Protection For Prodigies Urged

The child prodigy is a standard ridiculed individual and he is also an illusion with no basis in fact, says a bulletin issued today by the Minnesota State Medical association.

The truth is, that unusually bright children are also, as a rule, unusually strong, healthy, good looking. The doctors cite recent studies made in California of some 1500 children with IQ's of 130 or over as evidence.

These children are neither physical weaklings nor social misfits, the doctors point out. They do have trouble in school; but their troubles stem from the fact that their school work is too easy and offers no challenge to their rapidly developing minds. Their needs have almost everywhere been sacrificed to the needs of the slow and the handicapped and it is often they, rather than the obviously unfortunate, who are the forgotten children.

Special classes for the handicapped are needed, of course, the bulletin says; but ignoring the special needs of bright children is endangering the best source of future leadership.

Unfortunately, the bright child does not always forge ahead in spite of being held down in school to the average level. Quite often children of great promise give up and drift, or turn their talents to unprofitable and even to destructive enterprises of their own, thus wasting their excellent natural gifts.

Very few schools make any special provision for their brightest pupils; but the doctors urge parents of these children to work with teachers in providing special outlets, in and out of school, to keep them occupied and stimulated.

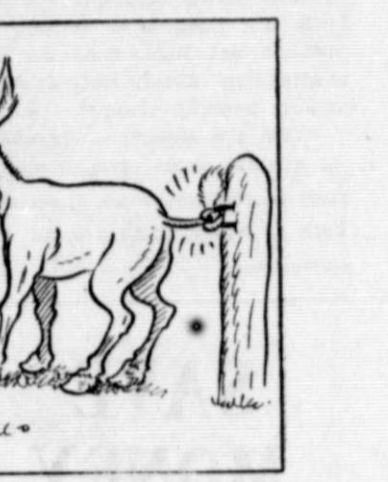

PREPARE A PLASTERED WALL FOR REPAINTING

A well prepared surface is absolutely necessary in getting a good paint job.

Wash the walls and ceilings with soap and water, or a good detergent and water. To avoid streaks, begin at the bottom and wash upward. Rinse with clear water.

Fill all cracks and holes. Crayon type crack filler is excellent for small cracks. Sandpaper clean before painting.

For cracks and holes up to 1/4", use Swedish putty. Mix some of the paint you intend to use with dry whitening or spackle, and you have Swedish putty.

Swedish putty hardens quickly. When hard, sand surface level with a piece of sand paper wrapped around a block of wood.

Remove grease spots by applying a paste made of Fuller's earth and dry cleaning fluid. Brush off the powder when dry. Repeat the process several times. Dry cleaning fluid is usually inflammable, so have plenty of ventilation, and don't smoke.

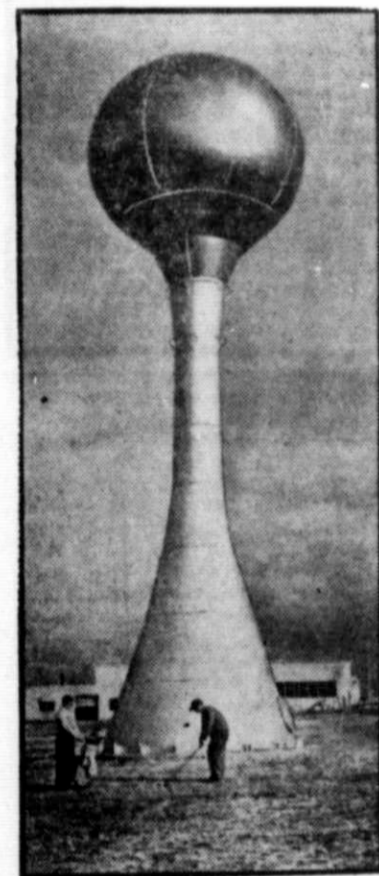
Apply wall sealer in order to seal the hot spots which will absorb paint.

Remove rough spots with sandpaper.

THE ONE AND ONLY

So Goes The Mind

WHAT MAKES A SUCCESSFUL MARRIAGE?

Do Americans regard the marriage bond too lightly? Perhaps a glance at divorce statistics today will suffice for an answer. Out of every eight persons married, two become divorced.

