## Three New Polio Cases Here; Mass Inoculation of Gamma Globulin Given All Children

### Children Under 12 Receive 'Shots' On Friday, Saturday

Since reporting seven positive cases and one doubtful case (August Kirchner) of polio in Kewaskum last week, three new cases have been reported this week by the health officer. They are:

Joan Carol Merwin, age 20 months, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arvin Merwin, Kewaskum. She is a patient at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend.

Robert Reindl, age 7 years, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Reindl, town of Kewaskum. He is a patient at St. Joseph's hospital. Robert is the second case of polio in the Reindl family. He is a brother of Mary Reindl, 11, who was one of the cases reported last week.

Janice Luedtke, age 10 years, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Merlin Luedtke, Kewaskum. She also is a patient at St. Joseph's hospital.

Previously all children and other persons who were exposed to polio were given gamma globulin "shots." Since then it has been deemed necessary to give ALL children of the village between the ages of six months and 12 years the "shots." This mass inoculation of gamma globulin was arranged for Friday and Saturday mornings of this week at the high school gymnasium.

On Friday, Aug. 26, between 8 and 10 a. m. all children (6 months to 12 years) whose last names start with the letters A through M received their "shots" from the staff of doctors and nurses at the high school, which included village volunteers. On Saturday morning, Aug. 27, from 8 to 10 a. m., all children whose names start with N through Z will receive their "shots." Mothers were urged to have the weight and age of each child ready for the attending nurse. One of the parents was asked to accompany their child or children to sign the consent slip.

These gamma globulin inoculations were made possible through the March of Dimes fund. The health officer, Dr. R. G. Edwards, reported that we should all be thankful to the March of Dimes for making these "shots" possible and asks that we give generously when the next drive for funds rolls around. Dr. Edwards, who has been ill himself the past two weeks with what was diagnosed as a mild case of polio, is improved and expects to reopen his office and resume his practice on Monday.

Just in case there is any doubt or the children are getting restless, the voluntary restricting of all boys and girls to their own yards is still in effect. By keeping the children at home and away from crowds together with the gamma globulin inoculations, it is hoped to stop the spread of the disease in this area.

The polio outbreak has necessitated the cancellation of all recreational and athletic activities in

the village. No word has been received as to whether the schools will re-open on schedule for the fall term or not. This depends on polio conditions in the next week or so. Coach Ernie Mitchell of the Kewaskum High school football team called to report that the meeting to hand out equipment to the players which was scheduled for Monday from 4 to 6 p. m. has also been cancelled until a later date. Players will be notified when the meeting will take place.

Because the gamma globulin to inoculate the children was received on very short notice, it was not possible to get advance announcement in the papers. Therefore a radio appeal and a canvass was made throughout the village in an effort to get all children to receive the "shots."

## Several Accidents Occur Past Week

He had entered the hospital last week Tuesday but had been in failing health for some time. He was 62 years of age.

Earl Skaliskey was born Oct. 1, 1893, in the town of Medina in Dane county, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Frank Skaliskey. A bachelor, Mr. Skaliskey is survived only by a number of cousins and many close friends. His parents, two brothers and a sister preceded him in death.

Funeral services were conducted from the Kapfer-Gehl Funeral home in West Bend at 9 a. m. Wednesday and at 9:30 a. m. at St. Mary's Catholic church in Barton, the Rev. O. F. Ulrich officiating. Burial was in St. Joseph's cemetery, Waterloo, Wis.

## John Deere Field Demonstration at Waupun Aug. 31

On Wednesday, Aug. 31, the John Deere Plow company of Moline, Ill. in conjunction with its 135 Wisconsin and Upper Michigan dealers, will stage the second John Deere Field Demonstration Day at Waupun, Wis. Skaliskey Dies

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE) high school in that area. He received his bachelor's degree in agricultural education from the University of Wisconsin in 1917, then joined the army for a time, serving as a radio instructor. He taught biology at Oshkosh for two years and then took over the post of supervising principal of public instruction at Livingston, Wis. After five years he left Livingston to become principal of Kewaskum High school and served as principal here for a period of nine years, until June of 1936. Mr. Skaliskey earned his master's degree in supervision of education in 1932. He became county agent in 1936 and held that position until the time of his death. The deceased was a very active county agent and an ardent pro-

motor of county farming. His achievements and those of county farmers during his years as county agent included these:

The county's soil testing program has been expanded to testing thousands of soil samples yearly. Over 650 dairy farmers now are using artificial insemination. The annual county fair, in which he played a leading role, had grown from a three-day to a four-day fair and the attendance has increased from 12,000 to well over 30,000. The annual barley show is the largest in the state with nearly 200 farmers participating. Orchard men improved their fruit-growing practices and the annual fruit show became a popular event. The junior sire project, under which 25 county 4-H members receive a calf to raise for a year, then enter at the county fair, was zealously supported. County farmers, with Mr. Skaliskey's guidance, adopted numerous

new practices in soil conservation, livestock management, drainage and irrigation, use of fertilizers, weed, pest, and disease control, and development of cash crops.

