Because they are finicky and selective about their food, geese are excellent at weeding crops. Hundrds of thousands of them tend cotton fields, nurseries and blueberry and strawberry patches from Texas to New Jersey.

Their employer's claim they eat crab grass, Bermuda grass and even saw-edged Johnson grass without ever touching the cotton plants, berries or young trees. For lawns, however, they are not recommended.

A farm goose is still a valuable bird when prowlers do not threaten and the harvest season is over. Feathers and down are marketable, and roast goose for Thanksgiving or Christmas rivals the turkey as an American table tradition.





The potentialities of physical therapy among psychiatric paients are immeasurable. Many psychoneurotics, particularly those suffering from various hysterical reactions during the Second World War, as well as many nervously-inclined individuals who frequently become incapacitated temporarily or permanently through accidents, profit markedly through physiotherapy. Often the morale of such individuals is greatly improved, also a quick return to more nearly normal living is effected economically and soci-

Especially during recent years, with the advance of electro-coma therapy, physical therapy has been widely used to alleviate stiffness and muscular soreness. Arthritis, paralyses, sprains and many other psychosomatic complaints typical of the mentally disturbed patient react favorably to physical therapy.

What with the current advancement in electronics in a highlymechanized age, it is essential that a physical therapist complete an intensive training period before he can become licensed to practice his profession in which such meticulous care is required. Even after graduation such a therapist must work only in conjunction with a physician and always according to the prescription of the latter.



## Lemon Angel Dessert

One cup sugar; 5 tablespoons cornstarch; 1/8 teaspoon salt; 11/2 cups boiling water; 3 egg yolks, beaten; 1/3 cup lemon juice; 1 tablespoon grated lemon peel; 1 angel or sponge cake.

Mix together sugar, cornstarch, salt and water, and cook until thick and smooth (6 to 10 minutes) stirring constantly. Remove from heat; stir in egg yolks, then return to heat and cook for six minutes. Remove from stove and add lemon juice and lemon peel. Cool. Cut cake into wedge shaped pieces; cut each piece in half to make two layers. Put filling between layers and on top of each piece. Garnish with lemon slices. The traffic gets slower. Finally it piles into a bumper to bumper jam. Most of the pleasure from your outing has been spoiled.

American sportsmen are among our most consistent auto travelers and road users. A Sports Afield survey shows that they average 14,940 miles of road travel a year as compared to a na tional average of 9,557.

Last year more than 31 million hunting and fishing licenses were sold. More than 41 million visited the national parks and monuments. Over 30 million visited the national forests last year. And uncounted millions drove to lakes and streams, went to state parks, and drove to the outdoor scene surrounding their communities.

The sesame to these outdoor treasures is roads. But our national highway system is woefully outmoded. It will take money to do something about it. According to Washington correspondent Michael Hudoba, the federal government now spends for highways and road work only about 25 per cent of the \$2 billion it collects annually through federal gasoline and excise taxes on vehicles. The balance goes into the general treasury fund for non-highway projects.

More of the money collected from various gasoline and auto use taxes must go for the purposes for which they were imposed-for better roads.

We can get America out of the traffic jam-if you will speak up for and urge a "better roads" campaign, and if you locally drive for the elimination of traffic bottlenecks. A nation that travels on wheels as much as ours does, deserves more and better roads.








#### **Behind The Scenes** In American Business By Reynolds Knight

New York-Though business indices show that industrial production continues to lag, and that inventories generally are still high at both the manufacturing and retail levels, scattered signs of a spring pick-up in business are definitely in the wind. The new optimism may only be a sign of spring itself, yet some new and favorable factors have come into the picture.

Market prices of high-grade, long-term corporate as well as government bonds are on the upgrade, and there are indications that an abundance of cash savings is seeking new investment. Too, onge-range financing plans that would improve facilities and produce new and improved products certainly reflect faith in the future. In fact, all of the recent surveys show that the nation's revitalized sales effort is backed by products and merchandise aimed at upping the standard of living.

BOOSTING HOME VALUES-Most if not all homes built in the U.S. five years from today will be equipped with year-round air conditioning, according to a survey conducted by the gas industry American Gas Association).

Interviewing families who'd had gas air conditioning equipment for a minimum of five years, the gas people found that the allyear air conditioned home has a substantially greater resale value than a comparable house without such equipment. In fact, 82 per cent of those queried reported that air conditioning had "subtantially" increased the value of their homes, while an additional 17 per cent said that a gas system had made their homes "somewhat more valuable.

The survey also revealed that year-round gas air conditioning makes for lower operating costs generally. Seventy-one per cent reported that walls and woodwork needed less cleaning; 90 per cent, that less time was needed for dusting; 70 per cent, that drapes, curtains, upholstery and rugs needed less frequent cleaning, and 31 per cent, that less redecoration work was needed.

THINGS TO COME-A new electrical gadget, attached to your TV antenna, diverts lightning from the lead-in wire and hence your home. . . The man "who couldn't punch his way out of a paper bag" has at last the chance of trying. The world's largest paper bag, recently developed for the textile, garden tool, rug and rubber hose trades, is really big enough for the battle: 18 by 19 by 167 inches, . . . Watch for the marketing of a super-concentrated (5 to 1) orange juice, in which the flavor is fortified by the addition of peel oil.

'UPKEEP' PLAN-Western European cooperation in building stronger defenses has just been demonstrated by the signing of an agreement to facilitate the maintenance of large numbers of T.S.-built airplanes serving in allied air forces.

The contract, providing for the repair and overhaul of Republic Thunderjet fighter-bombers flown by the Royal Netherlands Air Force, was negotiated between Republic Aviation International. S.A. (overseas subsidiary of the Long Island jet maker) and Industriemaatschappij Avio-Diepen N.V., a leading Dutch air company. The terms call for Republic's technicians to help the Dutch obtain special tools and equipment and to lend American technical "know-how" in maintaining their Thunder-jets and the new Thunderstreaks scheduled for delivery later this year. The Dutch are to reimburse Republic.

Mundy I. Peale, president of Republic and board chairman of RAI, says that he hopes the agreenent will lead to similar contracts in other areas, so that the NATO nations might undertake maintenance of the many Thunderjets which have been supplied to them during the past two and a half

ATOMS FOR IRON HORSE-A leading nuclear scientist has presented railroad men with their first complete blueprint for an atomic locomotive. In the wake of the atomic-submarine development, the atom-eating "iron horse" is viewed generally with both interest and optimism, although it would cost about twice as much to build as an equivalent diesel. Fuel savings, it is pointed out, would be its chief advantage.

The locomotive (160 feet long and with the power of 7,000 horses) would contain an atomic reactor fueled by enriched uranium. Heat from the reactor would generate steam, which would, in turn, generate electricity for operating




