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Henry Schultz, Town

Naumann Nominee for Sheriff Over Baehring by 113 Votes

Holtebeck Victor Over Laubenstein; Only 241 Votes Cast in Village

The primary election Tuesday in Washington county was highlighted by the race for sheriff on the Republican ticket. In a close race, Sylvester "Fat' Naumann, Barton, won over Herbert "Fat" Bachring, West Bend, former sheriff, and Ruben C. Wittig, Hartford.

Naumann received 1,808 votes, 113 more than Baehring's 1,695. Wittig polled 1,342. Rufus Justman, who had no opposition on the Democratic tic ket, received 335. The total vote for sheriff was 5,180, of which 4,845 were GOP votes

The village of Barton, his hon town, swept Naumann to victory with almost a unanimous ballot for him. He swamped Bachring, 355 to 18. That village gave Wittig 10 votes and Justman 13. The village of Barton was the last precinct to report. Before the village reported, Bachring led, 1,677 to 1,453 but the Barton total wiped out Backring's lead and decided the race. Naumann also carried the village of Kewaskum by 50 votes. He polled 115 to 65 for Baehring and 31 for Wittig.

In the only other race for count office the incumbent assemblyman Theodore Holtebeck, West Bend, de feated Harold Laubenstein, town of Barton, by the margin of 2,747 to 1, 702. Clinton Laubenheimer, Democratic candidate, polled 338 votes. The total vote for assemblyman was 4,787 The remaining county officers were without opposition. The Democrats had no candidate for district attorney and there was a smattering of writein votes, with Atty. Thomas O'Meara West Bend, getting most of them.

Incumbent Gov. Oscar Rennebohm outdistanced his GOP opponent, Ralph M. Immell, in Washington county, 2 835 to 1,967. These candidates tied in the village of Kewaskum which gave each 105 votes. For governor on the Democratic ticket Carl W. Thompson beat Wm. D. Carroll in this county, 259 to 93.



\$15,000 Fire at Bauer

Henry Schultz, 75, town of Auburn farmer, residing on Route 3, Campbellsport, about three miles north of Kewaskum, was fatally injured at 4:20 p. m. Tuesday when the car he was driving crashed into a truck on Coun. ty Trunk V, three miles north , of this village. Schultz, a bachelor, was the 13th traffic fatality in Fond du Lac county this year.

Two witnesses told Traffic Officer Harry Rozek of the Fond du Lac county police that Schultz was traveling north at a slow rate of speed He approached the town road where he intended to turn off toward his home which is about a half mile west on the town road. Schultz is reported to have made a wide sweep off the highway and drove digectly into the path of the truck which was operated by Robert Dreger, Milwaukee.

Dreger substantiated reports of the witnesses, Myron and Glenway Backhaus, R. 3, Kewaskum, and informed police that the trucker swerved his machine to the far right of the highway in an effort to avoid hitting th second car.

Schult / auto was extensively dam aged. The truck tipped over after ramming the front of the car and landed directly onto the rear of the Schultz machine, Coroner Joseph E Murray of Fond du Lac county said there would be no inquest

Schultz was rushed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in a Fond du Lac county ambulance and given emer gency treatment. They couldn't find a government in France. As a political situation that appeared slightly ludicrous from across the Atlantic, but Frenchmen were becoming sorely worried for fear that they had lost the ability or power to govern themselves.

AFTER PREMIER Andre Marie's cabinet fell, President Vincent Auriol appointed Robert Schuman as premier and gave him the usual instructions to form a cabinet.

Schuman duly gathered together an administrative body and then, 64 hours later, watched it fall apart when he was defeated on a technical proposal to postpone questioning of the new cabinet by the national assembly. In short, he failed to get the necessary vote of confidence.

Desperate by this time, President Auriol then named Henri Queuille, veteran Radical Socialist, to succeed Schuman.

WHAT QUEUILLE could do to produce some kind of order out of political confusion and economic travail no one knew. He is 64 years old, a little known political figure in France and was a wartime assistant of Gen. Charles DeGaulle.

The situation pointed up the alarmed belief, becoming more predominant in France, that no individual or group can command the working majority that will enable him to govern the nation successfully.

QUESTION : I would like to know if I may use varnish on asphalt tile flooring

ANSWER: Varnish is not recommended for asphalt tile, neither is paint or lacquer.

