## Two More Polio Cases Here; 3rd Member of Family Stricken

### Cases Total 12; 300 Children Get Mass Inoculations

During the past week two more cases of polio were reported at Kewaskum, bringing the total cases to date to 12 here. This is by far the largest number of cases ever reported in this area.

The two new cases since our last issue are Gilbert Reindl, town of Kewaskum, who is the third member of his family stricken with the disease. He is the father of a boy, Robert, 7, and a girl, Mary, 11, who were stricken earlier. He was removed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, Saturday. The other new case is Sandi Weddig, 3, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Weddig, Jr. of this village. She became ill on Thursday of this week and was taken to the hospital.

Mass inoculations of gamma globulin for approximately 300 children from six months to 12 years of age were held last Friday and Saturday in the high school gym. The

## Partial Lifting of Polio Ban

Due to the marked, reduced incidence of polio in the village of Kewaskum during the past two weeks, a partial lifting of the ban affecting children was announced by the health officer, Dr. R. G. Edwards, on Thursday night. Children may attend church and Sunday school and play together out-of-doors. Congregating of children indoors is still undesirable and should be avoided.

"shots" were administered from 8 to 10 a. m. each day. Although it was a pain in the you-know-what for the children the inoculations were necessitated in an effort to curb the polio outbreak in the village.

Village health and school officials reported this week that the opening of local schools will be delayed a week because of the epidemic. The Kewaskum Community High and public schools and Holy Trinity Parochial school, which were scheduled to resume classes next week, will not re-open until the following Monday, Sept. 12, if a number of new cases of polio are reported within the next week the opening of school may be delayed even longer.

Voluntary restrictions to keep children off the streets and from public gatherings were in effect the past couple of weeks. All public gatherings and activities were cancelled and children were excused from attending church services. It is hoped that the cooler weather of the past week may halt the polio outbreak. The Kewaskum theatre, which has been closed since Aug. 18 because of the epidemic, re-opened for business on Friday night of this week.

Dr. R. G. Edwards, health officer for the village and town of Kewas-

kum, issued the order postponing the opening of schools. The postponement was approved by the Kewaskum school board and the Rev. F. C. La Buwi, pastor of Holy Trinity parish. In issuing the order, Dr. Edwards stated that he believes "an emergency still exists in the village and town of Kewaskum on account of the prevalence of poliomyelitis" and therefore finds it necessary to delay the opening of schools.

Two deaths have occurred in Washington county to date as the result of polio. They were Alvin B. Miller, Jr., 19, R. 3, West Bend, and Henry Walter Lentz, 23, Hartford. Both died on Aug. 22.

### MARY OPGENORTH CHOSEN AS CHAIRMAN OF UW HALL

Mary C. Opgenorth, Route 3, Kewaskum, student at the University of Wisconsin, has been chosen judicial chairman of Elizabeth Waters Hall at the state university and will be serving in office during the coming 1955-56 school year.

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## Siamese Student From Thailand Visiting Here Describes History Of Country in Special Article

EDITOR'S NOTE—The following article was written especially for the Statesman, at the editor's request, by Detchard Vongkomolshet of Bangkok, Thailand, a foreign student who is visiting at the Ray Schaefer home in the town of Kewaskum. Detchard is one of 52 students from other countries who will be studying in American colleges and universities this year. As part of an "orientation course" planned by the University of Wisconsin these students lived for a week with American families. Five of them spent the week in Washington county. Detchard received his degree from the University of Bangkok and will continue further studies in political science and economics at Cornell university.

### A COUNTRY WITH TWIN NAMES

Anybody who happens to be a reader of this short article about an anybody - knows - much - about country with twin names of Asia, written by a visiting native of the above-mentioned country to Kewaskum, Wisconsin, does not have to be surprised or pretend to be surprised because it is a reality. I hope that this article which the writer wants to be brief and succinct will, more or less, not waste you any time in reading it.

This country with twin names is Thailand or Siam as popularly known. To illustrate more elaborately about this country, I should have to mention Siamese Twins, Siamese cats and Anna and the King of Siam (a book written partly true, partly false about the court life of Siam) and that famous

stage hit—The King and I. After reading this additional explanation, I hoped the reader would say "Yes, I am quite familiar with this kind of stuff." But that's not enough to know a country.

Thailand is a country in south east Asia. Perhaps the reader can locate where this country is after reading this following illustration. On the west side lies Burma, on the east side lies Indochina, on the north lies Communist China, and down south lies Malaya and the Crown Colony of Singapore. If you still cannot figure it out, please refer to the map.