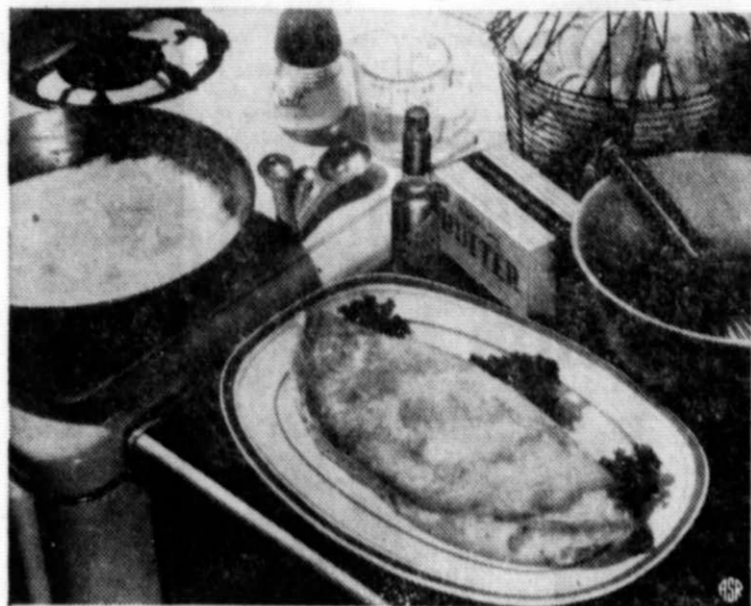

Tabasco's Tang Helps Bland Eggs



This time of year eggs are budget-priced, which means that you will want to use them often. Besides, they're one of our most nutritious foods—provide lots of protein, iron and calcium and everyone should have at least one a day. Omelets are filling and versatile enough to be served at breakfast, lunch or dinner. Boasting the additional reinforcement and seasoning of milk, butter, salt and Tabasco for that little lift on which gourmets insist, the whole family will find omelets one of their favorite foods. Tabasco of course goes well with all egg dishes; Britishers (and plenty of Americans) refuse boiled eggs without a few drops of the famous old southern hot sauce; Tabasco scrambled eggs are becoming increasingly popular. Now see what a big help a little of this pungent flavoring is to an omelet.

Fluffy Omelet

6 eggs, separated
6 tablespoons water
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon Tabasco
2 tablespoons butter

Beat egg whites until stiff, but not dry. Without rinsing beater quickly beat egg yolks with water, salt and Tabasco. Fold into beaten egg whites. Melt butter in a heavy frying pan. Add mixture and cook over low heat, until omelet is slightly brown underneath. Place in a moderate oven (350° F.) about 10 minutes, until dry on top. Cut part way through center. Fold and slip from pan on plate or platter. YIELD: 6 servings.

Because eggs are rich sources of vitamin A, iron and protein, they are one of our finest foods for growing bodies or one of our best dietary protections for adult health. They need not always be scrambled, fried or broiled—serve them in ice cream, in sandwiches, in salads, in sauces for vegetables and in many other dishes.

Wilted Lettuce

1 head loose leaf lettuce
3 strips bacon
2 tablespoons vinegar
2 tablespoons water
Salt and pepper
1 tablespoon brown sugar
Hard boiled eggs

Wash lettuce and dry. Tear into pieces and put in salad bowl. Fry bacon crisp, lift out of fat and crumble. Add remaining ingredients to fat in pan. Heat to boiling point. Add bacon and pour over lettuce. Slice hot hard boiled eggs over the top.

Spanish Omelet

4 eggs
4 tablespoons milk
1/2 teaspoon salt
Pepper
1 tablespoon butter
1 tablespoon chopped onion
3/4 cup tomatoes
1/2 cup sliced mushrooms
1 tablespoon capers
1 green pepper chopped fine
Cayenne
2 tablespoons butter

Beat eggs slightly, just enough to blend yolks and whites. Add milk and seasonings. Put butter in omelet pan. When melted turn in the mixture. As it cooks, pick up with a spatula until the whole is a creamy consistency, then cover with the following sauce and fold over.

Coffee Sauce

4 tablespoons sugar
Salt
3 egg yolks slightly beaten
1/3 cup cream whipped
Add sugar and salt to eggs. Add coffee gradually. Cook in double boiler until thickened, stirring all the time. Cool. Fold in cream. Serve on ice cream or puddings.

Egg Salad Ring

1 1/2 dozen eggs
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1/4 cup diced pimiento
1/3 cup celery chopped fine
2 tablespoons chopped parsley
1 medium onion minced fine
2 packages cream cheese
1/2 cup mayonnaise
4 tablespoons chili sauce or catsup

Boil the eggs. Drain and shell while hot. Mash or chop them while hot. Cool. Add pepper, pimiento, celery, parsley and onion. Mash the cream cheese and stir in the mayonnaise & chili sauce. Combine with the vegetables and the cooked eggs. Season well with salt and pepper. Shape into a ring mold and chill about 4 hours. Loosen around edges with spatula and turn upside down on a chop plate. Fill the center with a good green salad, mixed with French dressing.

Egg Timbales

1 tablespoon butter
1 tablespoon flour
2/3 cup milk
3 egg yolks
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
1/2 teaspoon salt
Pepper
Few grains celery salt
Few grains cayenne
3 egg whites

Make sauce of butter, flour and milk. Add yolks, beaten until thick and lemon-colored, and seasonings. Beat egg whites until stiff, and cut and fold into first mixture. Turn into buttered molds and set in pan of hot water. Bake at 350 degrees until firm,
