Rugs and carpets need daily accuming according to one the bulletin says, that these comvacuuming, according to one manufacturer's consumers' institute, to keep dirt and dust from grinding into them. Ground in dirt not only dulls carpet colors but actually damages rug fibers.

Even the best schedule of carpet care is upset, however, if something is spilled on a rug When that happens, speedy treatment is the way to prevent permanent damage.

Use a clean, slightly damp absorbent cloth or white blotting paper to sop up spilled liquids before they set in the body of the carpet. Scrape up semiliquids with a spoon, dull knife or spatula.

Remove oily substances, such as butter, vegetable or mineral oils, and creams, with dry cleaning fluid. In the case of acids, such as fruit juice or vinegar, mop up spillage and then wet

Sleeping Pill Deaths Studied By Doctors

A new light has recently been shed on the background of deaths due to overdose of sleeping pills The Minnesota State Medical association today points to recent studies of the effects of illegal use of barbiturates which are the commonly prescribed sleeping pills. At least 1,000 deaths a year are caused by barbiturates, these studies show, and there are thousands of other deaths by accidents or crimes in which use of these dangerous drugs is a contributing

HERE'S a vegetable medley to tempt lagging spring appetites. It is simple to prepare, is different and full of the flavors of many kinds of vegetables.

VEGETABLE MEDLEY

(Makes 6 servings)

One-quarter cup butter, 11/2 cups sliced onions, 2 cups celery cut in thin strips, 11/2 cups carrots, cut in thin strips, 2 cups string beans cut in thin strips, 3/4 cup green peppers cut in thin strips, 21/2 teaspoons salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 11/2 cups mushrooms sliced lengthwise, 2 cups canned tomatoes, 2 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca

Melt butter in saucepan. Add onions, celery, carrots, string beans. green peppers and seasonings and cook 10 minutes, stirring frequently. Add mushrooms and tomatoes and simmer 20 minutes, or until vegetables are tender. Then add quick-cooking tapioca and cook 5 minutes longer, stirring occasionally. Serve with crisp bacon or grilled frankfurters, if desired.

In spite of this we have a long way to go. The commandment' "Thou shalt not steal" must become socialized and "stealing" must be defined in relation to honesty and the basic truths.


Jesus' teachings of the use of property goes beyond the limits of fundamental honesty. He relates one's possessions to his character and ideals.

Metal in the form of silvery aluminum crystals is used to coat one side of a fabric used to line traverse draperies. This coating insulates the room against extremes of hot and cold outside. a good idea for big windows or walls of glass.

You can wash soot and dirt off the leaves of house plants, enabling them to breathe. First protect the earth in the pot by placing a piece of waxed paper, slit at one side, around the stem of the plant. Dip leaves into warm soapsuds and then into rinse water. Broad leaves can be wiped with sudsy cloth, then with a rinse cloth. An atomizer will clean delicate foliage well. Dry plants away from sunshine.

Some cake makers, even those who have been at it for years, leave the kitchen looking as if the plasterers had been in. Others do a neat and tidy job of frosting their cakes. For a neat kitchen follow this advice. Do the job right on the serving plate so you won't get nervous about transferring the cake later. Place two strips of wax paper on that serving plate, at right angles to each other, and carefully deposit your cake on them. Then go ahead and frost. When you have finished, gently draw out the wax paper. The plate will be clean







Reporting on two years of experimentation under a grant from A & P Food Stores, Dr. Eric Sharvelle and his associates said they discovered that the vapors of some inexpensive chemicals give peaches and strawberries considerable protection from rot and mold. These two silent destroyers are big factors in the annual post-harvest shipping loss of about one acre in five of U.S. ood production.

The scientists' laboratory experiments showed that rot and mold loss had been reduced as much as 83 per cent with the chemicals trichloroethylene and etrachloroethylene. In these tests, quantities of fruit were deliberitely exposed to damaging fungi and spores, then half of each batch was treated with the chemcal vapors.

After a period of storage under dentical conditions, loss figures or the treated and untreated batches were computed. Of the untreated fruit, 58 per cent would have had to be thrown away by a food merchant, while in the vapor-bathed batch, only six per cent fell below the quality par.



