The Law and You

HOW TO SIGN YOUR NAME TO LEGAL DOCUMENTS

Should a married woman sign important documents with her own given name or use her husband's first name? Is "junior" or "senior" legally part of your name? Should you sign your middle name or initial? Is Mr. or Mrs. part of a legal signature?

Lawyers find that people are often at a loss to know how to sign their names to legal documents. While signature discrepancies ultimately may be straightened out, the process can be expensive.

The law defines a name as a word or words used to distinguish and identify a person. Under common law, since very early times, a legal name has consisted of one Christian or given name, and one surname which is the family name. The law presumes every man to have a given name, unless the contrary is shown, and it must be stated in full on legal documents. For this reason, the law does not pay too much attention to the middle name or initial. However, it is wise to use the middle name or initial since it may be important for purposes of identification. There is a growing tendency to give more importance to the middle name and in a few jurisdictions it is held to be a material part of the name in civil as well as criminal actions.

Married women seem to have considerable difficulty with their signatures. When a girl marries she, of course, takes her husband's surname. But usually she doesn't stop there—she uses his full name as her own, incorrectly signing herself Mrs. James E. Brown. The correct way is to sign with her own given name, as Mary L. Brown. Important legal papers signed Mrs. James E. Brown may mean that the attorney will have to prove that Mrs. James E. is the same person as Mary L., and this can be quite an expensive and time-consuming chore.

Perversely enough, other married women feel that their maiden surname is still legal and continue to use it. For instance, such a woman may register her automobile in her maiden name instead of her married name. This is not in compliance with the law requiring a car to be registered in the name of the owner. Her maiden surname is gone for good, unless she is divorced and wants to resume the use of her maiden name. Then it may be returned to her by a court order, under some circumstances.

Chicken Pox Often Followed by Shingles In Grown-ups

Among children's diseases that may have a painful significance for adults in the family, the Minnesota State Medical Association chalks up chicken pox as one of the most outstanding and undesirable.

Children usually emerge from attacks of chicken pox unscathed and about as good as new except for an occasional pock mark. Grownups exposed to the same

infection may come up with a painful attack of a disease known as "shingles" or herpes zoster, an infection of the nerves which few people ever connect with a relatively minor epidemic of chicken pox in the family. There is a connection, though, the doctors believe, because the presence of both in one family or among intimates of one family happens too often to be dismissed as accidental.

Both are virus infections, the doctors' bulletin points out, but shingles appears more often as an adult form of the disease and it attacks the sensory nerves which branch out from the ganglia, or nerve sub-stations. Sometimes the infection sets up an inflammatory reaction in the ganglia, themselves, sometimes in the nerve sheaths, sometimes in the tiny filaments at the nerve ends. The eruption follows the path of the affected nerve and may wear itself out in about 14 days. But there is also likely to be stabbing pain along the route and painful sensitiveness of the skin and the

end of the inflammation of the skin is often not the end of the neuritis. It causes. The only treatment is a matter of trying to relieve the irritation and pain. Avoiding exposure is better, the bulletin concludes, and it suggests, also, considering possible exposure to chicken pox in the presence of sharp, unexplained pain.
