Few Changes Seen

Lorna Doone fanciers visiting the modern park can see for themselves the purple, hill-framed moors, the wooded valleys and rocky glens just as Blackmore described them.

Only Doone Valley, hideout of the titled Doone outlaws who relieved lonely wayfarers of purse and goods, seems less weird and remote than pictured by the author. The valley lies off Badgworthy Water, the stream that adds its force, as Blackmore noted long ago, to the turbulence of the








Mister Fixum's Handy Hints





The most satisfactory method of closing the coal chute would be to remove it, and fill the opening with brick or cement blocks to match the rest of the foundation and outside covering. But since this is the wrong time of year for the job, I have drawn Booklets No. 1, 2 and 3 availup plans for another method.

Make a lid to cover the opening on the inside of the basement. The lid should be tight on all sides.

Cover the back side of the lid with mineral wool blanket insulation. The vapor sealed side should be toward the inside of the basement (the warm side).

In order for the lid to keep out the cold air, it will have to be drawn up tightly against the coal chute frame. Two bolts, about three inches

long, may be inserted through holes drilled in both coal chute frame and lid, as illustrated.

By using screws or bolts, the lid may be used in basements using coal for fuel. The lid could



Deviled Ham Puts Spice and Zip in New Gelatin Salads

EVER try using canned deviled ham in molded gelatin salads? Do try it sometime, and you'll be delighted with the novel

Here are two brand-new recipes. All our family enjoyed them, and we hope you will, too.

> Red Devil Gelatin Mold (Makes 6 servings)

One package lime or lemon gelatin dessert, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/8 teaspoon pepper, 2 tablespoons regular or wine vinegar, 1 tablespoon horseradish, 1 family size (4½-oz.) can deviled ham, ½ cup diced celery, 4 hard-cooked eggs.

Prepare gelatin as directed on package and stir in seasonings. Chill. When nearly thickened, stir in deviled ham, celery and 2 chopped eggs. Cut remaining 2 eggs in slices and arrange in oiled mold. Spoon in gelatin so that egg-slice design is not disturbed. Fill mold and chill in refrigerator until firm. To serve, unmold on large plate and garnish with carrot curls, radish roses and slices of lemon.

> Deviled Cottage Layer Mold (Makes 6 to 8 servings)

One package lime or lemon gelatin dessert, I tablespoon minced onion, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons lemon juice, pinch black pepper, 1 8-oz. container cottage cheese, 1 family size (4½-oz.) deviled ham, 4 radishes, sliced, 1 small green pepper, diced.

Prepare gelatin as directed on package. Stir in seasonings and chill until nearly thickened. Spoon layer of seasoned gelatin mixture in bottom of ring mold and let set until firm. Mix together cottage cheese, deviled ham and cut-up vegetables. Spread on layer of set gelatin. Pat cheese-ham mixture down to make it smooth and even, then spoon on remaining gelatin mixture to make a third layer. Chill in refrigerator until firm. To serve, unmold on large plate and fill center with mixed salad greens, dressing or

If summer's heat oppresses, consider for a moment the daily change of temperature on the planet Mars.

At noon, certain green-colored areas on Mars bake at more than 85 degrees Fahrenheit, scientific measurements from the earth have shown. By twilight, however, temperatures drop to about 10 degrees, and by midnight, go far below zero.

Yes, public health has taken to the silver screen in a big way. Because they appeal to both the eye and the ear sound movies have been found to be one of the best ways to present health facts to people. Good health, more so oday than ever before, is a personal matter, and motion pictures are most effective in getting these facts before people so that they may incorporate them in their daily living.

Prints of various health films are shown each year to many audiences. Schools, church groups, PTAs, service clubs, and youth groups are among the thousands of organizations using these visual aids-the only cost to the borrower being the transportation charges.

The fims cover a remarkable range of subjects, directly or indirectly connected with human health. Many were produced by such well known companies as R.K.O., Coronet Films, and Encyclopedia Britannica; directed by men of the caliber of Walt Disney and Eddie Alberts; and feature some of the top names of screen and radio. True, these films may not all have the plot of a Hollywood thriller, but they certainly are not lacking in audience appeal. Most of them are in sound, many of them in color, and from 12 to 30 minutes in length.



But while the customer basks in mild self-congratulation, he still may find it difficult to figure exactly what did happen. The story is an intricate one:

For some months now, Brazil has been pegging the price of coffee at 87 cents a pound at dockside. More recently Colombia has been sniping at Brazil's big U. S. market with discounts of 2 to 4 cents a pound on competing

Two weeks ago the Brazilians decided to do something about this. Coffee yields three-fourths of Brazil's foreign exchange, and it can't do so sitting in a Santos warehouse. However, the coffee price peg is as popular as high support prices in the United States, so any price cut had to be subtle.

Fortunately there was a gimmick at hand. While the official price of the Brazilian cruzeiro is 18 to the dollar, plenty of Brazilians would rather have one dollar than 60 cruzeiros. The Bank of Brazil relaxed its rules, let more of this free exchange be used to buy coffee. The grower still got the same number of cruzeiros, but they cost the buyer much less than 87 cents.

Colombian growers are rushing their coffee into the government pool at the older price-now above Brazil's-so it seems they expect a price cut too.

ATOMS GO TO SCHOOL-More than 50 colleges and universities across the nation now have cyclotrons-"atom smashers"-to help their students delve into the mysteries of the atom. One college, North Carolina State, even has an atomic furnace.

Even before the passage of the act which opens atomic development to private firms, hopes for ted many young physicists and engineers into the atomic energy

George M. Muschamp, maker of many of the measuring and controlling devices which monitor these college-based cyclotrons and the Carolina reactor, made a study of the uses to which atomic research is being put. So far it runs into the hundreds, ranging from preserving food for long periods to tracting disease-caused nanges in human bodies.

THINGS TO COME-Meant for the milder winters we've been having, a lightweight snowsuit is made of nylon with Dacron insulation . . . Shopping cart sets, a real one for Mother and a toy one for daughter, come with dummy packages in the junior carrier . . . A new necktie, called the Cape Codder, is trimmed with real fishing flies . . . A six-inch plastic scale model of the White House will be offered the Christmas toy trade . . . A portable pocket-sized lock can be purchased to fasten hotel or motel closets, bureau drawers and other places the traveler might want secure.

FREIGHT RATES FALL-Eastern railroads have received approval of the Interstate Commerce Commission for their first over-all reduction of less-thancarload-lot freight rates since World War II. The reductions apply to the whole Eastern territory, and affect all shipments

weighing more than 5,000 pounds. This class of freight, designated LCL, calls for an extra handling; it must be assembled and placed in cars in a central shipping point, rather than loaded at the shipper's own siding. Rising costs of labor have been making this procedure more expensive to the shipper than using trucks for the whole trip, and the reduction apparently signalizes the rails' determination to put up a real fight to hold onto their share of that business.

Followers of railroad affairs take this move to be an indication that the roads have embarked on a policy of pricing their services according to the competitive market and customers' preferences, rather than on old yardsticks of cost-of-service.

BITS O' BUSINESS - New York department store sales in the four weeks ended August 21 were the same as last year's . . . Paperboard production is running at 91 percent of capacity. Last year it was 98 percent . . . Business failures in the August 19 week rose to 246 from 233 the week before, says Dun & Bradstreet.








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