About 900 years ago, our ancestors settled down peacefully on the Altai Valley in the southern part of China which now is the Hunnan Province. Our ancestors were invaded by the aggressive Chinese warrior by the name of Kublai Khan and were driven south. The first settlement after having fled from the aggressor was Sukothai which is now a city in the northern part. This peace-loving people called themselves Thai which means FREE. But the Chinese still called them SIAM which means BARBARIANS. After 400 years of peaceful settlement at Sukothai (which means Land of the Happy Free), our forefathers moved southward and established a new capital called Ayuthia under the Ayuthia Dynasty rule which lasted for about 300 years. Then our capital was moved to Dhonburi, a city on the other side of the Chao Phya River opposite Bangkok, which lasted for 20 years and then our capital was moved to Bangkok by a victorious warrior who, after having established Bangkok as the capital, became the first King of Bangkok and the founder of the Chakri Dynasty which still rules Thailand. That probably is the shortest history of Thailand.

Thailand is an agricultural country. Its area is about the size of

Texas or France. The population is about 20 millions including 300,000 Chinese. 75% of its people are rice farmers who are the vital backbone of our economy. Over a century, Thailand was known as the greatest rice producer in the world and was called "The Rice Bowl of Asia." This remark is quite true that before they started the World War II, the Japanese troops invaded Thailand first and gained control of our rice product in order to assure the sufficient food supply. Thailand is rich in natural resources which is usually elaborated by an old saying which reads: In the land we have rice; in the water we have fish and in the heart we have love.

Thailand is the only country in the Far East that has its own political characteristic: it is all-time independent or never was under any colonial government. In the old days—in the Sukothai period down to 1931—our government was absolute monarchy. A revolution broke out on June 24, 1932 and from then on, the system of government was changed to constitutional monarchy and June 24 became our National Day as your Fourth of July. The King is the symbolic head of the state (the name of our present King is Pumphipol Aduldet, 27, born at Boston, Massachusetts, U. S. A. while his Royal Father, Prince Mahidol was studying medicine). Our cabinet system is similar to that of Britain: that is we have a Prime Minister with ministers as head of 14 ministries or departments. The Prime Minister is responsible for the administration in general while each minister must be responsible for the policy of each particular departments. The cabinet is held responsible by the Parliament for the administration. On the legislative front, we have a Parliament which consists of one House of Representatives. The House has 2 categories of members: first category members are elected by the people by means of free, open and competitive votes; the second category members are appointed by His Majesty the King. Every bill that passed the House must, in order to

become law, bear the King's signature and must be countersigned by the Prime Minister. On the judicial side, we have the Supreme Court, Court of Appeals and Criminal and Civil Court. All in all, Thailand has a very strong and stable government and relatively strong armed forces.

In the field of local administration, Thailand is divided into 74 provinces with a Governor for each province as the responsible administrator, a Provincial Assembly. A province is subdivided into districts, counties and villages and each subdivision has its own responsible administrator and an assembly with elected members.

Thailand is the 52 member of the United Nations and was and still is very active in the UN work. Thailand was the first country that sent upon the request of the UN, expeditionary forces at its own expenses to Korea to repel the aggressor and our soldiers fought so bravely side by side the Yankees that they were called "Little Tigers" by Gen. James A. Van Fleet. In her capital city of Bangkok, an imposing building was named after the UN and dedicated for the offices of the UN specialized agencies: ECAFE, ICAO, FAO and others. People and leaders of Thailand have great faith in the UN.

The ties, both diplomatic and economic, between the United States and Thailand are incomparable. In the capital city of Bangkok, there are about 600 Americans who are soldiers and businessmen. Peoples of these two countries have many things in common: friendliness, generosity and common enemy—the Communists. Even in a small village far away from Bangkok, you can have a coke to drink which costs you only 5 cents. American cars of every brand jam the cities which, in turn, are great traffic problems for the national and local government. Our Royal Army, Navy and Air Force are patterned on that of the U. S. which is the outcome of the Military Advisory Assistance Group known as MAAG which is being stationed in Thailand as part of military aid. The

American history, names of American victorious generals and leaders of the U. S. are well known to our younger generation even in elementary schools.

I would like to bring the introduction to the country with twin names to an end. This short article is written upon the request of the editor of this newspaper. The writer is a visiting Siamese to Kewaskum, Wisconsin, a Smith-Mundt-Fulbright grantee 1955-1956. I came to Kewaskum to live with an average American family (the Schaefer's) in order to get acquainted to the American way of living which is a part of the orientation program of the University of Wisconsin. My university destination is Cornell university, Ithaca, New York. As far as I am concerned, Kewaskum is an ideal place to settle down and Kewaskum people are incomparably friendly, most courteous and the most unforgettable people I have ever met. I will always cherish my stay here as long as I live. On this auspicious occasion, allow me to say thank you to you all and good bye. If someone asks me this one-million dollar question, "How do you like Kewaskum?" the only word I could answer is WONDERFUL.

