Kewaskum Trims Lakes All-Stars Here, 111 to 95

Kewaskum's Land o' Lakes league northern division champions slowed the reason why they copped frst place and continued their winning ways by soundly trouncing the Lakes All-Stars, 111-95, Saturday night in a game played in the local gym. The All-Star squad was made up of players from the other teams in the loop.

The Chevrolets' victory was even more one sided than the final score indicates. They roared off to a 37-1" first quarter lead and broadened the marking to 30 points at halftime when the score stood at 59-29. In running up their big lead, the Chevs made only one free throw, the rest of their score resulting from 29 field goals.

With Kewaskum coasting and relaxing their defense in the second half, the Stars caught fire and whittled 14 points off the Chevs' lead. But the Lakes champs still possessed a big 16-point advantage when the tilt ended.



To prevent sagging later, always allow jersey garments to hang a few days before putting the hem up.

Instead of making a new hem on a child's dress that is too long. just make a wide tuck on the underside of the original hem. This can be ripped out when the child has grown, and the original hem will still be good as new.

All but forgotten, the dress weights used by famous old Paris couturiers are still the best way to keep skirts hanging arrow straight. Sew one in the hem at each seam of the skirt.

For a built-in flare, you don't have to wear a dozen stiff petti coats. Sew three inch wide crino line in the hem of a full skirt or dress before it is turned up.

There is no longer any need to sew hems by hand. The new sew ing machine will baste, sew over pins, even blind stitch hems. Most of all, they save time and eliminate monotony in adjusting hems ordinarily one of the most tediou jobs in sewing to do oneself, and one of the most expensive jobs to have done outside.

Meal-in-a-Pot Saves Work, Satisfies Heartiest Appetites

BY DOROTHY MADDOX

MORE time to enjoy your family and just as much good eatingthat's what this one-burner, one-pot dinner offers. Meat and potatoes (lots of them), plus vegetables, tender and flavorful. This meal will satisfy the heartiest of family appetites.

Sunday Dinner in One Pot (Serves 6 or 7 generously)

Three and one half to 4-pound piece eye-round of beef, small piece of fresh pork fat, 2 onions, 1 teaspoon chopped garlic, 1/2 teaspoon black pepper, I bay leaf, 1/4 teaspoon thyme, 1/4 cup tomato sauce, 1 tablespoon salt, 12 to 15 3-inch stalks celery, 5 carrots, cut in 1/4-inch rings; 5 large potatoes, scraped, peeled and cut in two; water.

Start this meal about four hours before dinnertime, or cook meat on previous day to point where vegetables are to be added. Cut pork fat diced small, and heat in Dutch oven until brown and crisp. Add beef and brown well on all sides.

Now add onion, garlic, seasonings and two cups of water. Cover tightly and cook over low heat, turning meat occasionally to permit even absorption of flavors. After 21/2 hours add potatoes and enough water just to cover.

Fifteen minutes later add carrots and celery. Make sure all vegetables have a chance to cook in liquid for a time. When vegetables are tender, pour liquid off into saucepan.

Skim off fat. Reheat and serve as gravy. Arrange meat and vegetables on one large platter.





Behind The Scenes in American **Business** By Reynolds Knight

"Households and Families, by Type: 1947 to 1954" is the snappy title of a just-issued bulletin of the Census Bureau. The style of its five pages throughout has about the same amount of zing as the title.

Even so, the bulletin will capture the attention of those who take a long-run view of the country's industrial development. It traces two profound changes:

A. The urge to get married and start families, which gripped the nation so firmly between 1940 and 1947, has waned a little. The increase in husband-wife households was 577,000 a year in the earlier period. Between 1950 and 1954, it declined to 441,000. As the Bureau observes, 67 per cent of the adult population consisted of husbands and wives in 1949, compared with 60 per cent in 1940; the rate of new-family formation had waned. In April, 1954, the Bureau calculates, there were 35.8 million husband-wife households.

B. The rush to the country continues. Rural non-f a r m families increased from 7.9 million to 9 million in four years, a rise of 13.9 per cent, while urban families rose from 21.7 million to 23.1 million, or 6.5 per cent. Considering that the Bureau regards as urban any town of 2500 or more persons, it is plain that we have just begun to grapple with the problems of suburban schools, roads, etc.

TECHNOLOGICAL GAIN - A self-spacing feature which expedites installation of ceramic wall tile has been put into production by leading manufacturers of such tile throughout the United States. Under the new process, all tiles are made with small bars or studs on each edge, to provide a joint of 1/32 or 1/16 inch between them

This eliminates the necessity for the tile-setter to provide this space, Clay wall tile in bathrooms and kitchens goes into place faster, and the final work has more uniform joints.

Built-in space-bars are the second major step of the clay tile industry in recent years to reduce the time needed for installing ceramic tile, thereby lowering cost to the consumer. The first was adhesive installation, which permits ceramic wall and floor tile to be put in place over any existing

That is why this form of packaging is an excellent indicator of the state of the nation's business. All during 1954 paperboard mills ran at 89 per cent of capacity. They only attained this level by a strong upsurge in the Christmas shopping season.

Now, mills report, they are humming along at a 94 per cent rate. What makes this better is that some paperboard capacity was installed last year, so the higher percentage is on a higher base. New orders, as February began, were at the highest level since November, 1953.
