District Electors Approve Purchase of Bilgo Site Over Rosenheimer-Volm Tract for New Kewaskum High School

705 Persons Jam School Gym, and heated debates which preceded Vote for New Site at Special **Reconsideration Meet Monday**

A total of 705 electors of Kewas-Community Union High kum School District No. 2 jam-packed the local high school Monday night for a special reconsideration meeting to select a site for Kewaskum's new high school building.

The voters approved of purchasing the August C. Bilgo tract of 18.3 acres at a price of \$1,700 per acre or \$31,110 for the entire site. The Bilgo site is situated north of the present school grounds. At an

earlier meeting on Feb. 14 the purchase of the Rosenheimer-Volm tract of land at the southwest end or the village had been approved. However, 'Monday's meeting was called after a petition was circulated in the district asking reconsider. ation of the Rosenheimer-Volm purchase.

Interest in the matter of reconsideration was very great, in fact almost feverish, and it was the main topic of conversation for ton weeks before the meeting, Many heated discussions and disagreements ensued on streets, farms, buplaces and almost every. where else. 



One a penny, two a penny, Hot Cross Buns — You probably remember the poem and the luscious fruit-filled buns from your childhood. Now, during the Lenten season, make Hot Cross Buns for your children (make plenty as the oldsters enjoy them, too). Here are the easy directions.

HOT CROSS BUNS

2 medium sized

Pare and boil potatoes. Drain and put through ricer or mash until smooth. Scald milk. Stir in sugar, salt, butter and ³/₄ cup of the potatoes. Cool to lukewarm. Measure water into a large mixing bowl (warm, not hot, water for active dry yeast; lukewarm water for compressed yeast). Sprin-kle or crumble in yeast, stir until dissolved. Add lukewarm milk-potato mixture. Beat two of the eggs and add to yeast mixture. Stir in half of the flour and lemon peel. Beat until smooth. Add remaining flour or enough to make an easily handled dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead quickly and lightly until smooth and elastic — about 8 to 10 minutes. Let rise until doubled in bulk. Punch dough down and turn out on lightly floured board. Knead raisins into dough. Divide dough in half; form each half into a roll about 12 inches long. Cut with a sharp. knife into 12 equal pieces. Form into smooth balls. Place in greased 9-inch cake pans about 1/4 inch apart. Separate remaining egg. Beat egg yolk with 2 tablespoons water and brush buns with the mixture. Cover buns and set in a warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk. Bake at 375°F. (moderate oven) about 25 minutes. Beat remaining egg white and add enough to confectioners' sugar to make spreading consistency. Drop from tip of spoon, making crosses on tops of buns. Makes 2 dozen hot cross buns.



Q. What is the name of this cut of meat? A. Veal leg, center cut.

Q. Where does it come from and how is it identified? A. It is from the leg with the rump and shank removed.

Q. How is it prepared?

A. By roasting or braising. For roasting, it is seasoned with salt and pepper. Then it is placed on rack in an open roasting pan. A roast meat thermometer is inserted so the bulb reaches the center of the roast and does not center of the roast and does not rest on bone. Bacon slices are placed over the roast. Water is not added and the pan is not cov-ered. The meat is roasted in a slow oven (300°F.) until the meat thermometer registers 170°F. About 25 to 30 minutes per pound are required for roasting. 
TIME FOR ATOM AGE-Prof. Charles H. Townes, of Columbia University, points to mechanism of his "atomic clock," a device so accurate that it is expected not to vary more than one second from correct time in 300 years. Called "Maser" for its function, Microwave Amplification by Stimulated Emission of Radiation, it uses energy radiated by molecules of ammonia as its timing standard. Expected to play a role in navigation and spectroscopic study of molecular structure, the device may be used to solve the ages-old riddle as to whether the earth is slowing up or increasing its rate of rotation.



