### **Final Report Has Red Cross Drive**

In a summary final report on the 1952 Red Cross fund campaign for the West Bend chapter area, Drive Chairman R. G. Lauson has announced that the goal was exceeded by \$700. Total contributions reached \$9,303.74, as compared with an overall quota of \$8,596.

"We are pleased to announce this good news and are proud of the fact that the people in the West Bend chapter area have once again lined up generously in support of the humanitarian work of Red

Praising the cooperative spirit of participated in the drive, Lauson said it was their hard work which put the campaign over the top by such a wide margin.

Originally, the goal in the 1952 campaign was \$8,216, but tornado and flood disasters in the south and southwest resulted in need for additional relief funds before the drive ended. West Bend's share of the special disaster fund was set at \$380, raising the overall drive quoto to \$8,596.

Lauson said it will be necessary to make some allocations from industrial collections in order to have a completely accurate picture of the results in the various precincts. He said he was certain that with one or two exceptions every precinct will have exceeded its individual quota when allocations are completed.



Although there is no indication that the recent outbreak of hoof and mouth disease in Canada has affected any cattle in this area, Dr. H. J. O' Connell lists the symptoms of the disease as a precautionary measure for farmers.

List Of Symptoms Of **Hoof & Mouth Disease** 

Proper investigation and immediate diagnosis of suspicious symptoms in cattle can prevent any outbreak of the hoof and mouth scourge in the area, O'Connell declared.

He urged cattle owners to watch for the following symptoms. Blisters appearing on the tongue, around the mouth, on the skin above the hoof line and on teats and udders. These blisters usually rupture within 24 hours and form red, granular deposits on the surface.

Fever and excessive flow of saliva if they accompany the blister symptoms, are also indications of hoof and mouth infection. Sores on the animal's feet cause lameness and in advanced cases the hoof wall begins shedding. Affected animals have trouble eating or drinking and a loss of weight is noticeable. Pregnant animals frequently

abort and sterility in breeding animals is a common symptom. O'Connell said that hoof and mouth disease is still the greatest threat to our livestock industry. Should it get out of control, milk, meat, leather and other animal products might be reduced by 25 per cent.

There is no need for alarm, O'Connell added, but alertness for suspicious symptoms is just good common sense farming. He urged farmers to contact their local veterinarian at once



#### **FTC Rules Acetate Garments Must** Be Labeled

You'll find something new on fabric labels this spring. The Federal Trade Commission has ruled that if a material contains acetate, it must be stated on the label.

Up to this time, all materials of this type were grouped under the term "rayon." But since the rayons and acetates require different care, this new labeling can help you a great deal.

#### Wash Differently

Many rayons are washable and can be laundered either by hand or in your washing machine. If the label recommends machine washing, you can use hot water and regular laundry soap or detergents. Rayon can be ironed with a hot iron, although it shouldn't be quite as hot as you would use for cottons.

Acetate fabrics are treated in just the opposite way. If the label says it is washable, it should be washed by hand in luke warm water and mild soapsuds, never in the washing machine. A warm iron-never hot-will prevent fabric damage when you're ironing it. When the material is a mixture of rayon and acetate it should be treated as if it were all acetate



### Opening Car Door Is Dangerous Way To Signal A Turn

Ever open your car door to signal a turn? Several drivers have gotten into serious trouble on Wisconsin highways in recent weeks while using this nonstandard means of signaling intention to turn, declares the safety division of the motor vehicle department.

If a vehicle is lacking in mechanical turn signal devices, the standard hand signals should be used, the safety division says. To turn left, the left arm is extended straight out, to turn right, the arm is bent at the elbow with hand extended straight upward. When signalling sudden stop, the left arm is extended downward. Proper "positioning" of the vehicle is important, too, making sure one's car is in the correct lane.



IV--Prevention and Treatment of Shock

### Bible Comment:

### Temperance in All Things Is the True Key to Happiness

THE Lord knoweth the way of the righteous, but the way of

the ungodly shall perish." That is as true concerning peoples and nations as it is of individuals. And it is as true today as it was in ancient times.

