. He had kissed her goodby. She had thought no more about it until the police called.

I moved back to the rail to watch the boats as they trolled slowly toward us, the grappling hooks searching the lake bottom in the lane between them. Foster died in 1863.



Gay Easter Menu Heralds Approach Of Spring Season



A table setting perfectly expressive of Easter and all the tradition that goes with it can easily be done the day before. The bowl or basket in which you place the eggs may be decorated with shredded crepe paper in pastel colors.

Easter really heralds spring and we like to make the day as gay and lovely as possible. That means bringing out your delicate china, pastel china, and sweeping the menu with a touch of spring, both in choice of foods and colors.

Many people like ham for Easter and it's a real economy to have it because you can make so many in-

teresting leftovers, have sliced ham for snacks and sandwiches, and still have a lovely meat for the table the first time you serve it.

Start off with chilled orange juice but add excitement to it by placing a small scoop of raspberry (or mint or lime) sherbet on top. The dessert I've chosen is light but pretty and is balanced for the menu.

Your centerpiece can be made of traditional Easter eggs nestling in a basket or bowl. You'll find a package of inexpensive dyes with a handy egg dipper, a special pencil and decals of popular comic characters to help you decorate more successfully.

If you use the decorated eggs for place cards, set it on stiff paper. Of course many people like to spend Easter evening eating the eggs with salt and bread and butter sandwiches, but if you have any left,

use them for egg salad, creamed eggs or eggs a la king. The ham is easy to prepare and always popular. For small groups, buy half a ham, but decorate it, too.

Here's how to prepare the other

Place ham fat side up in an open roasting pan. Do not cover and do not add water. Bake in a moderately slow (325 degree) oven allowing 22 to 25 minutes per pound for cooking a before-eating ham.

How to Glaze.

Half an hour before the ham is done, cover with glaze and finish baking at the same low temperature. If ham is to be scored, do it at this time. Brush ham with 1/2 cup of honey, molasses or apricot jam. Baste frequently during rest of cook-

If you do not want to garnish the ham, simply fill peach halves with bright colored jelly and place around ham before serving.

Escalloped Broccoli.

2 pounds broccoli 11/2 cups thin cream sauce 1/2 cup grated American cheese

Cook broccoli in boiling, salted wa-

ter for 15 minutes. Place layers of broccoli and cream sauce with a little cheese in casserole until all s used. Sprinkle cheese on top and heat through in moderate oven (about 15 min-

utes). If you are particularly fond of asparagus, serve that in place of the broccoli. It's excellent just buttered; or, if you wish a sauce, here's a good way to do it.

Farm Mechanization Boosts

Production to Record Level OMAHA, NEB. - Americans are arvesting 20 million more acres today than they did in 1940, although there are three million fewer people doing it, and on 200,000 fewer farms. Fast-growing mechanization of farms is largely responsible for this feat, Joseph A. Hoban, merchandise manager of B. F. Goodrich company, told members of Midwest Implement Dealers association. He cited the fact that the nation's tractor "population" had doubled, from one million to two million, just since

Praising "the way America's farmers and other food producers had come through to ease tragic conditions in many lands," Hoban cited the following estimates on the nation's 1947 exports of foodstuffs: 392 million bushels of wheat, five times the amount exported in 1939; 88 million bushels of corn, compared to 32 million in 1939, and 328 million pounds of meat products. against 193 million in 1939.

The farm market offered "the biggest sales opportunity" for industry in 1947, Hoban said, adding that "there is no question that this market is going forward at as great

or even greater pace in 1948. Hoban said that all tractors now made are rubber-tired, and that changing all a farm's rolling stock from steel to rubber tires produced an average saving of 24 working days and 675 gallons of gasoline per year, for each 150 acres worked.




