vicious cycle. Dentists have found other causes for breakdown of gums and other tooth-supporting tisues.

Malocclusion, or irregular alignnent of teeth, can be a factor. Feeth that do not come together properly increase the tendency of food and bacteria to accumulate it the gum line.

Another cause is the failure of opposing teeth to touch, which is form of malocclusion. Just as a paralyzed leg withers from lack of ise, so does a tooth and its supporting structure degenerate from ack of function.

Some investigations have suggested that there is more gum breakdown, known as peridontal lisease, in smokers than in nonmokers.

Drying out of the linings of the nouth through mouth breathing s one of the more commonly verlooked irritants.

Besides the local irritating fac ors, many dentists believe that general bodily health has much to lo with gum breakdown.

Gums, like any tissue of the oody, are susceptible to general listurbances, such as nutritional leficiency. An upset in hormonal balance in the body may also be contributing factor.

However, the claim that angi ety, worry and nervousness influence peridontal disease has no yet been substantiated.

Candies Peanut brittle is a favorite of all age groups. It is not hard to nake and will stay fresh for a ong time if stored carefully. The recipe for old-fashioned type Peanut Brittle is as follows:

2 cups sugar 1 cup light corn syrup

1 cup water 2 cups unroasted Virginia peanuts or raw Spanish peanuts

1/4 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon butter 1/4 teaspoon soda

Combine sugar, corn syrup, and water in a heavy skillet. Cook dowly, stirring until sugar dissolves. Cook to the soft-ball stage at about two hundred and thirtyeight degrees. Remove candy from heat while testing.

Blanch Virginia peanuts. Raw panish peanuts don't need planching.

Add nuts and salt and cook to he hard-crack stage, stirring constantly. Remove from heat Add butter, soda and blend. Pour onto greased platter. Keep spatula moving under mixture to. keep it from sticking. When firm but still warm, turn over. Break into pieces when cold.

Is Sought by Heart Researchers

By E. Cowles Andrus, M.D. President, American Heart Association

The fate of millions of Americans, now living and yet unborn, depends upon the speed with which research scientists find the answers to these three questions:

1. What causes the arterles to become thickened, roughened and narrowed, interfering with the blood flow and nourishment of the tissues, and setting the stage for "heart at-

tack"?

Let us consider just a few of the more dramatic advances which are saving hearts today. Initial and recurrent attacks of rheumatic fever are being prevented through prompt and effective use of antibiotics.

Antibiotics have made possible a recovery rate of better than 75 percent in subacute bacterial endocarditis, a heart infection once almost invariably fatal.

In many thousands of cases, it has been demonstrated that surgery can often repair heart valves damaged as a result of rheumatic fever, correct certain abnormalities present at birth (as in "blue babies"), and repair other heart conditions previously considered hopeless.

Relief is being brought to many thousands of heart sufferers through new drugs, new dietary controls and new therapeutic techniques.

Diagnostic and study tools are constantly improving.

All of these facts resolve themselves into a hopeful picture. High on the list of factors war-

3. What are the exact mechanisms through which strep infection leads to rheumatic fever, and consequently to rheumatic heart disease?

These three conditions-hardening of the arteries, high blood pressure, and rheumatic fevercause more than ninety percent of all heart disease.

A The basic causes of these disorders are unknown. Until they are found, the likelihood of establishing cures and controls is lessened accordingly.

The importance of our finding the answers to these three profoundly important "unknowns" is underscored by the fact that diseases of the heart now cause more than 794,000 deaths annu-

ally. In their quest for new knowledge about the basic causes of these three conditions, research scientists have developed a great many promising clues which are being intensively followed-up. Moreover, they have made possible great progress in the diag-

vnosis, prevention, care and treatment of the heart diseases.



NOTHING stands out more strongly from the Hebrew Scriptures of the Old Testament than the fact of God's all-seeing Eye.