Masonite Wastebasket Simple to Make

EVERY room should have a wastebasket, and some rooms should have two! Making one or several from the plan here described and illustrated is an easy test of an amateur craftsman's skill.

From a lumber yard obtain some three-quarter-inch quarter-round and a panel of Masonite Tempered Presdwood one-eighth inch thick. With a cross-cut saw, cut from the panel four



identical pieces for the sides and a smaller one for the bottom. The side pieces are 12 inches long and tapered from a top width of 10 inches to a bottom width of 8 inches. An 8-inch square serves as the bottom.

The panels are nailed to the quarterrounds serving as corner posts. At the bottom of each side piece attach a length of quarter-round to form a square framework into which the bottom may be nailed

Hand holds may be cut out, as illustrated, with a coping or similar saw. To start the blade, drill a hole.

As a variation from this style, use the same sized sides and bottom, lacing instead of nailing the sides together. No quarter-rounds then are needed, except as a base for the bottom. Drill holes about an inch apart and a halfinch from the edge. Use leather thongs for lacing.

Like the Horned Larks, and inlike the Juncoes and Tree Sparrows, the Longspurs may run instead of hop and like the Horned Larks the Longspurs show a onspicuous, long hind-toe track. There are four species of Longspurs to be found in the North American continent of which the Lapland Longspur is the eastern representative. Two other species may accidentally find their way east of the prairie country now and then.

Grasslands or salt-marsh counry offer the greatest appeal to visiting Lapland Longspurs and here they may be found in flocks in season.

Our picture shows an adult male in summer plumage. The face, crown, throat and upper breast are black and the nape and lower back of the neck is chestnut. The conspicuous field character would probably be what appears like a black cap and black-streaked side of the breast. The back in conspicuously streaked with black and brown or with a dark and lighter brown. In winter the conspicuous black shown in our illustration is for the most part missing though there are dark to blackish spots on the sides of the throat and back of the eye. The female looks much like the adult male in winter but lacks much of the dark brown and black of the male. Superficially these birds look ike brown Juncoes, or remotely like Vesper Sparrows, which would be far away when the Longspurs were to be seen in the United States.

Economically the birds serve a role as destroyers of weed seeds though it is doubtful if this is important in view of the abundance of seeds available. They are interesting to watch in winter weather, however, and the National Wildlife Federation hopes that they will never be driven from their natural range.

One of the best plans is embodied in a policy that insures you for a certain number of years, then in itself reaches a cash value equal to the remainder of your mortgage, at which time the insurance policy matures. Your cash investment in the policy is then used to pay off the mortgage balance. This type of policy is the most expensive to carry while you are paying periodic premiums. (Insurance payments may increase your mortgage an-nual payments by a third or more); but its over-all cost at maturity when your mortgage has been liquidated, is almost insignificant or may be canceled entirely. At the same time you are fully insured less. for the full initial obligation of your

mortgage for the entire time that you are making payments. Your death at any time during these years not only pays off the debt, but refunds to your family every cent that has been paid on the mortgage to that date.

This second type of mortgage insurance package, as does the first, has a cash value at any time but, covers only the outstanding mort-gage debt. In the event of the insured's death, the insurance cancels the mortgage, but there is no the policy having a cash value, the point is eventually reached where this equals the outstanding mortgage, so that additional mortgage payments are not necessary. It takes longer to reach this point than with the previously outlined policy, but the net cost of this type of insurance over the full mortgage

term is still very low. 

It's Time to Talk of Teeth

Another fallacy about food and teeth has been blasted. It simply isn't

true that all foods high in carbohydrate wreck havoc with our teeth. Used to be, that those who faced a possible losing battle with tooth decay were advised to cut down on the amount of refined carbohydrate foods as the only known way of meeting the dental caries problem. Among foods singled out, were those made from white flour.

