

### India "Wolf-Boy" **Being Observed**

From faraway India comes anther story of a "wolf-boy." Medical authorities in Lucknow have recently been carefully observing a growling, nine-year-old, who walks on all fours and who likes only raw meat.

He was found in January, and doctors have diagnosed him as definitely human, although they believe he was apparently reared by animals. He is being given cooked meat, and other prepared food, although he still prefers raw meat and is reportedly not doing well in a heated room, on cooked food. Occasionally, he tries to bite attendants.

It is pretty well established that the boy was reared by animals of some kind, since he has developed a double set of upper jaw incisors, which are used to gnaw bones. A wire report from India says that there have been perhaps as many as forty such cases, or similar cases, through-out the history of India. This is not the first case, by any means, but is the latest.

The effort to rehabilitate this youth, or sell him the civilized way of life, will be interesting to watch. No doubt this wolf-boy may become as well known as any of the famous freaks of recent decades. While we hope that Indian doctors succeed in teaching this youngster to walk, and to accept our civilization, perhaps the wolf boy knows more than his so-called civilized friends.





### SODA-SWEET TEA MAKER



By making iced tea in an open saucepan you can make large quantities to have on hand when guests drop in or the family wants a tall cool refreshing thirst quencher. But tea has a habit of picking up odors from soap and other foods. To be assured a prefect brew, clean your saucepan with a baking soda solution. Soda whisks away the greasy film which clings to pots and pitchers, harbours odors. Just wash tea utensils in a solution of 3 tablespoons soda to a quart of water. For stubborn stains rub a little dry baking soda on the spot with a damp cloth or sponge. Gentle soda sweetens and cleans, leaves your iced tea utensils spar-kling bright.

And here are some tips on making perfect iced tea. Number one requisite is to have all utensils super clean. Wash with a solution of baking soda and water—three tablespoons soda to each quart of water.—Baking soda eliminates possibilities of any "off odors." If you make iced tea in a saucepan you can make large quantities and keep it for an afternoon and evening refresher. Premeasure 5 tablespoons loose tea or 15 tea bags. Bring 2 quarts fresh cold water to a full rolling boil in a saucepan. Remove from Aluminum paint is commonly heat, and immediately add tea. and strain into pitcher. Cool at room temperature. Shoulder pads or shapes vary according to current fashions. Often they are not obvious, but they can be used to improve the fit of a garment or give a younger look to the shoulders.

Choose shoulder pads that are the size and shape best suited to your shoulders and the garment you are making. Very thin, very soft pads, or none at all are used by women with square shoulders. Women whose shoulders are sloping can improve their appearance greatly by inserting heavier shoulder pads into their dresses and suits.

If one shoulder is higher than the other, use only one shoulder pad to make them look even. Often slight pads used in the front of a suit or dress give a rounder, fuller look

Concentrate your fashion interest where it best becomes you when you choose your silhouette for fall says Betty Ann. Complete escape from the waist cincher is promised by the middy but it demands a flat hipline and a fairly tall figure. Whether you choose a middy suit or dress with a big or little collar, the wide shoulder and narrow hip are the proportions demanded. While shoulders are a trifle squarer and a little padded, they do not conspicuously improve on natural structure.

Coat dresses and suits of dressy character may fit the waistline above a straight or flared skirt. In either case the fitting is less strenuous than last season.

Models slide in and out of all the sample sizes without getting their cinchers out of their leather duffel bags or straw baskets. They like the idea of easing in and out of clothes and so will we.

#### TROPICAL CHEESE SALAD

1 package strawberry gelatin 1 cup boiling water; 1 cup cold water; I package lemon gelatin; 1 No. 1 can peach halves; 1 No. 1 can pineapple chunks; 2 cups cottage cheese; salad greens. Dissolve strawberry gelatin in boiling water, then add cold water Pour half of mixture into a lightly buttered one and one-half quart mold and refrigerate. Bread pan works well. Keep remaining gelatin at room temperature. Drain liquid from canned fruit. Add enough water to make two cups liquid. Bring one-half cup of this liquid to boiling point. Add lemon gelatin and dissolve. Add remaining fruit juice and cool. Stir in the one and one-half cups cottage cheese and most of the pineapple. Pour onto firm strawberry gelatin in mold. When set, cover with rest of strawberry gelatin and chill. Unmold on bed of greens and garnish with halves of peaches, filled with remaining cottage cheese and reserved pine apple chunks. Serves 12.

White and gold salad ring is a three layered salad with two clear peach layers and cottage cheese between.

Serve antipasto as a first course when you are having spaghetti and meat balls and you can omit salad. Include celery, anchovies, canned pimientos, green pepper and sardines in your antipasto and arrange the vegetables and fish on individual plates.

### Old-Time Molasses Cookies Taste Just as Good Today

#### BY DOROTHY MADDOX

REMEMBER those soft molasses cookies we used to enjoy when we were children? I still love them. So do a lot of other people. Maybe you do, too. So here's a recipe:

#### Soft Molasses Cookies (Yield: 4 dozen cookies)

One cup shortening, 11/2 cups unsulphured molasse., 1/4 cup sugar, 4 cups sifted, all-purpose flour; 11/2 teaspoons salt, 2 teaspoons soda, 2 teaspoons cinnamon, 11/2 teaspoons ginger, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1 egg.

