#### Organic Matter Vital To Soil Building Plan Legumes and Grasses Are Recommended for Plan

Feed the soil so it can feed the growing crops, if you want to get high yields per acre, advises Dr. J. B. Peterson, Purdue University agronomist.

Dr. Peterson says the best way to tell what your soil needs is to study the land, its management history, its past cropping program and then have the soil tested. The soil tests will tell what fertilizer is



needed and how much is required to keep the soil well stocked with a well-balanced nutrient supply.

But Dr. Peterson points out that tilth and soil structure must be good if the plant food is to do its crop nourishing job. Crops can starve in the midst of plenty and fertilizer can be wasted if the soil's structure is poor.

Poor soil structure shuts off drainage and ventilation. It keeps air and water out. Crop roots can't penetrate the tightly-compacted soil to reach needed nutrients.

Dr. Peterson says the best way to correct soil conpaction and re-pair damaged structure is to add organic matter. This can be done by including well-fertilized legumes and grasses regularly in the rotation and by returning manure and crop residues to the soil. Legumes and grasses do a two-way soil building job. The deep-probing taproots of alfalfa and sweet clover do their soil-mellowing work in the heavy subsoils. Filbrous-rooted grasses such as brome or timothy open up tough surface soils and make them granular and porous.

#### Good Pasture Cuts Milk, **Beef Production Costs**

Since the time when man first began cultivation of the earth, growing grass for pasture and hay has been one of his major projects. Only in recent years, however, have farmers learned the importance of pasture as a way of cutting milk and beef production costs. It is becoming one of the farmers main money crops.

According to department of agriculture reports, about two-thirds of the nation's land is now in grass. And some farm experts believe a 25 per cent increase in the acreage is justified for a more efficient type of agriculture even though greater crop production has been demanded of the nation's farms.

With the nation demanding a greater production of beef, the farmer who has a good grass program will make more profit per acre in the coming year than was anticipated in 1950.

Miss Briggs suggests that now is the time to check first-aid supplies, replace antiseptics and salves that have lost their strength and replenish tape and bandages to take care of the summer accidents.

The widely held notion that basic arts like reading, writing and spelling have been shamefully neglected in this mechanized age is well refuted-so far as penmanship is concerned-by results of the poll. However, the minority of principals who feel handwriting has declined is so sizable and in many cases so emphatic as to leave no doubt that there's still lote of room for improvement.

BEARING OUT this observation was the high school principals verdict that only about two-thirds of their students have a "satisfactory" handwriting by the time they graduate.

Grade school principals voted about two to one that children "learn to write more easily" nowadays. Use of the "manuscript" form of writing-taught in about 95 per cent of the schools in the first two or three grades—was given much of the credit for this, along with more general use of good equipment.

The survey showed that quality of handwriting has an influence upon the marks children get in school. Among grade school principals, 89.9 per cent said "good handwriting helps produce good marks," and among high school heads the count was almost the same, 89.6 per cent.





# A Need Must Be Realized by Everyone Before the Work Is Begun to Meet It

In a certain small American town there was neither a library nor a recreation program. While this, of itself, is not exactly an unusual state of affairs, it was deeply deplored by one wealthy citizen who felt that a great need existed for those services.

Taking action on his own, he donated to the town an attractive building designed to serve as a community center and

a library. He had seen a need and had acted to the best of his ability to correct it. Most laudable. But what, really, did he succeed in doing?

His project went unhonored, unsung – and unused. Ten years later the building still stood idle except for an occasional club meeting. As a library, it contained no books save a few dusty donations from attics, which no one read. A piano was there, but nobody played it.

The various social factions in the community continued to go their own ways, and no "community program" had developed. The community center was but a husk of an ideal. It had no meaning within itself and conveyed none to the local people who had been expected to use it.

Knowledge, as the old maxim would have it, may be power, but it is an aimless power that may be readily dispersed to nothingness unless it is buttressed by feeling and understanding. So with developing community projects.

In this particular community the need for a recreation program might have indeed been there, but the people of the town didn't realize it. A few persons, perhaps, but not the big majority.

"You must let people know (about their community's needs) in such a way as to make them care. Knowledge of needs does not necessarily bring action. There must be enough feeling in the situation to make people want to do something before even the most careful study can bring results." That quote is from the University of Virginia extension division bulletin "So You're Planning a Project," which continues with a contrasting tale of how a public library was established in the small city of Harrisonburg, Va.

"It came into being after the citizens had felt and continuously reiterated the need. 'We need a public library' was expressed in conversations, in club meetings, in essay contests, in letters to the editor. The expression was followed by a mass meeting and the forming of a library association.

"These people began with a desire for books rather than than with a building. Twenty years later they have a fine regional library. One citizen out of every ten in Harrisonburg and the two surrounding counties is an active borrower.

