- 1/2 pound butter 1 pound chestnuts, cooked
- and chopped
- 3 quarts toasted bread cubes
- 1¼ teaspoons salt
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1/4 cup chopped onion 2 tablespoons chopped
- parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon poultry season-
- ing 11/2 cups hot water

Melt butter, and add bread cubes salt, celery, onion, parsley, chest-nuts and seasoning. Mix thorough-ly. Add hot water to moisten. When bird is stuffed, estimate the weight of bird by adding 25

per cent to the dressed weight so that total cooking time may be de-termined. Lay, breast side down, in a shallow baking pan, in a V-shaped rack. Bake uncovered at 325° half the estimated baking time, then breast up until the cooking is completed. Brush the skin lightly with unsalted fat,