It is recalled that 10 of the 12 tribes of Israel revolted under Jeroboam against Solomon's son, Rehoboam. Successful in revolution, Jeroboam, leader of the Northern Kingdom, had a great opportunity to remedy the abuses of preceding reigns. But he set up idols and led his people in false ways.

Inner weakness left the nation unprepared when danger struck from without. The situation called for wise strategy and sound judgment, but what can be expected when there is a lack of sound and honest character?

The weakness from within had the familiar aspects of all social failure and deterioration-dishon esty and corruption in public life, licentiousness and debauchery among the well-to-do, disregard of the poor, exploitation of the people, and all the evils that have cursed society in the past and are still to be found today.

This is a temperance lesson, and the prophecies of the time in their revelation of the social abuses stress how large a part strong drink had in breaking down morale, bringing woe and destruction upon the nation.

Temperance lessons and lectures are not popular today. The prevalent psychology is favorable to drinking and indulgence, where a generation ago it was favorable to total abstinence. It is fair to make a distinction between drinking and drunkenness, between use and abuse of intoxicants as of other things.

But it is important to remember that intoxicating liquor has in it inherent dangers that do not apply to all other things. The Bible is a temperance textbook, full of warning, and its warnings are borne out in the history of men and nations.

The Northern Kingdom went down to ruin, and any nation that does not overcome evil with good is doomed to similar disaster.

Some advise coating the outside of rubber boots with glycerin before hanging away for the winter, but I have found that a boot which has been thoroughly cleaned needs no extra care other than hanging it where the temperature will be moderate, and never too warm. Heat destroys rubber.

ANSWER: It is doubtful that you could accomplish this job without danger of collapse of the house and excavation, with injury to yourself. You'd have to move heavy shoring timbers through that small opening, and carry out tons of earth, both virtually impossible.

QUESTION: If shingles on a new home stand up at times, will they eventually settle down, or must something be done with them? -J. S., Brockton, Mass.

ANSWER: New shingles, being flexible, can be raised slightly by wind action. Eventually they will become brittle, and adhere to one another from Summer heat, and he flat.

QUESTION: Could you tell me how to plas-ter around a built-in bath tub? The plaster I put in does not seem to stick. -A. B. C., Rochester

ANSWER: If you are using ordinary plaster on porcelain or metal, it will not stick. Go over the surfaces with fine grit sand paper to remove grease and loose particles and lightly roughen the surface, then apply one of the special tile patching cements now available in hardware stores. They will stick.

QUESTION: We have been mopping around a kitchen utility closet, and when we move it there are rust spots on the linoleum? How do I remove the spots, and prevent them? -Mrs. G. J., Princeton, N. J.

ANSWER: Rust stains can be taken from limited with lemon juice, or by scrubbing with steel wool. Set the cabinet on short wood blocks to keep the metal base from contact with water when mopping takes place.



Maraschino Cherry Cake

For large cake, grease and flour two nine-inch layer pans or 13 by 9 inch oblong pan. Sift together three cups sifted cake flour or two and three-fourths cups sifted flour, one and threefourths cups sugar, four teaspoons baking powder and one teaspoon salt. Add two-thirds cup soft shortening, one-third cup juice from cherries, two-thirds cup milk and 16 maraschino cherries, cut in eighths. Beat for two minutes. Add five egg whites (two-thirds cup), unbeaten. Beat for two minutes. Fold in one-half cup chopped nuts.

Pour into prepared pans. Bake. Cool. Finish with cooked white frosting made with cherry juice in place of water. Decorate with bright red cherries. Temperature: 350 degrees (moderate oven). Time: Bake 30 to 35 minutes for layers; square or oblong 35 to 40 minutes.

For small cake, follow the above procedure, using there ingredients: Two and one-fourth cups sifted cake flour or two and one-eighth cups sifted flour, one and one-third cups sugar, three teaspoons baking powder, threefourths teaspoon salt, one-half cup soft shortening, one-fourth cup juice from cheeries, one-half cup milk, 12 cherries, four egg whites (one-half cup), unbeaten; three-eighths cup chopped nuts. Use two eight-inch layer pans or nine inch square pan.