Among foods singled out, were those made from white four. That foods high in starch do not bring about dental decay is demon-strated by dental health surveys made in several countries where the diet consists mainly of such foods. In Italy where 70 per cent of the calories are obtained from bread, spaghetti and macaroni, a 60-year old person can be expected to have as good teeth as a 13-year old Amer-ican child. In China and India where refined rice dominates the diet, dental decay is low. Good thinking demands some "brushing-up" on the facts regarding

decay. It results indirectly from the activity of micro-organisms living on the covering of the teeth, known as "the plaque." The organisms pro-duce acids from sugars; the acids in turn attack the enamel of teeth. Research shows that the breaking down of starch by these organisms to its final product, acid, is so slow that the ever-present saliva can offset the acid formed. Recent studies emphasize the long-known fact that proper use of the

tooth brush will greatly decrease dental decay. It isn't always con-venient to brush one's teeth after a meal, but it is possible to gently rinse the mouth with a drink of water to remove sugars and any par-ticles of other foods which might have remained after eating.

Tuberculosis Control Service

Tuberculosis is a communicable disease but it still is a serious enough problem to be discussed as an individual service. We have had a total of 30 patients treated in the sanatoria during the past year. 10 of these entered the sanatorium since November, 1951. 6 of those admitted were discovered through our contact case finding program. Several of this last group are children who have been found in the early stages of the disease. With proper care at this time there is every reason to believe that these patients will be saved from a far more serious illness in their later life.

X-rays were offered to all the teachers in the county again this year. A total of 182 teachers, school employees and other adults had chest films during the two days the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis Association Photo-Fluorographic Bus was stationed in the County

It is gratifying to note from a recent state report that Washington County shows improvement in our case finding program and in the number of active cases of tuberculosis that are under hos-

1952 ANNUAL REPORT OF COUNTY FAIR

The Honorable Board of Supervisors Washington County, Wisconsin

Ladies and Gentlemen:

The 95th Annual Washington County Fair was held July 24 to 27 inclusive. It was the 15th Fair to be held on the Highway Grounds at Slinger. The weather was favorable for fair purposes. The total attendance was estimated to have been between 32,000 and 35,000 visitors.

A free entertainment program was presented on each evening and on Saturday and Sunday afternoon. Home talent only was largely used. All of these were given compensation in proportion to the number of participants and the length of time of their performance. Snapp's Greatest Shows and Rides presented an inviting midway.

Because of limited barn space the number of livestock entries any exhibitor might make was limited. Thus the livestock entries were smaller in number than in former years. It will be necessary to continue limiting these entries until more housing space can be provided.

The Fair operates largely as a youth fair. 4-H and FFA youth make up the largest number of exhibitors. The 1952 Fair had 553 junior exhibitors who made 2,219 entries for display. They were

paid \$3,250.75 in premium money. There were 185 adult exhibitors who displayed 914 exhibits and these received \$850.20 in premium noney

Costs of operating a fair increased considerable over the previous years. In operating a free fair the income is limited almost entirely to that from the midway and the various commercial concessions. This amount is not sufficient to defray the expenses of operating the fair. In view of this the County Board Fair Committee recommends that your annual county appropriation be continued at \$3,000.00.

Special health services supported and assisted by this department are the following:

- 1. Dental health program. This program was re-evaluated and re-organized this past year. Reports indicate to date that the participation has increased.
- 2. Iodo Lacti tablets furnished each school child in the County as a prevention of goiter. The nearly 100% participation in the program is gratifying.
- 3. Initial planning has been going on for the past two months with the Washington County Supt. of Schools and the Washington County Public Health Council for the audiometric testing of all school children early in the year 1953. This is a program that is sponsored by the Bureau for Handicapped Children in Madison.
- Screening tests to discover defects in vision, weight and height are demonstrated by the nurses to the teachers during school visits and at teacher institutes.
- 5. Health information is given to the schools through talks, newsletters and conferences with parents, teachers and administrators.
- 6. Home visits are made by nurses on selected cases of children with health problems referred by teachers and family physicians.

The majority of cases in this service fall in the area of chronic illness and morbidity services. Cases are referred by the family physician and care is given on a demonstration basis. This is nec essary because the large area and population serviced makes it impossible to offer calls on a continued-care basis.

