Contributions in **Polio Drive Set** New High Record

DONATIONS EXCEED \$15,000; VILLAGE OF KEWASKUM COLLECTS TOTAL OF \$908

All but complete returns from the 1954 March of Dimes campaign in Washington county indicated this week that county residents had again contributed more generously than ever before, there. by making it possible for the local infantile paralysis chapter to establish an all-time high record in the amount of donations received. With the exception of the town of Kewaskum, where returns are not yet complete, contributions to this year's polio campaian amounted system of garbage disposal, More to \$15,511.83.

The results were announced this week by Michael J. Gonring, Jr., date. and Alan Pick, co-chairmen for the drive in the northern portion of the county, and Francis Jeffords of Fartford, drive chairman in the southern portion.

In issuing their report the chair men expressed their sincere gratitude to all who helped make this year's drive so successful, particularly the county residents who responded so generously to the request for donations and the various town, village and city chairmen and their assistants who voluntarity gave of their time and effort to contact individuals and organizations alike to assure a thorough coverage of the entire county.





Salmon Macaroni Casserole Is Inexpensive Meal

(Yield: 4 to 6 servings)

Four ounces elbow macaroni, 1 can condensed cream of asparagus soup, % cup evaporated milk, one 1-pound can salmon, drained and broken into pieces; 1/4 cup finely cut pimiento, 1 cup grated American cheese

Cook macaroni according to package directions. Drain, but do not rinse; reserve. Combine asparagus soup and evaporated milk. Add macaroni, salmon, pimiento and ½ cup of the grated cheese. Turn into a greased 11/2-quart casserole; sprinkle remaining

cheese around edge. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 25 minutes. If desired, garnish with additional pimiento. Here's another delicious and budget-wise meatless dish, using

Curried Fish With Parsleyed Rice and Peas (Yield: 6 servings)


The deepest and most fundamental evil in relation to the highest character and ideals in those times was the sin of setting individual interest against the rights and welfare of all.

To remove the odor of fish from your dishes, wash them in a strong solution of salt and hot wa ter. Don't use soap.

The department says you can prevent the odor of fish on your hands if you chill your hands thoroughly in cold water before you handle the fish.

Educators agree that the most neglected meal of the day is breakfast. Many reasons given for either skipping or skimping on breakfast reflect parental attitudes or situations controlled by parents, such as: The mother works, parents do not get up in the morning, parents do not insist on proper diet and lack adequate dietary knowledge.

Also usable is a 40% sirup, three and one-fourth cups of sugar to four cups of water. These quantities make enough sirup for about four quarts of fruit, allowing one cup sirup per quart package.

"Although the authorities told us that they found nothing wrong with an estimated 99 out of 100 hogs, we were amazed at the extent of the garbage-feeding industry. One survey of 927 cities

turned up 294 which admitted that feeding to hogs was one of their regular methods of refuse disposal. Indiana officials estimated that their state had 450 garbage ranches. New Jersey officials reported that 28,000,000 out of the 35,000,000 pounds of Jersey pork marketed annually came from garbage-fed hogs. California officials declared that one-third of all hogs raised in that state were garbage-fed. The U. S. Department of Agriculture

said, 'Nearly every city or town has at least one garbage-feeding premise near by.

"The disease which most directly threatens humans who eat raw-garbage-fed pork is trichinosis, a sometimes serious and occasionally fatal illness caused by a tiny round worm known to scientists as Trichinella spiralis. Humans get trichinosis by eating undercooked pork which contains immature garbage worms, known as larvae. It is a widespread disease among both hogs and men in the United States and figures indicate, according to Dr. Norman R. Stoll of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research, that 'we have in this country more than three times as much trichinosis as is known in all the rest of the world put together.' "Although all these facts have been known for a long time, local graft and corruption have blocked most efforts to do anything constructive about preventing trichinosis through a cleanup of the garbage ranches. However, a drastic change took place last year when hog-farmers,





In the superstitions of many peoples the dog figures as both associated have been superstiti- or good omen. Many believed a demon and a protective power that the blood of a dog placed under the threshold was a sure guard against intrusion of evil spirits. And today in sections of

the rural South you see many bob-tailed mongrels around the homes of some farmers. The belief still exists among them that if a dog's tail is cropped and the amputated piece buried under the steps of the house, that dog will never run away.

Several of our Indian tribes believed that they could transfer the courage and bravery of the dog to themselves if they ate dog flesh before entering battle. This idea doesn't seem so farfetched when you consider that Henry P. Davis, sporting dog editor of Sports Afield magazine, has been asked by numerous educated and cultured sportsmen of today if they could cure their dogs of gun-shyness by feeding them gunpowder!

Perhaps the superstition that has the widest range in modern society is the belief that the howling of a dog is a herald of death. There are a number of versions of this persistant belief: Two howls by a dog mean a man will die, three howls mean a woman's life; dogs howl when the Angel of Death goes by; dogs see coffins in the air when they howl; a corpse will come from the direction a dog faces when he howls. This is pure superstition of course, yet I have seen brave men shudder at the eerie sound. I don't particularly like

it either. A dog's howl may be caused by a number of things. Canine ears are quite sensitive and highpitched sounds often bring an immediate baying. Unfortunately for the sportsman, it is often quite difficult to break a dog of the urge to howl.

Circumstances lend support to the theory the Lundy robin had spanned the ocean under its own power. It is 2,800 miles from Newfoundland to Lundy by a down wind route that existed on the days the robin probably flew. Such a trip is considered within the capability of a robin-sized bird. Wind speed was 35 m.p.h. and, added to the robin's own speed of 35 m.p.h., this meant the winged wanderer could have arrived in about 40 hours.

The flight appears "very plausible" to Dr. Herbert D. Deignan, associate curator of birds at the Smithsonian Institution.

It could have been a voung bird, hatched in summer and migrating for the first time, he says. Birds chirp while flying to guide their young. The Lundy robin may have lost its com panions, and thus became confused.

What makes birds migrate and exactly what steers them are hidden in mystery. But malfunctioning of the bird's directionfinding senses may explain the wrong-way journey.







Bird Owners Warned

Against Psittacosis Parakeets are now the most popular of all bird pets and their popularity has prompted issuing of a warning about a serious disease sometimes carried by parakeets and other birds to their owners.

The disease is psittacosis. It is a severe and sometimes fatal respiratory infection and it gets its name because most human cases have been traced to members of the parrot family, perhaps because parrots and parakeets are most likely to be in close association with human beings.

An epidemic of the disease about 20 years ago in the United States caused stringent restrictions to be placed on importing any birds of the parrot family. But controls have been relaxed recently, the bulletin points out, and the result has been a rapid creation of new sources of birds from unknown stock. Also illegitimate peddlers have appeared offering birds for quick sale, uninspected and sometimes infected. Five states in this general area have reported an increase in hu-

man psittacosis, recently, and this is what the doctors advise to help keep human psittacosis in control, here.

First: Never buy a parakeet from anybody but a reliable dealer of inspected birds since most of the identified cases seem to stem from unscrupulous dealers of illegally acquired birds.

Second: Have your birds tested periodically because apparently normal birds are capable of spreading infection. Third: Never allow a parakeet

to kiss you or take food from your mouth. In several cases the illness was clearly acquired that way. Fortunately, treatment with some of the new antibiotics has removed some of the fear assoclated with the disease and, though the number of cases has increased, the mortality rate has diminished. Nevertheless, it is a serious illness and every parakeet owner should be aware of the danger and of the measures needd to keep it in control.




