

If you plan to serve baked ham for dinner choose one that suits your family needs. Most people prefer the flavor and tenderness of the modern cured ham that has been gently smoked over hardwood fires. Let a familiar brand be your guide to quality. Follow the directions on the wrapper for best results.

A fully cooked ham saves preparation time. It is ready to be sliced and served just as it comes from the wrapper if you desire to serve it cold. If you want to dress up the ham with a pretty glaze and garnish you can still serve it cold. For a quick glaze, cut off the shank skin, score the fat in diamond shaped sections and spread the fat surface with your favorite glaze. Pop into a 450 degree oven for 15 minutes or until browned. If you want to serve your fully cooked ham piping hot at dinner, bake in a moderate oven, 325 degrees, about 12 minutes or until a meat thermometer registers an internal temperature of 130 degrees. At the end of the heating time, remove the skin and score the fat. Spread on a glaze and return to a 400 degree oven for 15 minutes to brown the glaze.

#### Prune Coffee Cake 34 cup buttermilk; 1 compress

ed yeast cake; 1 egg; ¼ cup melted shortening; 21/4 cups sifted all purpose flour; 1/2 cup granulated sugar; 1 teaspoon salt; ½ teaspoon cinnamon; 1/4 teaspoon soda: 1 cup cooked prunes.

Heat buttermilk to barely lukewarm and stir in crumbled yeast, lightly beaten egg and shortening. Sift together flour, sugar, salt, cinnamon and soda, and stir into yeast mixture. Beat well and turn into greased eight inch round baking dish. Pit prunes and cut into halves. Arrange prune halves cut side down over soft dough Blend topping ingredients until crumbly and spread over fruit. Let rise in warm place about one hour. Bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees, 45 minutes to one hour, or until pick inserted in center of cake comes out clean. Serve warm. Makes 8 generous wedges.

Somehow, to speak of the sacredness of human life in this age of hot and cold warfare seems almost a mockery of the principle itself.



The deed that needs to be done is to establish as a true fact the premise that killing is wrong and that it is a sin against humanity as well as God.







that is just out of this world. White-crowned Sparrows feed to a slight extent on grain and to a great extent on weed seeds. Their economic importance is probably neutral but their emotional importance ranks high with those who know them best. During the summer months their

food is primarily insects. White-crowned Sparrows usually nest in brushland or open woods, usually in hilly country. The nest of grass, roots and leaves with a fine lining is usually hidden in dense vegetation a foot or so above the ground. Four to five eggs, each nearly an inch long, bluish gray to whitish and spotted or dotted with reddish brown or brown, are incubated for about two weeks by the female. There is but one annual brood and the nesting and rearing period is usually in June and July.

If you have not made the acquaintance of this delightful bird and live within the area of its northern migration this spring, then get out and get acquainted. You will thank me for introducing you to the bird, the bird for living, and wildlife protection organizations like the National Wildlife Federation for sending you this message.

### Protection For **Prodigies Urged**

The child prodigy is a standard ridiculed individual and he is also an illusion with no basis in fact, says a bulletin issued today by the Minnesota State Medical association.

The truth is, that unusually bright children are also, as a rule, unusually strong, healthy good looking. The doctors cite re cent studies made in California of some 1500 children with IQ's of 130 or over as evidence.

These children are neither phy sical weaklings nor social misfits, the doctors point out. They do have trouble in school; but their troubles stem from the fact that their school work is too easy and offers no challenge to their rapidly developing minds. Their needs have almost everywhere been sacrificed to the needs of the slow and the handicapped and it is often they, rather than the obviously unfortunate, who are the forgotten children.

Special classes for the handicapped are needed, of course, the bulletin says; but ignoring the special needs of bright children is endangering the best source of future leadership.

Unfortunately, the bright child does not always forge ahead in spite of being held down in school to the average level. Quite often children of great promise give up and drift, or turn their talents to unprofitable and even to destructive enterprises of their own, thus wasting their excellent natural gifts.

Very few schools make any special provision for their brightest pupils; but the doctors urge parents of these children to work with teachers in providing special outlets, in and out of school, to keep them occupied and stimulated.



Beat egg whites until stiff, but not dry. Without rinsing beater quickly beat egg yolks with water, salt and Tabasco. Fold into beaten egg whites. Melt butter in a heavy frying pan. Add mixture and cook over low heat, until omelet is slightly brown underneath. Place in a moderate oven (350°F.) about 10 minutes, until dry on top. Cut part way through center. Fold and slip from pan on plate or platter, YIELD: 6 servings.

#### Coffee Sauce 4 tablespoons sugar

3 egg yolks slightly beaten up cream whipped

Add sugar and salt to eggs. Add coffee gradually. Cook in double boiler until thickened, stirring all the time. Cool. Fold in cream. Serve on ice cream or puddings


