Pete Tavern Near Here Burglarized; Tree Trimmer Held

First suspicion of a Route 3, Kewaskum, tavernkeeper as to the identity of the man who allegedly burglarized his place Tuesday night resulted in the apprehension of a Milwaukeean at a West Bend hotel early Wednesday.

Traffic Officer George J. Lemieux took into custody Jerome Shimeck, 45, who has been residing at West Bend in recent months. He was picked up by police at Lemieux request.

According to the officer, Shimeck allegedly admitted that he had broken into Spanny Pete's tavern on Highway 55, about 11/2 miles north of Kewaskum earlier in the night. Lemieux reported that \$30 in change and five cartons of cigarettes, a case of beer and a case of whisky were stolen from the tayern during the absence of Pete between 4:45 and 11 p. m. Under good cultivation a square foot of ground will produce a pound or more of vegetables or fruit.

But gardens provide far more than wealth of wholesome food, especially for our factory and office people. Gardeners are rewarded with the virtues of sunlight and fresh air in the outof-doors, the benefits of physical exercise, the satisfaction of cre-ative achievement, and the health and happiness of the home.

As a man works in his garden his tension ceases. It affords him stimulation of the mind by the mere process of watching things grow, and the sense of useful production which is his.

Gardening need not be a monotonous, time-consuming task One hour a day of systematic care will be enough to produce an excellent harvest from an average size garden. New chemical weed-killers, modern insecticides, and new-fashioned gadgets have taken much of the back-breaking labor out of gardening.

The minute a garden becomes a bore, it becomes work; and work is not what the doctor ordered. The garden should not be expected to reward you in cash unless it has been your vocation. It should reward you with pleasure, beauty and peace of mind; with long hours of sleep following its gentle exercise; and a good appetite for the things you have grown. Rightly handled a garden can give you these returns-and more.



Then walk off with feet pointed straight ahead, moving your legs from the hips and your chin at a right angle to your body. Pick up your foot very definitely before you set it down again to avoid any tendency to drag. Let your feet strike the ground very lightly, heels first.

As you walk, feel your head is touching the sky or that you are displaying a badge of honor on your chest or balancing a pail of water on your head.

Disguising a drab piece of furniture or door panel by pasting fabric is a quick decorating trick. Textiles can be applied to the headboard of a bed, lamp shades, picture frames, the top of an old card table, the drawers of a commode and unsightly wastebaskets to perk them up for spring.

In covering any square object, the fabric corners should be mitered to eliminate bulk. A bushel basket covered with material, the wire handles bound with sturdy and decorative clothesline, makes a practical container for kindling, magazines or toys.

Fabric motifs-a leaf, a figure, a flower-can be cut out and pasted on a wall, door or piece of furniture in geometric or scattered patterns.

Sofa pillows and ways of using them have undergone a change. For a long time, as a reaction to the tasseled, fringed and ribboned pillows of the popular "Turkish cozy corner," there was a period when pillows were considered as not in keeping with the simple,

functional modern style. Now that a softened and more elegant look is in favor for interiors, pillows are back with us. Treated with discrimination as important decorative accessories, they often supply the only touch of sparkling color in monochromatic room schemes.

Crushed Pineapple Carrot Mold No 2 can crushed pineapple 1 package lemon flavored gela tin; ½ cup sugar; ¼ teaspoon salt; 2 tablespoons lemon juice;

pint whipping cream.

Drain pineapple. Add enough water to pineapple syrup to make one and one-half cups. Heat to a boil. Add gelatin and stir until dissolved. Add sugar, salt and lemon juice. Chill until slightly thickened. Add drained pineap ple and grated carrots. Whip cream stiff and fold into gelatin mixture. Pour into an eight inch ring mold (one and one-half quarts) and chill until firm. If desired, mold in individual molds. It's best to make this salad a day ahead of serving so that it will be thoroughly set before unmolding. Unmold and garnish with watercress. Serve with cheese straws. Yield: Eight servings.

Berries, Cottage Cheese, and Cold Cuts

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

IT'S spring in the kitchen! An attractive platter of cold cuts not only perks up appetites but makes kitchen labor easy and pleasant these first balmy days.

