The "Dollar Day" idea is a common and annual institution in hundreds of cities and towns across the country. It is a solid and acceptable local merchandising stunt, universally popular because it benefits both the buyer and the seller. The consumer gets the bargains he is seeking, and the merchant moves a bigger-than-normal volume of stock from his shelves.

By the very nature of their stability and acceptability, however, Dollar Days as such can bog down in the public



mind by becoming too commonplace an institution over the years. Any alert group of merchants can counteract such a trend by adapting the basic "bargain day" concept to fit in with fresh and imaginative promotion procedures and giving the old stand-by a new name and a new approach.

A popular and effective variation on the theme is a communitywide merchandising program carried out successfully in Washing-

ton, Iowa, under the appealing title of "Ridiculous Day."

"Ridiculous Day" has come to be an annual event in Washington. The entire business district cooperates in putting it over. Staid and respectable businessmen resort temporarily to buffoonery, dressing, acting, and selling in ridiculous manners.

A "Ridiculous Parade" is staged during the morning of the eventful day which keynotes the activity and, in theory at least, puts the prospective local buyers in a happy and receptive frame of mind. And, according to the Washington merchants, the trick works.

Pre-date enthusiasm among the townspeople is stimulated by advertising in the local paper. The ads, as a general rule, try to set in advance the slightly zany note which characterizes "Ridiculous Day." As a good example of this unorthodox advertising slant, let's take a look at an ad sponsored by T. R. Phillips, a Washington drug store proprietor.

He uses three columns by 10 inches of space for the ad, which is designed in the form of a mock newspaper page, complete with headlines and stories.

The banner heading gets the whole thing off to a proper-