Melt shortening in saucepan large enough for mixing cookies. Stir in molasses and sugar; cool.

Sift together flour, salt, soda, cinnamon, ginger and cloves. Mix in small amount of flour; beat in egg. Add remaining flour, blending until smooth. Chill dough about 2 hours.

Shape into 1¼-inch balls. Place on cookie sheets about 2 inches apart to allow cookies to spread during baking. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 15 minutes. While warm, spread half the cookies with confectioner's sugar glaze. Store in closely covered

Here's another cookie with a delicate molasses flavor.

#### Butter-Molasses Thinsies (Yield: 18 dozen)

Four cups sifted, all-purpose flour; 1% cups sugar, 1% cups butter or margarine, % cup unsulphured molasses, 1 whole egg, plus 1 egg yolk; ¼ cup sugar (optional), 1 teaspoon cinnamon

Sift together flour and sugar. Cut in butter with pastry blende until mixture resembles coarse meal. Combine molasses and eggs; stir into flour-butter mixture. Chill dough overnight.

Roll out on pastry cloth sprinkled with confectioner's sugar to 1/16-inch thickness. Cut with cookie cutters; place on cookie

sheets. (If desired, mix sugar and cinnamon; sprinkle lightly over unbaked cookies.)

Bake in a moderately hot oven (400 degrees F.) 5 to 6 minutes, or until edges have lightly browned.

Cool. Store in tightly covered container.

Note. To make cookies without chilling, form dough into small balls, using ½ teaspoon of the dough. Place on cookie sheets, flatten cookies to 1/16-inch thick with bottom of glass covered with damp cloth. Dip bottom of glass in water when cloth sticks to dough.

### Factual News **About The Eyes**

In the recently produced film entitled "The Unconquered," Helen Keller translates that word into poignant terms of her own life's story, says the Better Vission Institute. This woman who ranks among the truly great of today is shown rising above the handicaps of blindness, deafness, and dumbness and devoting herself to the valiant task of helping other handicapped people.

It was back in 1940 that Nancy Hamilton first met Miss Keller and her constant companion, Polly Thomson, at Katharine Cornell's home in Martha's Vineyard. Miss Hamilton immediately conceived the idea of making a film on Helen Keller's life, but not until some time later did she actually set the project in motion, with Katharine Cornell as volunteer for the post of narrator.


The task was not an easy one. Miss Keller's memorabilia were destroyed in a fire which burned her Connecticut house to the ground. It took months of searching to find-in the Library of Congress-a print of the Hollywood film in which she had formerly starred. #### America Is Nation Of Many Churches

America, its destiny always linked closely to the faith of its people, stands today more than ever a nation of churches, old and new.

Religious shrines mark off the broad course of its history-from Old Virginia's rustic parish churches and New England's venerable meeting-houses to San Miguel in Santa Fe, N. M., still lifting its scarred walls despite more than three centuries of fire, strife, earthquake and the slow wear of time.

The United States also looks to the future through its churches and synagogues, says the National Geographic Society. Church construction is booming. This year churches are going up at a record \$500,000,000 rate. Most in Virginia

Most churches antedating 1709 and still standing, at least in part, are found in Virginia. Some also survive in Pennsylvania, Mary and, a few other eastern states and at least two in New Mexico.

The oldest is probably San Miguel. Its history reaches back to the early 17th century, possibly further. Time has altered its countenance. Five foot walls renain, but its roof has been replaced and its storm-wrecked tower remodeled.

Far East cities like Tokyo. miles an hour, and passenger liners can speed up their ground speed considerably by flying inside them. Pan American officials reveal that PAA airliners, heading for Hawaii from Japan, often get in the air stream which passes over Midway and fly with it to that island outpost.

This speeds up the Tokyo-Honlulu run by seven hours and enables the PAA airliner to make the run non-stop, even though it veers away from the jet stream after arriving over Midway. The airliner would take advantage of North Pacific jet streams to initiate Tokyo-West Coast non-stop flights over the Pacific.

The PAA request opens up new horizons in the aviation world, for jet streams are not common only over the Pacific, but in most areas of the world. The opportunity is one to speed up travel without adding to fuel or operation costs. Because the flight would require less time, the operation cost could actually be reduced on such flights. Jet airliners, operating in jet streams to speed up already fast schedules, might be the eventual outcome of evolutionary progress now being made in aviation cir-

#### **Behind The Scenes** In American Business By Reynolds Knight

Industrially, this month and next constitute the traditional summer lull. The customer is vacationing. More and more industrial plants are adopting the midsummer en masse vacation idea for their staffs. Coal miners are having their two weeks off now. Makers of goods that are sold by annual models-that includes automobiles and many appliances -are clearing their showrooms and tooling up for late-fall introduction of next year's wares.

Therefore, August would be a good month for economic prophets to take a holiday, too. Until after after Labor Day the forecasts that the recession is behind us cannot be definitely tested although they seem now to be well founded).

Examples: Farm machinery production is down; is it summer lull, or reflection of further decline in farm income? Steel scrap prices weaken: seasonal, or evidence that the coming rise in steel prices will curtail buying? Work weeks are longer, but new hirings are few. If industry generally expected an uprush of sales,

wouldn't it be hiring new hands? By October, we shall have some answers to go with our questions.