A good buying guide is to select at least one meat from each of the three "classes" of table-ready meats. Meat loaves are somewhat mild in flavor, often have other ingredients added, such as pickle and pimiento loaf.

Sausages include favorites, such as Bologna and Braunschweiger. Dry sausages such as salami are zesty and highly seasoned and the sure choice of most men. For utmost flavor and freshness, buy these meats from refrigerated cases.

If the meats are pre-packaged, store them in the refrigerator in their original cello-wrapping. Otherwise, wrap them loosely in waxed paper or foil for refrigerator storage and plan to use them at least within a week of purchase for best flavor and goodness. Although these meats are used more frequently as cold cuts, they are delicious in many cooked dishes, too. Try the following two

recipes in your spring luncheon menus.

THURINGER STRIPS AND NOODLES

(Yield: 6 servings) One-half pound Thuringer, 1 cup diced onion, 1/4 cup minced green pepper, 1/4 cup shortening, 1/2 pound noodles, 2 teaspoons salt, 4 cups water.

Cut Thuringer into thin strips. Brown Thuringer, onion and green pepper in hot fat. Add noodles. Fry to a golden brown Add salt and water. Cover. Simmer 25 minutes or until noodles are tender.

Covetousness Can Only Lead to Pain and Misery

WHAT is the definition of the word "Covetousness"?

Probably, we could define it as an inordinate desire to possess those things which rightfully belong to others

Covetousness has played a large part in the social and economic life of the world. This has been on a vast scale and has contributed far more to the injury of the human race than many of us realize.

But first let us look at the Ten Commandments and examine them carefully. It is apparent that they are carefully designed to establish sound ideals as a basis of community life. Based on a firm foundation of absolute faith in one spiritual God, they also established mutually safe, entirely fair restraints on the population living in a commu-

But it is important to note two

One is the way that Israel fell into decay and ruin through the failure to keep those commandments. The second is the way that weaknesses, evils and failures in our modern and complex societies are largely due to the failure to establish and practice these commandments.


The measure of our social disruption is largely the extent to which we have failed to recog-nize the principles which Moses saw were at the foundation of the common welfare.

The parable of the successful farmer is one which might offer a good example. He was typical so many men who are materially successful and yet are so apt to be forgetful of their obligations to God and their fellowmen.

How much better our lives would be if we tried to be "rich toward God" and if we could only discover the wealth of living that God intends for all of us.



Experts disagree on just how cold is too cold; but none advises painting at under 40 degrees, or varnishing under about 50 degrees and all agree that the ideal temperatures are somewhat higher. 

The red-throated loon has been suspected of feeding on fish eggs and it is known to make a large part of its diet of fish which it catches by diving and pursuit underwater. Because of these habits it has been considered as undesirable, but what would a summer be in the wilds of Canada or northern United States without the opportunity of listening to some loons "talk things over" on the other side of the lake in the middle of the night?

During migration the birds have a remarkably strong direct flight. If through accident or otherwise they happen to come to earth in migration, they probably will end their days where they come down since they cannot "take off" except from water. In New England the southern migration is about at its height in October. A poet has concisely described the overground migration of the bird as "the sure, swift flight of loons." Words would hardly improve this description. The nest is nothing but a mere

depression hidden on the bank of a lake or stream. Sometimes it is lined with finer grasses. It must be close to the shore because the birds are almost helpless on land. In the water they more than make up for this land handicap. There are usually 2 eggs, each about 3 inches long, highly variable in color and either spotted with drab brown or plain.

Both sexes take part in the 4 week incubation period and the downy chicks are dark gray above and drab. The young take to the water soon after they are hatched but they are guarded jealously by the parents who become greatly excited when any sign of danger is to be found. In spite of the noisy behavior of loons at some times, they may vanish from sight quickly wher they wish to do so

The National Wildlife Federation and similar conservation organizations are greatly interested in careful observations of all forms of wildlife about whose genuine value there may be any question. The red-throated loon would come under this heading unquestionably.

Hay Drying Wagon Now Proposed

Here's a new way to solve that perennial hay drying problem on Wisconsin dairy farms.

Some farmers in the state are now using portable wagon racks equipped to dry hay.

D. Bruhn, farm engineer at the University of Wisconsin, says the drying wagon may well be the answer to those rainy day blues in haying season.