QUESTION: My walnut chair has been painted with gray enamel. I have tried to take off the paint with paint remover, but it doesn't work. Is there any way I can remove this paint?

ANSWER: Give the paint remover time to soften the paint, and don't be in too much of a hurry. Try a paste remover next time, and when the paint softens, use a scraper and steel wool to get the paint off.




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

Lunch Box Magic

WHILE THE YOUNGSTERS struggle with readin', writin' and 'rithmetic, mother frequently has her problems with the lunch boxes which she must fix for the family that totes its own.

The lunch box preparation is a steady grind now that school has started, and it's a wonder that more women don't

go into the doldrums about it more often. You have to supply nourishment plus food appeal to keep the family happy with their meals out of a box, so here are





BE KIND to the budget and make the whole thing as simple as possible by making several jars of filling beforehand so they can be slicked on the sandwiches easily. Here are several ideas tailored to your needs.

Special Sandwich Filling 2 hard-cooked eggs 1 can pimiento 1 small onion 4 stalks celery

Salt and pepper to taste 2 packages cream cheese

Chop eggs and pimiento fine. Put onion and celery through food chopper, then mix all ingredients with cream cheese and season to taste. Let stand 15 to 20 minutes or longer before using. Thin to spreading consistency with mayonnaise.

Beef-Tomato Filling pint hot tomato pulp, strained tablespoons quick tapioca 1/2 pound grated cheese pound dried beef, ground fine teaspoon pepper 14 teaspoon mustard

Add tapioca to hot tomato and cook over low flame for 15 minutes. Add cheese gradually and cook slowly until melted. Remove from heat, add beef and seasonings. Cool and store.

Corned Beef Spread 4 ounces cooked corned beef cup minced sweet pickle 2 tablespoons mayonnaise 1 teaspoon prepared mustard 2 teaspoons minced onion 2 ounces sharp American cheese Salt and pepper"

Toasted sandwiches are always popular and take but little time to make with a regular toaster, grill or skillet.

Hot toast can be spread with any number of fillings kept on tap, and served with pickles, relishes, potato chips, carrot sticks, cole slaw, or munched with fresh fruit.

If you want a more nourishing sandwich, dip it into a french toast mixture and fry in the skillet.

When you want to toast sandwiches in the skillet brush the sandwiches with fat, butter or salad oil, and turn with a pancake turner.

A good toasted sandwich includes slices of American cheese spread with mustard or sprinkled with worcestershire sauce, then toasted in the broiler, grill or skillet.

Cheese also may be covered with bacon and the sandwich toasted open-face in the broiler. For cheese sandwiches toasted with bacon, place a slice or two of tornato in them before serving for extra deliciousness.

Sliced cooked beef roast with chili butter, made by mixing softened butter with chili sauce to taste. Chopped ham mixed with mayonnaise and shredded pineapple, drained. Grated American cheese mixed with grated raw carrots, grated

Remove shells from eggs and cut in half lengthwise. Remove yolks and mash. Mash liver sausage, blend with cream cheese and milk and egg yolks. Add mustard and blend thoroughly. Refill whites and press eggs together.

Here are other sweets for packed lunches: gingerbread topped with lemon powdered sugar frosting; individual upside down cake made in a custard cup and left in the cup, maple sugar candy, popcorn balls, cookies or puddings. Released by WNU Features.

Cream cheese mixed with pineapple or orange marmalade, spread on toast, is good when broiled until bubbly.

Canned or cooked tongue, sliced thin, can be spread with pickle relish and toasted.

Salmon and tuna fish salad mixtures make excellent toasted sandwiches. Season the fish salad with horseradish, mayonnaise and salt. If you don't want young fry or Dad to raid the refrigerator, tack up menus on the pantry shelf, telling what they can use.

Any of the cream cheese or soft cheese fillings are excellent with variety breads such as orange-nut, bran, oatmeal or prune. They can be used sliced thinly or they can be toasted.

Menus for lunch boxes also can be tacked on cupboards so the children can help get lunch ready. Make up menus for the whole week. Fruits are nice for snacks. Have fresh or canned fruit ready in cov-

ered dishes. Baked apples, stuffed with coco-nut after baking, are delightful for snacks or lunch boxes.


