

Carrier Forrestal Launched Lately

What will be the world's largest warship, the aircraft carrier Forrestal, was recently launched at Newport News, Virginia. The Forrestal will displace more than 70,000 tons, fully loaded, and represents a completely new seres of carriers.

The contract for the huge warship was let in July, 1951, but its construction schedule has fallen almost a year behind. The keel was laid in July, 1952, but the big ship is not expected to get into operation until late next year. The final cost of the Forrestal

s expected to top \$200,000,000, which does not include the cost of her complement of some 100 aircraft. Since the Forrestal was author-

ized, three other huge carriers have been authorized, and a fifth Forrestal-type carrier is thought to be in the budget to be presented to the Eighty-Fourth Congress as this is written. The second ship in this series is the Sar-

atoga, and is under construction at the New York Naval Shipyard in Brooklyn. The Ranger, the third in this

series, has been authorized, and will be built at Newport News as was the Forrestal. The fourth huge carrier has not been named, but will be built at the Brooklyn Navy yard.

This series of carriers is being built in line with a ten-year carrier-a-year program laid down by Dan A. Kimball, Secretary of the Navy under former President Harry Truman. At the end of another ten years, the United States will probably have ten super-carriers which will outclass anything else of its type in the world. What happens to these huge ships in any new war will probably finally answer the question whether carriers are out-of-date in view of the arrival of the atomic bomb.

Tap Sun's Energy

From laboratories in New York comes word that a new solar battery has been developed which utilizes the sun's light to produce electricity. The developers of the new battery were G. O. Pearson, G. S. 



Simple Sudsing 'Saves' Curtains







Clean curtains last longer, and in these days of easy-tokeep wonder fabrics, there's no need to let dingy curtains mar the brightness of your rooms. Those sheer beauties in nylon, Orlon, Dacron or Saran take little effort to refresh. First rule is to wash them at the first sign of soil.

rule is to wash them at the first sign of soil. The various "miracle fibers" all require the same kind of washing —by machine or by hand in lukewarm soapsuds and rinses. But never twist, wring, or spin such curtains dry, so that creases will have no "chance to "set" in the fabric. For machine washing, it's a good idea to put curtains into a mesh-bag or pillowcase to prevent roping or twisting. Use short sudsing and rinsing cycles. If you use a dryer, set the temperature at "low" and remove the curtains while still damp. To wash curtains whend fold them loosely to a convenient size and

To wash curtains by hand, fold them loosely to a convenient size and dip in and out of soapsuds and rinses until clean. For a smooth, fin-ished effect, "finger-press" hems, sides, and ruffles while still wet. Hang the curtains smoothly over a line or shower rod to drip dry, and they won't really need ironing. If you do prefer to press them, wait until they are dry and use a cool iron.



You should know that 5 land owners have pledged in writing to donate to the village and community over 30 acres of land, including creeks and woodland, directly adjacent on two sides to this school site for a possible future community park, and that this project has the approval of state park engineers. What could be more ideally compatible than such a possible combination of public properties.

Here are a few facts about the Rosenheimer-Volm site:

- 1. The Rosenheimer-Volm site, being on the southwest edge of the village, away from factory and commercial areas, enjoys the fresh country air prevailing from the west and is not subjected to smoke, dust, dirt and noise from village industries and traffic.
- 2. The Rosenheimer-Volm site is safely off the main highways and roads around the village for the protection of our children.
- 3. The Rosenheimer-Volm site will be serviced by the very adequate sewage system recently installed in the Roseland Heights development, and all that is necessary to provide service to the site is an extension of approximately 500 feet at no expense to the school district.
- 4. The Rosenheimer-Volm site is so situated that it can easily be expanded if and when necessary.
- 5. The Rosenheimer-Volm site is the highest site in the entire vicinity suitable for school building purposes. Its highest point rises 45 feet above the intersection of Water street and Main street in the village of Kewaskum, and 43 feet above Water street at the north village limits. A vast plateau in the center of the site of over 500 feet width has a grade differential of less than 8 feet, and for comparison rises above the elevation of our present high school site by approximately 6 feet. Consider the minimum of grading necessary on a site such as this. The athletic field shelf on the lower Eastern end of the site lends itself ideally to the preferred North-South positioned grounds, and an area there of 300 feet by 600 feet has a grade differential of only 6 feet. Since 3 feet are needed for normal drainage, only 3 feet of grading is required. These are expense saving features to consider. The elevation of the athletic area will be 10 feet higher than the intersection of Main street and Water street.

