#### Wis. Livestock Value Hits Million Mark

A larger livestock population on Wisconsin farms than a year ago with a record farm value is shown in the annual livestock inventory made recently by the Crop Reporting Service of the Wisconsin and United States Departments of Agriculture.

Wisconsin famers have a larger number of cattle, sheep and lambs, swine, and turkeys than they had at the beginning of 1951, but the number of chickens and horses is smaller this year. The value of all livestock on farms at the beginning of the year was over a billion dollars. which is about 16 per cent above a year ago and the highest value on record. The increase in value over a year ago results from both higher prices and the increases in livestock numbers.

Of the 3.916.000 cattle on Wisconsin farms, 2,407,000 head are milk cows. The number of milk cows is 1 per cent above a year ago and shows the first increase in four years. A decrease of about one per cent in milk cow numbers is shown for the nation.

Wisconsin's swine population is estimated at 2,039,000 head or seven per cent larger than a year ago. As a result of more stock sheep and lambs than a year ago, the sheep and lamb population on the state's farms of 283,000 head is five per cent larger than ast winter, and it is the largest since 1949.

The inventory this winter hows that Wisconsin farmers have about 14,848,000 chickens and 57,000 turkeys. The number of chickens on farms has been gradually decreasing since 1944, while the turkey population has been increasing since 1949. A continued decline in horse numbers has brought the number this year down to 172,000 head.

#### Give Your Chicks Plenty of Room

Don't crowd your chicks. Providing ample space for a new brood is one of the foot notes for successful brooding, and will lead to a healthier, more profitable flock.

Number of Chicks

Although everyone will not agree on the exact amount of space required per chick, a poultry raiser can feel safe in planning the size of a new brood on the basis of about two chicks per square foot of floor space. Under no circumstance should a 10x12 foot house accommodate more han 300 chicks and then only when special precautions in sanitation and ventilation are observed. Never more than 350 chicks should be raised under one hover, regardless of the floor space available.

As the chicks grow they will require increased space. Usually it is found necessary to divide the flock at about 4 weeks and again at 9 or 10 weeks. From this point until maturity it is considered safe to house from 100 to 150 pullets in a range shelter approximately 9 x 10 feet in

Don't Make This Mistake

Always remember-overcrowding can lead to flock depletion, and must be avoided. Many poulry raisers, ambitious to raise the argest brood possible under limited housing facilities, have made this mistake, and have learned to their regret that they would have been wiser to pursue a more cautious approach in their broodng activities.

The advantages of having ample room for your chicks can be measured in dollars and cents. Mortality is less because there is a reduced chance for the spread of disease; cannibalism is less likely to occur in an uncrowded brooder house; and better layers are produced when the chicks have grown to maturity under less congested conditions.



This type of adhesive is generally available, most of them are black in color, and will hold practically all kinds of materials together very well. With blocks in position, use screws to attach fixtures in customary way.

#### **Driving Caution** Needed To Avert Spring Accidents "Don't let the recent spring-

like weather make you forget your winter driving habits," warns J. E. P. Darrell, traffic engineer of the Minnesota Highway Department.

Recalling last winter's severe and repeated storms late in the season, he warned that motorists can expect the weather and driving conditions to get "much worse before they will get better" and should continue to drive with the greatest of care.

With many icy spots developing on roadways as the result of alternate thawing and freezing, great care should be taken to avoid dangerous skidding. Reducing speed when approaching curves and intersections, making gradual starts and stops and avoiding of sudden changes in direction or rate of travel will help prevent skids. Rear end collisions may be avoided by keeping a safe distance behind the car ahead.

Brakes, lights, battery and all operating mechanism should be checked periodically, to assure safe operation and to guard against stalling on the road in bad weather. In addition, chains, a shovel and a bag of dry sand should be carried in the car's trunk for emergencies.



## Freezer Planned Garden For Use All Year

Your home freezer and a vegetable garden planned for freezing -what combination could do more for your family's health and enjoyment when it comes to next winter's meals? When you plan your garden with freezing in mind, you can save yourself work and at the same time insure topnotch freezer vegetables.

Because it's so simple and convenient to freeze your garden's surplus products, the problems of succession planting can almost be eliminated. You can plant all you want of one vegetable at the time of the season best suited to its growth rather than plant smaller amounts of it at different times.

This planting plan gives you the vegetables at their best, but there's less work in the garden required in proportion to the amount of vegetables you harvest. For the most satisfactory results in freezing, the vegetables should be picked at the peak of their ripening process and frozen immediately.

you that the earlier vegetables will be out of the garden in time to plant the later varieties. Many times the variety of vegetable you prefer fresh is the one you will prefer frozen, but University of Wisconsin specialists do recommend certain ones that freeze well and grow well in Wisconsin. You may prefer to store such items as carrots or squash fresh, but it's very handy to have a few packages of them in the freezer ready for quick meals.

Some of the varieties recommended for freezing are listed below. You may obtain a booklet on this by writing to the Bulletin Mailing Room, College of Agriculture, University of Wisconsin, Madison 6, Wis., and asking for circular 357, "Freezing Vegetables and Fruits."

#### Careful planning will assure Simple "Don'ts" **Protect Children** From Sex Criminals

Sex crimes involving children can be prevented in your community if the youngsters are made acquainted with a few simple "don'ts." The police of Greenwich, Connecticut, found this out last autumn, according to Mc-Call's Magazine, when they distributed a leaflet to 7,000 schoolchildren telling them how to avoid situations that provide opportunities for sex criminals. Some of these rules are given in McCall's for April:

"The 'don'ts' compiled by the Greenwich police are an old story to many parents and children, but taken together they tell the backgrounds of most sex crimes. Children who don't take candy or rides from strangers, and don't wander through lonesome places by themselves, don't provide opportunities for sex criminals. These rules have worked in Greenwich; they can work for

your children too. "Don't play alone in deserted lots, alleys or buildings, where strangers can sneak up on you. When you go to a playground or

a store, take your friends along. "Don't accept rides from people you do not know, and don't go with strangers when they ask you for directions.

"Do mark down the license number of the car of a stranger who offers you a ride, candy or a good time. If you don't have a pencil, scratch the number in the road with a stick or stone.

"Don't take money, candy or treats from a stranger, or let him touch you.

"Don't go with strangers who offer you a job with pay. "Don't wait or play around public toilets. Always leave immediately."


