Auto Accidents Over Week End

Seven persons suffered injuries, one serious, as a result of three auto crashes over the week end in this vicinity.

Fred Dennull, 53, Milwaukee, was the most seriously hurt, suffering a fractured skull and other minor injuries. He was removed to SL Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the Kewaskum firemen's ambureceived minor injuries. Dennull's auto struck a light pole on Highway 45 in the town of Auburn one and one-quarter miles No. of the Fond du Lac County line in front of the Wallace Krueger farm at 6:15 p. m. Friday. The mishap occurred while the driver apparently was passing a semitrailer truck which had started to pass another vehicle.

Officers who investigated said that all vehicles involved were go

ing north on Highway 45 at the time, Murel A. Mott, Neillsville driver of the truck, told the officers he had started to pass a car operated by Mrs. Lorina Petermann Campbellsport route, after first taking a look in his rear view mirror. When he did so, he said he saw only a beer truck behind him.



Paint Your Home With Fragrance

RRINGING a garden indoors during the summer isn't always possible in the literal sense. Maybe you haven't a garden or, perhaps, you're the kind of woman who'd rather leave the blooms adorning the yard.

In that case, try painting either one scent or the fragrance of an entire bouquet into your house. It's easily done with scented lacquer, which can be used on any unpainted or unvarnished wooden surface.

A little goes a long way. You may use the lacquer inside bureau drawers, underneath closet shelves or beneath tables and window sills. These strips can be washed off and a new scent substituted whenever you like. But meantime, the perfume will last for weeks, depending on the size of the area you've cov-

Help Your Child Overcome Shyness

Does your child withdraw from the group and stand by while others play? His shyness may be only temporary strangeness, but if it persists, there may be deeper reasons, says child expert Irma Simonton Black. In Redbook for June, she tells you how to help your youngster be at ease with his playmates:

"Four-year-old Timmy sat alone in a little corner of the play yard. No one paid much attention to him, because he didn't do anything that made trouble. He didn't hit or tease his playmates. He just had no contact with them at all. Yet Timmy needed adult help and understanding every bit as much as Danny, who was always fight-

ing. "Why does a child retreat from human contact at such an early age? Perhaps it is simply a lack of social experience. If this is the case, your child may sit in a corner for his first week in a new group, but he will probably be in the thick of things as soon as the strangeness wears off.

"But if he persists in his voluntary loneliness, there may be deeper reasons. Is he an older child who feels that the baby has taken too much of your love and attention? Do you expect too much of him? Overly strict discipline, or too many threats, may also create a climate of fear which makes your child withdraw

into himself to avoid trouble. "What can you do to bring youngster? Here are some sug-

Jesus Appears To Humanity In Two Aspects

JESUS in the Gospel narrative appears in two characters, or aspects, that to the undiscerning eye might seem different. Nevertheless, both express His

teaching concerning honesty and justice, sincerity and love.

We see Him as the compas-sionate Savior and friend-dealing gently with sinful men and women, commending a good Samaritan, weeping with those who wept, blessing little children—a Savior looking upon the multi-tude as sheep without a shepherd

Then, in another aspect, we see Him as the implacable, in-dignant Christ, driving the money-changers from the Temple.

And when we turn to Matthew, we read in His words the most terrible indictment of evil men ever spoken; spoken even against those who considered themselves the officially religious of their day.

Surely sterner words have never been spoken than in that succession of "Woes"!

It is easy to reconcile these words with the gentleness and compassion that the Master showed toward other sinners, for these Temple sinners sinned against the humanity and compassion of the Master's gospel of love. They sinned against their fellow men, as well as against God.

It might be said that Jesus was compassionate toward sins of the flesh, but completely denuncia-

MASHED AVOCADO

Whenever a recipe calls for tion. both mashed avocado and lemon juice it's a good idea to add the lemon juice to the avocado as you mash it. This keeps the avocado from darkening. Be sure to select an avocado that is soft if you want it to mash easily and have excellent flavor.

CREOLE STEAK

1 large flank steak; salt; pep per; fat; 1 cup tomato sauce; 1/2 cup water; 1/4 cup finely cut green sweet pepper: 1 cup finely cut celery; 1/4 cup minced onion; 1 cup ripe olives. Score steak with diagonal cuts. Cut into servings. Season with salt and pepper and brown in fat on both sides. Add tomato sauce, water, green pepper, celery, onion and one-half teaspoon salt. Cover and simmer until tender, about one and one half hours, adding more water if necessary. Cut olives into large pieces. Add to steak and sauce and heat thoroughly. Serves six.


A topping of chopped nuts varles the serving of canned green beans. Melt two tablespoons but ter in a small skillet, add two tablespoons chopped brazil nuts and an equal amount of bread crumbs are browned and sprinkle over heated vegetable.

Drain and add to a well seasoned cream sauce, turn into a casserole, top with buttered crumbs and brown in a hot oven or under the broiler. You can keep a thick skin from forming on the top of cooked packaged puddings by sprinkling a thin layer of sugar over the top while the pudding is still hot.

Ever dice avocado and mix it with cut up fruit for a dessert? Dress it with a combination of orange or pineapple juice, honey and lemon juice.

When preparing lemon, lime or orange rind, use the grater lightly so you include only the outermost colored part of the rind; then the grated rind won't be bitter.
