

Sunday Buffet Breakfast Makes Real After-Church Treat

DO you like to ask friends in for a big Sunday breakfast after church? If you do, we hope these brunch suggestions will please you

Try a brunch served buffet fashion. This creates a feeling of leisure. Let your guests help themselves on arrival to chilled wedges of melon and a choice of cereals.

The corned beef hash mixture can be pressed into a baking dish in advance, ready for the addition of the eggs at the last moment.

Baked Eggs in Corned Beef Hash (Yield: 6 servings)

One quart or 2 (1-pound) cans corned beef hash, 1 pint soft 1/2inch bread cubes, 3/4 cup milk, 2 tablespoons finely chopped onion, 6 eggs, 2 tablespoons light cream.

Combine corned beef hash, soft bread cubes, milk and onion. Press mixture into a greased 1½-quart baking dish. Make 6 square indentations in hash for eggs. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.) for 15 minutes. Remove from oven and break one egg into each indentation. Pour 1 teaspoon cream over each egg. Return to oven for 15 to 20 minutes longer until eggs are set. Cut into squares and serve immediately.

Spiced-Orange Loaf (Yield: 15 servings)

One-quarter cup soft butter or margarine, 1/2 cup light brown sugar, firmly packed; ½ cup granulated sugar, ½ teaspoon cin-namon, 1 tablespoon orange juice, 2 teaspoons grated orange rind, 1 (1-pound) loaf sliced, enriched bread.

Combine butter, brown sugar, granulated sugar, cinnamon, orange juice and rind. Assemble the loaf by stacking each slice of bread as you spread it with about 2 teaspoons of the sugar mixture. Hold the stack firmly and, with a sharp knife, trim away the crusts.

Turn loaf on its side and set in a greased shallow pan. Loosely tie a string, lengthwise, around the stack. Spread remaining sugar mixture over the top.

Slice lengthwise, cutting completely through center of loaf. Gently pull top of loaf apart in several places. Bake in a hot oven (400 degrees F.) for 10 minutes.

Old-Fashioned Potato Salad

6 white potatoes: 1 medium on ion, chopped; 4 stalks celery; 1 hard cooked eggs, chopped; 8 to 10 sweet pickles, chopped; 2 teaspoons salt; 1 cup mayonnaise; 1/2 teaspoon celery seed: 16 teaspoon mustard; 1/4 teaspoon pepper; 21/2 tablespoons vinegar; 2 tablespoons sugar; 1/4 cup evaporated milk.

Boil or bake potatoes until done. Dice and sprinkle with salt. Add onion, celery, eggs and pickles. To the mayonnaise, add celery seed, mustard, pepper, vin egar and sugar. Mix well, stir in milk and pour over potatoes. Garnish with greens, tomatoes and sliced eggs, if desired.



Those great feet-on-the-groundthe nation's purchasing Prs. agents, held their annual convention in New York last week, and said everything looked rosy -or as rosy as anything ever ooks to a purchasing agent.

This quarter is fine everywhere, delegates from throughout the nation agreed. The coming quarter - July - August - Septemper-will see some slackening of the industrial pace, they likewise agreed. More plant shutdowns for simultaneous vacations for all hands will contribute. So will a natural reaction from high auto production, whether or not there's a long strike.

The fourth quarter, it was expected, would see a new upsurge. Credited for this were early introduction of 1956 auto models, continuing demands for a multitude of consumer goods stemming from full employment, and cautious upbuilding of inventories, the last because, the industrial buyers generally agreed, prices wouldn't go any lower.

Looking a little farther into the future, the purchasing agents saw clouds on the horizon in the form of excessive credit and a pattern of wage increases moving up, they felt, faster than supporting rises in productivity.



raffic COMPETITION EQUITY -More competition in the transportation industry is recommended my's guided missile test center in the recently released report of he Presidential Advisory Committee on Transport Policy and Organization.

> The report, aimed at a general overhaul of the Interstate Comnerce Act, contains 12 recommendations. Four call for less ICC control over the rates of common carriers; one is intended to reduce general ICC control over carriers; and the remaining seven call for more control over various elements of the transportation industry with the aim of equalizing regulation.

In releasing its report the Cabinet Committee gave as its major objectives "increased reliance on competitive forces of transportation in ratemaking, and maintenance of a modernized and financially strong system of common carrier transportation."