"The process of studying needs, analyzing resources, and letting people know may take more time than you think you have. Yet it will save time in the long run because it sets in motion a continuing process that gains momentum through its own progress.

"Widespread participation in planning is extremely important to community improvement. Belief in the democratic

way of life commits us to this. But from a purely selfish point of view, the initiator of a program needs to seek such participation. Participation in planning is the best insurance of cooperation in carrying out the plans."

In other words, if everybody wants to get in on the act, let him. That way there will be a better chance that the act will be a hit.

"Wise planning also provides for careful consideration of the total community. What at first glance seemed a desirable project, might look quite different when considered in relation to the whole of which it is to be a part.

"The best interests of the total community must never be sacrificed to an immediate selfish objective, such as winning for your group a prize offered for community improvement. The welfare of the community must take precedence over the aggrandizement of any one agency, institution, organization, or individual. The person, club, or agency that honestly believes this stands ready to sacrifice the desire for immediate credit, strong in the faith that it will find a much more abundant life in the better community it has helped to create."

Whatever you do, you need courage. Whatever course you decide upon, there is always someone to tell you you are wrong. There are always difficulties arising which tempt you to believe that your critics are right. To map out a course of action and follow it to an end, requires some of the same courage which a soldier needs. Peace has its victories, but it takes brave men to win them.

# Johnston Urges Strong Price Laws; Price War Confined to Large Cities

BUSINESS AS USUAL-For some time the home towner has been measy over the nation's economical outlook. Headlines in the last few days haven't helped his uneasiness any.

Economic Stabilizer Eric Johnston's charge that the nation is sitting on an "economic time bomb" that may explode into runaway inflation next fall, unless congress keeps a strong program on the law books, caused considerable comment and worry. On top this the beef industry—all the way from farmer to grocer—was in an uproar over his charge that the beef industry is trying to ride roughshod over the American housewife with a cry of "damn the consumer and full pockets ahead."

SWEET MUSIC-And while home towners tried to understand statements from Washington on the economic situation, the average small town they have done, without government resident read of reports from New York, Oklahoma City, and Atlanta of red-hot price cutting wars following the supreme court fair trade decision with a feeling of awe and incredulity. Tens of thousands of gleeful shoppers-men and women-rushed wildly through New York bargain basements in search for nationally advertised goods that had been marked down, some of it as much as 40 per cent. Small electrical appliances, summer-weight suits, cosmetic items, best-selling novels, sheets, pillow cases, nylon hose and girdles were marked down again and again. It was a consumer's paradise.

Home towners then took a quick look at their local newspapers in the hope that Main Street merchants had some new bargains. Most of them, however, were disappointed. The big city price-war had not yet reached

the home town level. And economists reported it was not likely to.

Most retail organizations predicted the New York price-war would level off quickly, with prices from 8 to 15 per cent below the former fixed-

Trade sources, also, pointed out that the price-war was not likely to spread because most home town merchants signed fair trade contracts. On top of this, consumer goods may become tighter as the summer progresses and defense needs begin to eat into present backlogs.

HOW CLOSE TO WAR?-The man on Main Street, who never knows all the facts, received a shock that sent a shiver of fear down his back as the MacArthur hearing continued in Washington. The shock was delivered by Adm. Forrest Sherman who told senators that the U.S. government so feared a world war last December that its field commanders were ordered by the high command to "increase their readiness" and the Medi-

terranean fleet went to sea. Sherman said the orders were issued after MacArthur told the joint chiefs of staff that the U.N. should accept an armistice in Korea "on the best terms available" and the army would have to quit Korea unless the war could be carried against Red China.

Sherman's testimony before the armed services and foreign relations committees again impressed the average American with the fact this nation barely escaped World War III in recent months. Many are wondering how close to war we are today?

PEACE RUMORS CONTINUE—Rumors of peace in Korea continued to circulate in many world capitals although they were denied by high government officials. The move, if any is made, apparently will come from the United Nations side.

Some reports indicate the United States might be willing to halt the fighting at the 38th parallel provided it was a "real" settlement with assurances of no further Red aggression.

Observers in the far east, however, were skeptical that any peace feelers will come from Peiping. They might come from Moscow. Communist China might be thoroughly licked, but they could simply call its "volunteers" back behind the Yalus river boundary and sit and lose

SAME AS REFUSAL-The Russians now say they are willing to hold a foreign minister's meeting if the ministers would discuss the North Atlantic pact and U.S. bases in Europe. The Soviet note with the big "if" was sent to the U.S. after 3 weeks of meetings in Paris by deputy foreign ministers of U.S., France, Britain and Russia.

According to western diplomats the Russian note amounts to the same thing as refusal to attend a foreign ministers' meeting. The U.S. has told the Russians many times they would not discuss the North Atlantic pact. The new Soviet line is that U.S. bases in Europe are 'the essential cause of the worsening of relations between the U.S.S.R. and the three powers."