Though most wool clothing must be dry cleaned, many knit garments and also light weight flannels and challis, may be wash ed most effectively, says Betty Ann. If the man of the house wears wool socks and sweaters and the youngsters wear sweat ers, mittens or other washable wool garments needing frequent cleaning, it pays the homemaker to know how to launder these without shrinkage. Once wool has shrunk and become hard and matted you may be able to stretch it back to size but it will never fit so well or be so comfortable. You can't bring back the elasticity that makes for comfortable wear, or the "springy" quality that gives good insulation and thus warmth.

Important tips for preventing are: Handle wet wool gently, moy ing it as little as possible. Slightly soiled garments may become clean by only a brief soak in the washing solution and being turned over a couple of times. Avoid rubbing, wringing and much agitation in the washer. Because any alkaline substance may injure wool, non-alkaline synthetic detergents are suggested.

Atomic Energy Used For Preserving Food Army Chemical Corps scientists

have been experimenting for several years at the Dugway Proving Grounds in Utah and have discovered a new method for preserving food. The food which has been preserved has been saved by the careful use of atomic bullets.

These bullets are only minute ones, which are used to kill micro-organisms which get into food and cause decay. The atomic bullets can also destroy food-contaminating insects and have been used with effectiveness against these

The new preservation system is called irradiation and has been used by the army for five years, in the current experimental program. The atomic bullets are actually highly-penetrating rays, which are emitted by elements removed from nuclear furnaces. These elements come from the Atomic Energy Commission, of course, and were turned over to the army for these experiments. St. Paul Had Solution for **Christian Quarrels**

THERE are many things in the two epistles that Saint Paul wrote to the Christians at Corinth, the longest in the New Testament And much in the letters has to do with the dissensions that arose so early in the church. Particularly noteworthy is Paul's comment and counsel concerning these church quarrels, and especially his commendation of Christian love as the one great means of overcoming them

Whether the dissensions at Corinth amounted to actual quarrels or not we cannot tell. But the difference of opinion and the divisions were evidently very sharp.

Throughout the long history of Christian churches, quarrels have frequently been bitter and sharp, degrading the institution that in its rightful organization ought to embody the spirit of the Lord whom it professes to serve.

The dissensions among the Corinthian Christians were very much like those that have appeared again and again in modern churches.

Who has not seen a church divided about the merits, or demerits, of some minister? One knows, also, how often such dissension has been sharp and strong. At Corinth they were divided over the respective merits of Paul, Apollos and Peter. Some even adhered to Christ, not as possessing all that the others might have, but merely as a lead-

er of a party. Against all this dissension Paul proclaimed the all-inclusiveness of Christ as "the power of God and the wisdom of God." It is this Christlike concept and spirit that should rule the hearts and minds of those who often unthinkingly give allegiance to causes much less than Godlike in their origins.

How would you like your grapefruit cooked? Yes, "cooked." If you've never tried broiled or baked grapefruit, you have missed a real treat.

Cooking grapefruit removes it from the group of breakfast items and places it among the foods you might like to use for dinner, elther as an appetizer or as a dessert. Some insist grapefruit is at its best when it's broiled "as is." Simply cut the grapefruit in half, put halves under a hot broiler for about 15 minutes, until the fruit begins to show flecks of brown Others prefer to sprinkle each half with a little sugar, and perhaps add some spice, such as cinnamon, mace, or nutmeg, before broiling. Still others favor liquid honey.

Another adaptation of cooked grapefruit is to enhance the flavor of broiled fillets of fish, which, like grapefruit, are listed as a plentiful food. Broil the fish as usual, and about five minutes before the end of cooking, place two or three sections of grape fruit on top of each fillet, brush with fat and dust with paprika and finish broiling as usual.

Chocolate Nut Cake

3 squares unsweetened choco late; 15 cup hot water; 15 cup shortening; 11/2 cups granulated sugar; 2 eggs; 2 cups sifted flour 1 teaspoon salt; 1 teaspoon soda; teaspoon baking powder; 2/3 cup buttermilk or sour milk; 1 teaspoon vanilla extract; 2/3 cup chopped walnuts.