And then, if, after seeing this site, and after fairly comparing it with all others, you have assured yourself that the action taken at the Feb. 14th meeting of purchasing this site for our future school was correct, by all means attend the meeting on Monday, March 14th and vote NO to the question of reconsideration.

Remember, this is the last special meeting that may be called this year, and it undoubtedly will be the final action in the selection of our school site.


Tuna Pompons With Spaghetti (Makes 4 servings)

Two 61/2-ounce cans chunk-style tuna, 2 tablespoons chopped onion, 1 No. 2 can tomatoes, 1 6-ounce can tomato paste, 1 teaspoon oregano, 1 teaspoon salt, freshly ground pepper, 2 eggs, 34 cup fine dry bread crumbs, 34 teaspoon marjoram, 2 tablespoons margarine or butter, 1 tablespoon salt, 3 quarts boiling water, 8 ounces spaghetti.

Drain tuna and reserve oil. In a saucepan combine 2 tablespoons tuna oil and onion; cook over low heat until onion is golden color. Add tomatoes, tomato paste, oregano, 1 teaspoon salt and pepper; mix thoroughly. Cover and cook over low heat 20 minutes, stirring occasionally.

In a bowl, combine tuna, unbeaten eggs, 1/2 cup crumbs and marjoram; mix thoroughly. Shape tuna mixture into 8 pompons. Roll in remaining crumbs. Melt margarine in skillet and cook pompons over medium heat until lightly browned. If desired, add browned pompons to tomato sauce and cook 5 minutes.

Meanwhile, add 1 tablespoon salt to rapidly boiling water. Gradually add spaghetti so that water continues to boil. Cook uncovered, stirring occasionally, until t nder. Drain in colander. Servé tuna jompons with cooked spagh tti and sauce.





St. Paul Told **Of Riches Christians Possess**

"POOR, yet making many rich"; that is how Saint Paul describes the condition and privilege of the early Christian believers, many of whom were evidently quite poor in worldly goods. "As having nothing," he adds, "and yet possessing all things."

It was not a chance remark or a sentimental idea on the apostle's part, but an expression of his settled philosophy concerning the Christian's possessions. And also, in the First Epistle to the Corinthians, he reasoned more directly concerning the Christians' wealth.

The Christian belongs to Christ. Christ is God's. All things belong to God. Therefore, he writes to the Corinthians, "All

things are yours." The cynic may protest that this sort of wealth will not pay the rent. There is a point in the criticism, but it might also be pointed out that Paul was no visionary dreamer regarding the practical affairs of life.

He worked at his trade as tentmaker to support himself, and he insisted that everybody else should work. He would have no loafers in the Christian community.

Further, if he admonished Christians to "bear one another's burdens," he qualified this with the declaration that "every man shall bear his own burden." There never has been, even to our time, a clearer statement of social and individual responsibility.

His words forcefully bring to the attention that there is a reality of inner wealth and richness of life for which no amount of worldly, material wealth or possession can compensate.

One who has missed the Christian's spiritual possessions has missed the greatest treasure that God and life have to offer.



The United States Savings and Loan League, fastest-growing of financing agencies concerned with the nation's home building boom, predicts a fast start this spring, a good summer, and perhaps a little slacking off next fall and winter in residential construction.

Americans are still moving out into the suburbs. Mortgage money is still plentiful, both from government and from private savers. Childhen of the great birthing boom of right after the war are growing up and crowding their parents into bigger homes. More persons have incomes that allow them to own their own homes. That's the League's summary of favorable factors.

On the minus side:

Building has taken care of much of the pent-up demand for housing. Fewer new households are being formed than in the years just passed. Income expansion for many segments of the population has about ended. Some cities have persistent unemployment; the jobless are broke and the jobful are hesitant to spend. Still, balancing all factors, the League believes 1955 will match the 1,215,000 dwelling units built in 1954. And that was one of the industry's best years.
