

Move To Take Control Of Conservation Laws Away From Governor

The conservation commission for many years has promulgated orders with the effect of law on fish and game matters, but they have been subjected to the scrutiny and the approval of the gov-ernor of the state. There is now a movement to take the governor out of the picture, and to allow the appointive commissioners to control fish and game laws ex-clusively. The idea seemed last week to have the backing of the Wisconsin Federation of Conservation clubs, which gave the idea a plug in its official publicity

organ. The principal reason for the animosity toward gubernatorial review involved Gov. Kohler and his insistence this year of looking over the conservation commission's deer order carefully. He signed the seven day shoot, but only after he had consulted with representatives of some of the protesting groups and only after insisting upon refuge orders that would protect deer in some places.—State Capitol News Let-ter.



The "soft touch" puts a new hand on dress, suit and coat fabrics, says Betty Ann. It's both a surface feeling and a textural suppleness so deftly achieved that the fabric loses none of the natural stamina. In dress-weights both woolens and worsted are mellowed by this mood. Long, silky angora rabbit hair enhances the face appeal of many and gentles the texture. "Delphine" is one of these with rabbit hair making an intriguing pattern as well as a soft touch. Any number of tweedy dressweight novelties derive rare color from a misting of this luxury fiber.

Alpaca, fine kid mohair, angora, a touch of fur or cashmere heightens the luxuriousness of many suit and coat fabrics. The almost limitless interplay of color as related to texture effect or feeling makes exciting fabric news in trade wind colors. Many imaginative new surface treatments gain depth or polish through a subtle counterpoint use of color. In patterned woolens color often is cross played to create an illusion of texture for an otherwise smooth faced fabric. There are many faces to the textured look and as many ways to develop an alluring touch appeal without losing the basic vitality of woolens or worsteds.

This fall and winter you'll get more hat for your money. Deeper crowns, more draping, bigger brims. The whote effect is a softer one, soft in silhouette and soft in fabric.

The cloche is, of course, the hat. It's enjoying its biggest revival since the twenties. This time, though, it's done in fuzzy angora or soft, brushed felt. Do Set At Home

"Casual: The hair-setting does not need to be redone after a few days-just brush it back, with or without a part, and fluff the ends softly at the neckline. If you prefer this more casual look, brush it out after the set.

"Party: Over the forehead make several rows of pin curls with three-inch hair. Comb sides back; set ends in parallel rows of pin curls from crown to nape. Brush top and front hair back in a swirled pompadour, back hair into cluster of curls."

Can Stop Soil Erosion Research Shows

Starting to re-build a badly eroded field?

Here are some reports on research from the Erosion Control Experiment Station at LaCrosse which tell the story of soil re-

O. E. Hays, soils specialist there, has just completed experiments on erosion control and says you definitely can build the land back up again.

Barnyard manure plowed under gave the biggest results on his 16 per cent slope. Applied to grain land, the barnyard manure reduced soil and water losses. Subsurface tillage with a large field cultivator also reduced soil and

water losses When Hays started these tests in 1941, the soil was eroded so badly that only three to five inches of surface soil remained on the plots. The test plots were planted to four year rotations of corn, grain, and two years of alfalfa-brome hay Fertilizer was applied vith the grain.

At corn planting time, lime was applied to make the soil neutral. Some plots received barnyard manure, some received green manure, and some received both. The plots managed in this way

were compared with plots where only corn was grown. With no rotation and low fertility, corn yields were 34 bushels per acre. Compare that to the 67 bushels per acre yields with high

fertility and a four year rotation.

The average yield of oats in the rotation was 67 bushels per acre. After one cycle of the rotation, barley yields were about 27 bushels per acre. After a few years of the rotation and improved soil practices, Hays believes barley yields may rise to around 44 bushels per acre.

These tests show that a four year rotation isn't long enough to control the soil and water losses very effectively on this soil and slope.

The improved treatment reduced the runoff by half, and soil loss from corn to one-third of what it was. However, soil loss was still too high-35 tons per acre. Fertilizer alone can help to reduce soil loss by increasing yields, leaving more crop residue on the field.

The soil loss from grain was satisfactorily reduced from 14 to less than two tons per acre. Green manure, surface applied, or in combination with barnyard manure, gave the best erosion control on the grain plots.

Bible Comment:

Both James and Paul Urged the Practice Of Religious Rules

IVING our religion is nothing more or less than putting into practice every day those principles of the Christian religion which we are taught to value so highly.

The Epistle of James is reput-edly the Epistle of "works" and many, including Martin Luther, have set it above the Epistles of Paul as the messages of "faith." To make such a contrast is un-fair to the facts of early Christian

istory and to the spirit of the complete New Testament. Paul was as insistent as James on practicing the principles of true Christian living based on the Master's example. James, Jesus' brother, was not

one of the 12 apostles. In fact, John tells us the brothers of Jesus did not accept Him as the Messiah until after the crucifixion when they joined the Christian com-James is mentioned by Paul as

one of those who saw the vision of the risen Christ. Later James became a power in the church at Jerusalem. But Paul and James were never opposed to each other. On the contrary, they enjoyed a

close fellowship.

The fact which draws many to conclude the Epistle of James is the one of "works" is due to his lack of elaborated discussions of doctrine.

We can think of James as a wise church pastor who deals with his people according to their needs. He rebukes some for their laxity and un-Christian attitudes. He commends others for doing things in a Christ-like way. But he is always busy defining doctrine so that none would miss the essential meaning.

By the time the Epistle of James was written, the Christian community was a great deal larger than in the beginning. It presented new problems in relationships. By this time many rich people were drawn into the organization.

But James found it necessary to remind his fellow Christians that God was no respecter of persons. Social and economic position meant nothing in the final consideration of good and bad qualities. Both the world and the church need much of the message found in his Epistle today.