Melt chocolate over hot water then stir in one-half cup hot water, blending well. Cool slightly. Cream shortening and sugar to gether thoroughy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Blend in chocolate mixture. Sift together flour, salt, soda and baking powder. Blend into creamed mixture al ternately with buttermilk, Blend in vanilla and chopped walnuts Turn into two greased nine inch layer cake pans. Bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees, 30 to 35 minutes. Let stand five minutes. Turn out onto wire rack to cool. Frost as desired. Makes one nine inch cake.



Davis explains that these are one-course affairs where the competition is confined to a limited amount of land, Each brace of dogs is tested for ground work-handling response, style in action, hunting intelligence. pace and range-over a back section of the course. Each brace is allowed the same amount of time, usually 30 minutes, in which to negotiate the flagged coverts. The dogs are gradually swung, usually in a horses hoe shaped course, back to the more open area near the starting point, which is designated as a bird field. In this area pen-raised game birds (usually pheasants or quail) are planted or released. This bird field is placed in such a position that the gallery of spectators can remain near the starting point and still see most of the game-handling work. Two experienced judges follow each brace.

In almost every section of the country where bird dogs are to value in hunting, sportsmen's clubs cooperate with each other in spacing events so as to provide a regular circuit of week end affairs that run from early spring into early summer, and from early fall into the regular hunting

Behind The Scenes in American **Business** By Reynolds Knight

If Congress approves the terms reached by the Rubber Producing Facilities Disposal Commission, 24 of the 27 synthetic rubber plants owned by the government will soon pass into private hands. And if this happens, it will be one of the few times in history in which the taxpayers will get their money's worth out of the post-war sale of equipment and facilities created, almost heedless of cost, to meet the needs of a national emergency.

Under the plan, the government will recover 96.6 per cent of its net investment in the wartime and postwar rubber program, and will still own the three other plants

Actualy the gain for the country as a whole-a large one in dollars-can't be fully measured in dollars. Tremendous strides in technology have been made, contributed by private industry. There's no way, for example, of putting a price tag on such assets as the 100 patents contributed by leading rubber company, which pioneered synthetic rubber long before World War II. This company also took the leading role in building the man-made rubber plants for the war effort.

BIGGER BILLS AHEAD-Legislatures in 46 states are meeting this year. More than 20 of them are in session already. Topic No. 1: More taxes.



prosperous states Generally speaking, governors and legislators plan to meet their deficits by raising taxes, rather than by economies in fields less essential than roads and schools.

GAS OUTLOOK-Nineteen-fifty-five shapes up as a good year for the entire gas industry, according to a survey by a major gas appliance manufacturers association. So good, in fact, that there is room for belief that the industry may top its previous record year of 1950.

Biggest increase is expected by nanufacturers of gas furnaces, who set an all-time record last year by shipping 670,000 units. Based on expectations of individual companies, 1955 may see this figure bettered by 27 per cent.

Manufacturers of other types of gas equipment also are optimistic. Boiler manufacturers think their sales may increase 14 per cent. Gas range makers, offering many new fange designs and features, think in terms of a 12 per cent advance. Manufacturers of gas water heaters believe they will set a new peak with sales up as high as 13 per cent. Other hoped-for increases; Gas conversion units, 20 per cent; vented recessed wall heaters, 20 per cent; gas unit heaters, 15.7 per cent; domestic incinerators, 17 per cent.

SOAP COMEBACK - The American uses each year a far greater poundage of preparations to keep himself, his home and his clothing clean than does the citizen of any other country. In the face of the statistic, the price of soap-making fats has been declining almost steadily since the war.

The reason, of course, is synthetic detergents. These took a huge chunk of the laundry and dish-washing markets, and even bit vigorously into the shampoo demand soap once enjoyed.

Now exports have come to the rescue. Dealers in inedible fats are buying up tallow and kindred ats for shipment into markets that are smaller but relatively free of detergent competition. Talow prices are knocking at 1951 levels.

On the other end of the seesaw are the food fats which enjoyed a ong boom. Two big pig crops and a bounteous soybean harvest last year have more than offset a relatively poor cotton crop, Butter production has not been exceedingly high, but support prices have diverted it into storage, so the visable supply is large.






