The average person knows very little about his own eyesight and would find it interesting as well as profitable to learn more, says the Better Vision Institute.

For example, many people are ignorant of the importance of side vision.' A normal person sees nearly 180 degrees (a half circle) to right and left while he fixes his gaze straight ahead. Anyone with a much smaller field of vision is bound to find it more difficult, if not impossible, to carry on certain activities-such as driving a car-with safety and

A simple test will tell you roughly how wide your field of vision is. Hold your left hand at arm's length, palm up, and fasten your eyes upon it; then take a your left hand, noting when you wearer and well fitted. first see the paper. #### St. Paul's Sermon On Love Is Among the Finest

TF we omit the sermons in the great parables of Jesus, per-haps the greatest of all Christian sermons is Saint Paul's discourse about love in the Thirteenth Chapter of I Corinthians.

It is a supreme example of brevity, preciseness and simplicity in the presentation of a sublime subject. The subject un-doubtedly inspired in Paul the quality of his utterance; but if it were considered only for its style, apart from its theme, this chapter would be remarkable.

Although foreign writings often suffer in translation, the English translation of the original Greek has a balance and rhyme; a music that one can feel as he reads it aloud.

Concerning the matter of translation, it definitely does enter into consideration of this wonderful sermon. Perhaps a majority of today's Biblical authorities admit that for the "charity" of the Authorized King James Version we should substi-tute the word "love," as in the latest "Revised Standard Ver-

The same thought apparently applies to the translations of Weymouth, Ballantine, Moulton and Goodspeed. On the other side of the ques-

The old-time crab trap is still used in some places. The other amateur method of catching crabs is to lower a bait on a line which is attached to a pole, as a rule. When it is drawn up, the crabs cling to the bait, and if you're lucky you hand net them at the

In an article on shellfish which recently appeared in Sports Afield magazine, Bill Wolf explains that crab baits lean toward the smelly type because crabs are scavengers. A rich, ripe piece of menhaden (mosbunker or fatback, as it is known in some sections) is good. Professional crabbers use horse meat which has been salted and set in the sun for awhile.

CRAWFISH - Call these crawfish, crayfish, crawdads or mudbugs, they are appreciated only in the Mississippi Delta country. That is the rest of the nation's loss. The crawfish (which is almost strictly a fresh-water crustacean and is not to be confused with the salt-water crawfish known as the spiny, or rock lobster, even to its claws. It is familiar to bass and trout fishermen and a good bait, in its small-



For 1955 the total supply of 26 important legume and grass seeds is about 14 per cent less than last year and a tenth below the 1943-52 average.

Of the one billion pounds of these about 700 million are those most likely to be sown in the spring, and this is only 7 per cent less than last year and nearly equal to the 10-year



But when more calories are eaten than your body can use, they are stored as fat. It's what you eat that makes you fat.

Up to 35 years of age, it is safer to be plump than skinny. Beyond 35, excess fat becomes a greater health liability than extreme thinness. Ills such as high blood pressure and heart and kidney ailments are more common among overweights. Arthritis, too, is adversely affected, and post-operative deaths are increased when obesity is present.

This graceful liner, with her sistership WASHINGTON, were the first American ships built for North Atlantic service in over forty years when they came out in the early 1930s. Their immediate popularity with travelers upturned the entire system of class nomenclature aboard Atlantic liners. The MANHAT-TAN's red, white and blue smoke stacks and her clean. sweeping lines readily identified her as an American ship. She saw extensive war service surviving a fierce fire off Halifax. Rebuilt as a troopship she could carry 7,000 men. When peace came, the MANHATTAN was retained by the Navy as a

mothball transport. Her peace-



time career of only nine years was indeed too short, particularly for such an outstanding example of American shipbuilding, according to the American Merchant Marine Institute. Since the Civil War only twelve ships have been built for American passenger service on the North Atlantic route. High construction and operating costs make it virtually impossible for American ship lines to compete. For years this lack of ships in deepsea service was made up for in large part by a thriving passenger and cargo service along our coasts. Today, this domestic fleet is extinct. New liners for deep-sea operation are necessary.