For his highly successful work as a county agent, Mr. Skaliskey was recognized by the National Association of County Agents, which makes an award annually in each state to two county agents who have served in that post for at least 10 years and have made outstanding records. Mr. Skaliskey gained much respect in the county and was well liked. "Skal" was considered to be one of the outstanding members of the state extension service.

Mr. Skaliskey was an active member of the Robert Romaine American Legion post of Kewaskum.

Basil O'Connor, president of the National Foundation has issued an urgent call to all chapters with more funds on hand than current

needs require. We want to be among the first to co-operate, Mr Staral said. "Since other chapters have aided us in the past, We will have a balance of \$4,645.16 to carry on our program here and, should we run short, we can request that part of the amount we are now sending be returned to us. This fluid use of funds makes everyone's March of Dimes contribution go farther; it is the way our people have of insuring themselves."

While the promise of the Salk vaccine is bright, polio isn't licked yet, the chairman pointed out. He cited a recent statement issued by the National Foundation which showed that the 1955 March of Dimes total for the country fell short by approximately \$12,000,000 of meeting polio needs of this year. Through the call for surpluses to 1,781 chapters which are in the black, it is expected some \$6,000,000 will be made available for 4,274 other chapters that are now in the red because of heavy inroads to help polio patients.

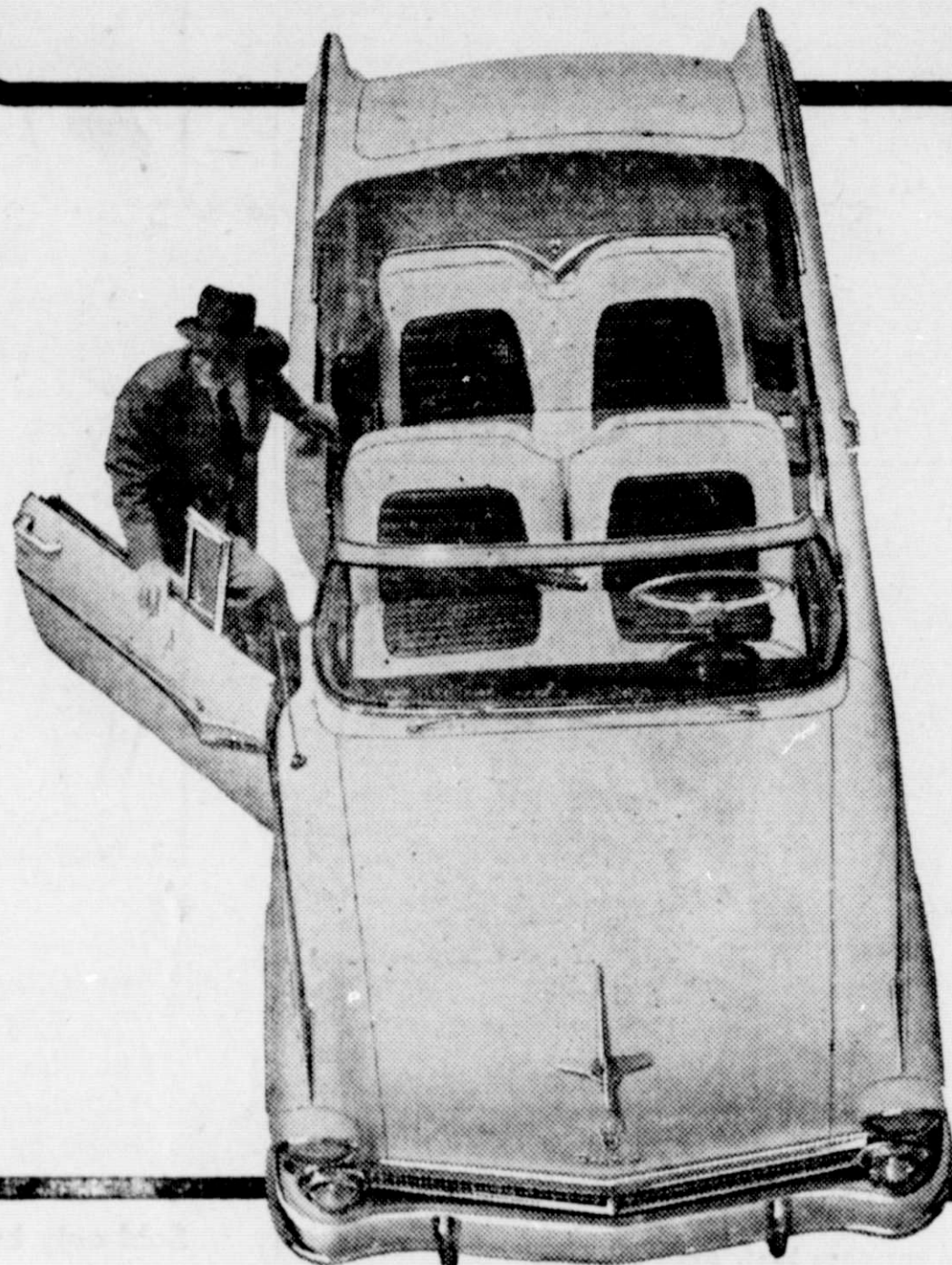