The Eye is symbolic of the presence and judgments of God as He observes the actions of men and discerns between right and wrong

The Psalmist expressed it in tense and memorable words: "Whither shall I go from Thy spirit? Or whither shall I flee from Thy presence? If I ascend up into heaven. Thou art there; if I make my bed in hell; behold, Thou art there. The darkness and the light are both alike to Thee.'

The consciousness of that presence filled, and should fill today, thoughtful men with awe. That inexorable Eye upon them quickened a sense of fear. "The fear of the Lord," one wrote, "is the beginning of wisdom." There is much in the old Testament

concerning the fear of God. Thus, they prayed, "Search me, O God, and know my heart; try me and know my thoughts: and see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting."

It takes courage, as well as knowledge and faith, to make a prayer like that. But the judgments of God have a meaning and significance beyond individual character and conduct. A world without judgment would be a world without moral sanc-

Life of Hamilton **Proves Youth Not** A Major Handicap

Alexander Hamilton, birthday anniversary falls in the first part of January, was one of early America's most brilliant statesman. Hamilton was born in the West Indies, the son of a Scotch father and a French Hugenot mother.

That was on January 11th, 1757, and, when he was only 17, he was already making speeches favoring a Congress of the colonies. At the age of 20, he was made an aide to the staff of General George Washington, with the rank o Lienutenant-Colonel.

As most readers know, he be came the first Secretary of the Treasury, under President Washington, and made a brilliant reputation for himself in that job. Later he was appointed a Major General in the Army and given the duties of Inspector General, and helped work out plans for the lefense of the United States when the danger of war with France became acute.


While still a comparitively young man, Hamilton was chal lenged to a duel by Aaron Burr, and although he disapproved of duels, he accepted, so that he would not be thought a coward. In that memorable duel, at Weehawkeen. New Jersey, on July 11, 1804, Hamilton fired his pistol in the air, but Burr aimed directly at his hated opponent and fatally wounded him. He died the next

To all those Americans who think youth a handicap and to those who believe that age must necessarily accompany positions of major responsibility in our ountry, we point to Hamilton to lisprove this theory. Even at seventeen he was a leader among his people, and in his twenties, he was one of the major forces generating sentiment in the colonies in favor of independence from England. The story of Hamilton's life and his accomplishments is recommended reading.



1) Get out of the cold and into warm shelter.

2) Use body heat to warm the frostbite is on your face, ears or trunk, cover it with a warm, ungloved hand. If your fingers are frostbitten, place them inside your shirt up against your body. foot against the body of another person. Never rub snow or ice on frostbite. Never rub at all.

3) If the skin is broken, cover the area with a sterile dressing. Don't use strong antiseptics.

4) Take warm food and drink. Get medical aid.







Behind The Scenes in American Business By Reynolds Knight

The three pillars of 1955 prosperity are stout enough to hold he economy on a high level throughout the year-unless a lot of very level-headed people are

being over-optimistic. However, few observers of the economic scene do express doubts. Automobiles: Heads of the Big

Three all forecast a 5.8-millioncar year. Smaller automobile co. speak glowingly of a comeback. The forecasts of individual company output, though, add up to 6.5 million vehicles. The difference between the over-all total and the total reached by adding individual expectations may mean that some plants will wind up making fewer cars than they now plan-and that might hurt Detroit employment some time this summer.

Construction: Building materals makers are talking \$40 billion in new construction, and \$20 billion in modernization of existing buildings this year. The pessimists haven't much to say in rebuttal here, since any lull in the home building boom-and there is none in sight-will be more than aken up by the expansion in school and road construction.

Steel: Steel men are relying heavily on a rebourd from consumer inventory cuts to keep their operating rate around 80 per cent this year. The doubters ask why the purchasing agent, who took a chance on running out of steel this year and came to no harm, shouldn't kep on buying from hand to mouth in 1955. Moreover, the railroads, big customers, took the last of their 1953 rail orders in 1954. They haven't shown any desire to buy more rail until they know how they will pay for it.




