
QUESTION: I was recently given two antique glass cream pitchers, but they have been washed in soap and water so much much that the designs in the glass are filled with a soap crust. I have failed to remove this after repeated trials. Can you give me any help? ANSWER: I believe the deposit is more from hard water than soap, although this has probably stuck to the glass also. If the pitchers are of cut glass of some kind without any painted designs, the crust should soften by soaking with a non-flamable cleaning fluid. giving it plenty of time to act. Kerosene may also help. A stiff brush would be convenient to work with.


