

The time to check the lengths is when you are selecting a girdle. Fasten the garter at the point where they fall when the foundation is adjusted to your figure, and always fasten the back garters first.

The garters should take hold right in the middle of the double welt of the stocking top. Fastened there, they will anchor the girdle at the thighs as well as hold the hose properly.

French Onion Soup

1/4 cup butter; 6 medium sized onions, sliced; 1 quart boiling water; 5 bouillion cubes; 6 slices French bread, toasted; 1/2 cup grated parmesan cheese.

Melt butter in large saucepan. Add onions and cook 10 minutes. Add boiling water in which bouillon cubes have been dissolved, cover, and cook over low heat until onions are tender. Pour soup in earthenware soup dish, place toast on top and sprinkle with cheese. Bake in moderately hot oven, 425 degrees, until cheese melts. If desired, one quart of brown stock may replace the water and bouillon cubes. Yield: Six servings.

Psalmists Realized God's Providence **Existed in Nature**

ONE cannot read the story of Jesus in the Gospel without realizing how essentially the divine ministry was of earth, as well as of heaven.
It was not in classrooms, nor

even in synagogues or temples, that the most distinctive teachings of Jesus were given. It was in the open, close to nature.

This was as it should have been in that time in the genial, outdoor atmosphere of that little land of Palestine. It was typical of the religion

in which Jesus had been brought up, and of the Scriptures that He knew so well. To the Hebrew writers the heavens declared the glory of God, and the firmament showed His handiwork. Psalm 19 spoke of a language

of nature, unspoken, without words, but that nevertheless was heard through all the earth, as day unto day uttered speech and night unto night showed knowl-

Two things were very real to the Psalmists and Prophets. One was the law of God and His providence in nature, the universe a manifestation of law and

The other was the law of God in the heart, the assurance of right and wrong in life and con-duct, and of man's highest attainment only when he lived in accordance with God's law of righteousness.

A superficial observer might say that ours is an age of the out-of-doors, full of travel, excursions, play, picnics and loafing. But how much of religion is there in it all?

It must be evident to any careobserver that the general public has strayed far from the essential Hebrew and Christian view of God and nature.

It is not the religion of the out-of-doors, but the irreligion of it, that mostly characterizes our modern way.

How much in this, as in other things, we need to learn from those who found a joy in God and a pleasure in His world, that few attain today!

Movable Shelf Units

NEAT, economical, movable shelf units are a boon in any home, where they may be used for various things such as storing toys, canned goods, laundry equipment, seldom-used kitchen utensils or other things.

Each unit may be any height. The number of shelves may vary according to their distance apart.



The usual width of a unit is three feet, and the shelf depth is 11%

inches. The accompanying illustration reveals the construction. Note the triangular pieces of Tempered Presdwood used at the back to brace each unit. The 3/16" thickness of this material is used as shelf surfaces because of its longwearing quality, its resistance to moisture and its hard, smooth surface which makes it easy to keep clean.

The shelves merely are laid in place without fasteners. They may be nailed down, of course, for a permanent installation. Either leave them unpainted or color them any attractive hue. Incidentally, Tempered Presdwood has no splinters, and that's a comfort when there are youngsters around.

NEW YORK - Every now and then we have to be reminded of Nature's continuing control over man. This year's long spell of warm, dry weather was such a

Enormous Sears Roebuck & Co., which sold nearly \$3 billion worth goods in fiscal 1952 through 688 stores, confesses that no amount of sales effort can offset weather n which mothers don't buy warm clothing for youngsters and hunters are forbidden to enter dry woods. RETIREMENT HOME BOOM-Retirement homes" have emerged in the postwar decade as a distinct type of dwelling, recog-nized by land dealers, builders, health authorities and manufacturers of building materials. Chief characteristics of such a home are greater use of materials easy to maintain, like clay tile in kitchens and bathrooms; ramps instead of stairways; storage space and windows designed to obviate the use of ladders; heating systems providing more warmth than usual.

The Tile Council of America predicts that this type of housing will gain momentum in the next few years as the result of several favoring factors:

There are more old people in the population. More of them have the wherewithal to buy homes suited to their needs. More of them have continuing incomes sufficient to finance their living alone instead of with some relative or in institutions. More oldsters are city people with no yearning to go back to the farm for their last days.



Pioneer Aviatrices French aviatrix Helene Dutrieu early served notice that achievements in heavier-than-air aviation were not to be held exclusively by men. The first woman to remain in the air for one hour, she was awarded the Coupe Femina trophy for her 40-mile flight over Paris on December 15, 1909. A year later she became the first woman to take up a passenger.

An American, Harriet Quimby created a sensation in 1912 by flying the English Channel, the most perilous flight yet attempted by a woman. Miss. Quimby, the first licensed woman pilot in the United States, flew from Deal, England, to Eiphen, France. She maneuvered her fragile monoplane through dense clouds at an altitude of 6,000 feet, guided only by a compass which she had never before used.

Unfortunately, like many of her fellow pioneers of the air, her career was a brief one. She died in a crash near her home in Boston three months later.

Amelia Earhart's exploits, prior to her fatal venture in 1937, placed her in the front rank of pilots, men or women. She was the first woman to fly the Atlantic in a plane (1928), and the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic (1932). She was the first person to fly solo from Hawaii to the U.S. mainland (1935).

For her solo flight across the Atlantic, Miss Earhart received the National Geographic Society's Special Gold Medal, never before awarded to a woman.

Copilot For Her Husband

Anne Morrow Lindbergh was the first woman to fly across the South Atlantic and to cross from America to Japan by air. On these journeys she served as copilot, navigator and radio operator for her husband. For her achievements, she became the first wo-





Temper Tantrums in Children

Have you ever seen a youngster put on a display of temper in "company", when Grandma is at the house, or in full view of the crowd at the Supermarket? The chances are good then that his mother will let him have what he's yelling for, to avoid a scene Perhaps too you may sometime have heard it said: "Of course you'd expect that boy to have a temper! You ought to see his Dad -I never saw anyone fly off the handle the way his old man does! But it is not true that temper is inherited. It's much more likely that temper is imitated. Tommy sees and hears his father vell and swear and push his weight around-and get away with it, Tommy's tantrums, we ought to suggest to Thomas Sr., that he watch out for his own displays of

Flavor Tricks for Fall Vegetables



The beauty of the harvest is never more apparent than at dinner tables laden with colorful fall vegetables . . . golden acorn squash, the regal eggplant and red cabbage, creamy white cauliflower and bright green broccoli. Each vegetable has its own distinctive flavor, but all taste better with a liberal topping of butter. The fresh-churned flavor is best preserved when butter is bought and kept in the paraffined carton, which protects its delicacy of taste. The carton is light-proof, odorproof, keeps butter safe from all off-flavors.

Bake acorn squash halves in a 400° oven for 45 to 60 minutes. Enhance the flavor by adding a tablespoon of butter and two to three teaspoons of sugar and cinnamon before baking. Most cartoned butter comes in quarter-pound sticks, which makes for easy measuring--since

each stick equals eight tablespoons or one half cup.

To keep the color of red cabbage bright, cook it with an apple or a tablespoon of vinegar. If you plan to pare eggplant in using it, do it the last minute so that the color will not bleed.