The problem of chronic disease is increasing with our increased life expectancy. However, the services to the prenatal, infant, preschool and school age groups will directly improve adult health because chronic diseases so often begin in childhood and become recognizable in middle age.

Examples of the types of cases seen would include cancer. diabetes, diseases of the heart and arteries, and rheumatic fever. Adult Health Service:

Care of the Handicapped

The public health nurse's objectives in this area are: 1. The nursing care for the patients with these handicapping conditions and 3. The physical, educational and social rehabilitation of the handicapped person.

Prevention is furthered by teaching both parents and teachers of crippling accidents. Assistance with home nursing care when patients are ill with disease that may cause handicapping will also help to prevent some of the complications that may follow. In the field of rehabilitation, the nurses are aware of the re-

The year 1952 was a good all around crop year for Washington County farmers. The growing season began early with April 16 as the last frost in the springtime. October 2 was the date of the first heavy frost for the fall. Thus farm crops had more than the usual length of time for growth and for ripening.

Crops produced during the year were of good quality with few exceptions. The pastures and other forage crops were regarded as the best on record. Corn in the county as well as in the state as a whole is expected to be the second largest on record. Grain crops Fruit Growers were only average in yield and quality because of rains during much of the harvesting period. Cash crops such as canning peas, red beets, sweet corn, pickles, carrots and snap beans were big in yield and excellent in quality.

Rainfall, which is very much needed for a big farm production. was abundant throughout the growing portion of the year. Sep- Radio and Press tember and October were dry months and gave rural folks a chance to harvest late crops and do other urgent work needed on the farm.

ANNUAL REPORT OF WASHINGTON COUNTY HOME DEMONSTRATION AGENT Betty Ann Whitmore

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors, Washington County, Wisconsin.

Ladies and Gentlemen:

Throughout the program of 1952, the plan of giving people a greater part in carrying out and working with their own programs was encouraged. Planning and doing things in their programs themselves was a responsibility for homemakers and leaders of 4-H. This year a special committee working with the Executive Board helped to revise the Homemaker Council's constitution. Most

of the ideas were of the committee's own thinking. The changes in the constitution were made with the special effort to help develop leadership.

A new project was planned and organized successfully. The Health Committee worked to encourage people of the county to study cancer and have physical examinations made. Good health is a very important factor in happy living and this project is guided toward the goal of realizing this.

A program is only as strong as the people in it. It would seem that one main purpose of a home agent is to see that leadership qualities in people are brought out. This year the agent has worked around this philosophy of giving women the opportunities to make the best possible use of their leadership qualities.

An effort was made to develop individual leadership along with each program. The agent felt that in this way the organization has become more self-sufficient and responsible in making the programs successful for the people.

On the following pages the agent has summarized the main projects worked on during the past year.

I. Home Furnishings and Surroundings:

This year an effort was made to encourage 4-H members to enroll in Home Furnishings. Principles of harmony, color, design and texture were taught. As a result 6 rooms were redecorated and 90 articles were made.

500 women were responsive and successful in the lampshade making project where they learned to make their own shades.

A tour was conducted through the home furnishing department in several of the large stores in Milwaukee. A group of 4-H members, leaders and mothers were taken on this tour, which was planned to help educate them in new ideas for home furnishings in their homes.

II. Nutrition and Health:

Garden planning meetings were held at which the agent discussed importance of a garden and values gained through planning a year round food supply from the garden.

In food preservation, frozen foods were discussed mainly because the freezer was discussed and demonstrated. 1,875 lbs. of foods were frozen and 1,250 quarts were canned.

Seven Leader Training meetings on fruits in our meals were sum \$500 is to be payable to the county superintendent of schools held, and homemakers felt it was helpful both for themselves and their daughters in 4-H. At the meetings, homemakers worked in mittee, and the remaining \$1,200 shall be for the per diem and pairs preparing and discussing methods used. They then demonstrated in their own clubs. As a result 500 families increased the

use of fruit in their meals.

III. Health and Safety:

In January, a health committee was formed. The women were very enthusiastic and they chose cancer education, with the goal of physical examinations as their first program.
