Strokes More Frequent In U.S.

Deaths resulting from strokes have steadily been increasing in lio vaccine. School children by surprising figures show that disease except heart disease and cancer. The death toll from

strokes has thus jumped from seventh to third place in the USA. Strokes today kill ten out of every hundred who pass away

and some four times that number suffer some physical damage because of a stroke. Your chances of having a stroke increase sharply after you pass the age of forty. But you can do much to pre-

vent a stroke, later in life, even if you are not yet forty. If you are that old or older, it is even more important to do what you can to help ward off a cerebrovascular accident-that's what doctors call strokes.

What can you do? The best simple advice is as follows: 1. Have a thorough physical examination regularly, which includes a check of your blood vessels your blood pressure and your heart. High blood pressure is the most common warning sign of an impending stroke. 2. To avoid high blood pressure

keep your weight down and avoid strain. 3. Watch out for the following symptoms: aches in the back of the head and neck, dizziness and fainting, nerve trouble, nosebleed and hemorrhages in the retina of the eye. These symp-toms, and high blood pressure, are extremely serious.

If a neighbor or loved one suffers a stroke, the best thing you can do for him, or her, is to summon medical attention, if quickly available, and you may raise the head of the victim slightly to prevent pressure on the brain. A stroke, after all, is nothing but one of three things. It is either a blood clot in the brain, a stoppage of blood for various reasons in a brain artery or blood vessel, or a rupture of a blood vessel or artery in the brain.

All are serious, and since they are becoming increasingly frequent, it would be wise to have a physical examination as described above, regularly, and look out for the usual warning symptoms.







In the Spring a young man's ancy strongly turns to thoughts of fishing and it is quite probable that in many cases his interest in fishing extends over a greater portion of his lifetime than do ight thoughts of love so ably publicized by Locksley Hall half century ago.

Fishermen may not only be livided on the basis of their veracity but on the goals they seek. Some wish to get freedom from confining influences while others really want to fish. Of those who want to fish there are those who seek unusually large, aggressive or coy animals, and those who just want the fun of fighting omething on the end of a line. It is this last group who only want something that tastes, smells and acts like a fish that our crappies seem to have been created to please. They are comnon. They are vigorous fighters. They are good eating. They can be found where superior fishes could not survive. They reproduce abundantly, permitting a generous surplus harvest and they are not too choosy as to bait, tackle or skill. They seem to be willing to match their wits with anything that comes along even remotely resembling a fisherman. All this adds to their popularity with those who seek food, fun and freedom through fishing.

The Black Crappie Pomoxis nigro-maculatus is darker than the White Crappie P. annularis. Either may reach a length of about 1 foot. The Black Crappie normally has 7 or 8 spines in the front fin on the back while the White Crappie has 5 or 6 such spines. 

Shade Trees **Need Feeding**

Shade trees growing under conditions where leaves, grass clippings and other natural litter are removed require artificial feeding if they are to be kept in healthy, vigorous condition, says the National Arborist Asociation. Neglected trees usually reach a state of semi or complete starvation even though they may appear normal to the casual observer.

Use a fertilizer containing nitrogen, phosphorus and potash. A good fertilizer should contain from 6 to 10 per cent soluble nitrogen. Three to five pounds for each inch of trunk diameter at breast height should be applied to the whole root area, reducing this amount by the proportion of

Flower show judges rate ar angements according to certain established rules. This makes both the judging and the arranging much easier. In either case all one has to do is study the established rules.

There are two sorts of rules The first concerns the technique and control of material used in an arrangement. The second has to do with imagination and beauty of design.

The first is important because it would be of no use to have good taste and imagination, if you could not control the plants and naterials to be used. When studying the various

rules of flower arranging, there are always a few people who, in their effort to create something dramatic or different, go in for technical facility so strongly that their results are always stylized and too studied. This is a fault that is all too common.

The first rule for good arrange ment is to be sure that holders and such do not show. This does not apply to decorative holders or rocks.

When entering an arrangemen in a show, there is a rule which prohibits artificial coloring unless the schedule states that it may be used. Also, avoid the use of any material on the state conservation list.



Distance between the holes should be 18 inches to 2 feet, and they should be bored uniformly over the root system. Soil augurs are the most efficient tools for the purpose. The advantage of compressed air equipment is that it loosens, aerates and fertilizes all in one operation. Completely soluble fertilizer is advantageous in some cases, being applied with a power sprayer and special soil nozzle


