Kewaskum Has Polio Epidemic With Eight Active Cases, Many Light, Probable Cases Reported Children Restricted to Yards; All Recreational Activities Cancelled

ALL EXPOSED PERSONS GIVEN "SHOTS" HEALTH OFFICER ONE OF VICTIMS

Polio has reached the epidemic stage in Kewaskum the past week with a total of eight active cases reported, five of them in the past few days. It is the worst epidemic of polio in the history of the village and has necessitated the restricting of all children to their own yards and the cancellation of all recreational activities.

Dr. R. G. Edwards, village health officer, himself is one of the victims of the disease. Dr. Edwards has been ill this week and his sickness has been diagnosed as a probable case of polio. Mrs. Edwards reports that besides the eight active cases, there have been 10 or more probable or light cases of polio, where the person became ill with the symptoms of polio. But in these mild cases the sick person recovered and was all over the disease in a day or two.

Those stricken with polio are Frank Schoenbeck, 8, son of Mrs. Gladys Schoenbeck, village; Steven Frazier, 11, son of the Paul Fraziers, village; Sue Sengpiel, 8, daughter of the Ned Sengpiels, village; Mary Reindl, 11, daughter of the Gilbert Reindls, town of Kewaskum; Joel Peterson, son of the L. N. Petersons, village; Artie Buss, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Buss, Sr., village, and Dr. Edwards. The eighth case was reported to be August Kirchner, son of the Andrew Kirchners, Kewaskum rural route, who will be a senior in the local high school this fall. However, his illness had not definitely been diagnosed as polio at the time the health officer became ill.

The first case of polio was the Schoenbeck boy on Aug. 2. The Frazier boy and Sengpiel girl became ill last week and the five others all were reported this week. As a result Dr. Edwards, in a radio appeal and police canvass on Monday, ordered all children of the village to remain in their own yards in an attempt to stop the spread of the disease in this area. This appeal was made on a voluntary basis with the warning that if it was not enforced a quarantine would be placed on the village. However, the appeal has met with great success. Not a child is seen on the streets, as parents and children both realize the seriousness of the situation. Dr. Edwards emphasized that the situation is not one to become alarmed about but precautions should be taken. He recommends that children and adults alike get plenty of rest, avoid getting chilled and avoid crowds.

The polio epidemic has also resulted in recreational and other activities being cancelled. The Kewaskum theatre has closed down with the last movie being shown Thursday night. Paul Frazier, theatre manager, stated that he tentatively plans to re-open the theatre on Sept. 2, unless the situation is

not improved by that time. The Saturday afternoon free matinees have also been cancelled until further notice. Manager Killy Honeck of the Land o' Lakes baseball team called off Thursday night's scheduled game with Cedarburg and also the donkey ball game scheduled for this Saturday night. Holy Trinity church has cancelled its snergasgord supper scheduled for Aug. 28.

The writer contacted the Revs. F. C. La Buwi, F. L. Rodenbeck and Gerhard Kanless, pastors of the local churches, all of whom agreed to excuse the children from attending church this Sunday and until the voluntary quarantine is lifted. They also recommended that the young people stay away from all other gatherings until the emergency is over.

All of the local children and others who have been exposed to polio, through association with those stricken, were given gamma globulin shots. These included the firemen's ambulance attendants and pregnant women who received their shots on Friday morning at the West Bend hospital.

Up to the present time none of the local cases have been described as too serious although it is too early to tell what the result will be in most cases. The Schoenbeck boy was returned from South View hospital, Milwaukee, to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, last Thursday in the local ambulance. The Sengpiel girl was removed to South View Friday in the ambulance and was scheduled to transfer to Milwaukee hospital on Friday of this week. The Frazier youth was brought to the West Bend hospital from South View Saturday as the ambulance was kept busy.

AUTO PARKED ON STREET RAMMED INTO BY DRIVER

A 1947 Pontiac coach driven by Henry W. Stern, 59, R. 1, Kewaskum, and a 1954 Chevrolet coach owned by William Kohn, Jr., 29, R. 3, Kewaskum, were damaged in a collision on Main st. at 8:40 p. m. last Friday. Kohn had his car parked in front of Serwe's tavern when the westbound Stern machine rammed into it, striking the left rear fender and left door. Kohn had his door open and was standing aside of the car when Stern ran into it. He was lucky to escape injury.

Surviving further are one daughter-in-law, two sons-in-law, and two brothers, Herman Molkenhine and William Molkenhine of Milwaukee. The deceased was a daughter of the late Julius and Augusta Molkenhine.

The body will be in state at Miller's Funeral home, Kewaskum, after 2 p. m. Saturday and at St. John's Lutheran church, New Fane, from 12 noon to 2 p. m. on Sunday when services will be held. The Rev. E. J. Zanow will officiate and burial will be in the parish cemetery.

New Sewage Plant Now in Operation

Kewaskum's new sewage treatment plant just south of the village was put into operation for the first time Tuesday. Although the entire building is not yet completed, the tanks and machinery necessary for treating of sewage wastes are completed and as a result the plant could begin operation.

The incinerator has also been installed and work on it completed but it has not been tested yet. It is expected to have it in operation in about three weeks.

When all of the work on the sewage plant is finished the cost will run about \$260,000. The village now has the service of two sewage plants in operation.

Complete details on the new plant will be published at a later date when the work is all finished and when the public will be able to inspect it.

Pfc. A. Mertes' Body Shipped From Korea

The body of Pfc. Allen C. Mertes, son of Mrs. Clarence Mertes of Kewaskum, who was killed in action in Korea on Nov. 4, 1950, was returned home for burial this week. It arrived here on the 9:50 p. m. train Tuesday, accompanied by a military escort and was removed to the Miller Funeral home.

The body was met at the station by about 35 members of Robert G. Romaine Post 384 of the American Legion and a large crowd of spectators. The Legionnaires escorted the body to the funeral home and also conducted military rites at the graveside.

Funeral services for Pfc. Mertes were held Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the funeral home, the Rev. F. L. Rodenbeck officiating. Burial was in the Beechwood cemetery. The body was in state at the funeral home from 2 p. m. Wednesday until the time of services.

Pfc. Mertes enlisted in the army in November of 1948 and was sent overseas in July of 1950. He lost his life while serving with the 24th Infantry Division, which was in the thick of the fighting in Korea. He was serving with Co. C of the 24th Infantry Division, 19th Infantry Regiment. Prior to his enlistment Pfc. Mertes was a student at Kewaskum High school.

The young man was 19 years of age when he lost his life. He was born in Kewaskum on March 7, 1931. Surviving are his mother, a sister Arlene (Mrs. Oscar Ashmaal) of Waldo; a brother, Donald of West Bend; his grandmother, Mrs. Emma Mertes of Wheaton, Ill.; a brother-in-law, a sister-in-law and two nephews. His father died July 29, 1945.