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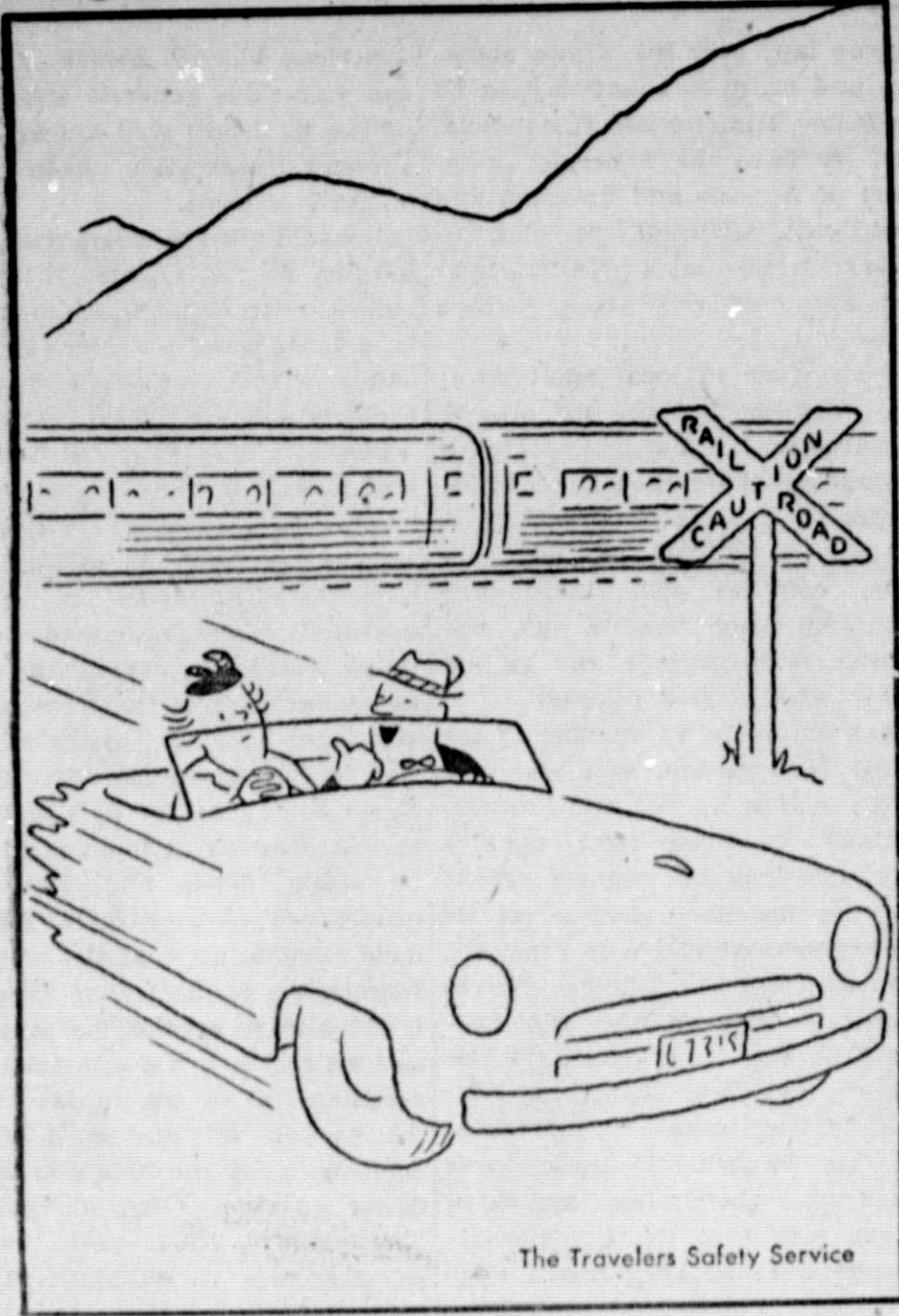

The following letter was received from John H. Kougl, RDI, son of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Kougl, R. I. Kewaskum:

11 August 1955

Dear Sir:

This is to notify you of my change of address. I have been transferred from the U. S. S. Currituck to the U. S. Naval Amphibious Base, Little Creek, Norfolk, for four months humanitarian shore duty. They have assigned me to permanent shore patrol for that period, so I would like to have my paper sent to my home address, which is: 3809 Peterson St., Norfolk, Va.

By being transferred, I have missed out on a two-month cruise in

to South America, which the Currituck is now making. It will visit nine ports from Trinidad and Port of Spain to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. On this cruise the ship will cross the Equator, where many "Polliwogs" are to be initiated into King Neptune's domaine, and thereafter be known as "Shellbacks." King Neptune is noted as the ruler of the seas, and the ceremony of crossing the Equator has long been a navy custom. 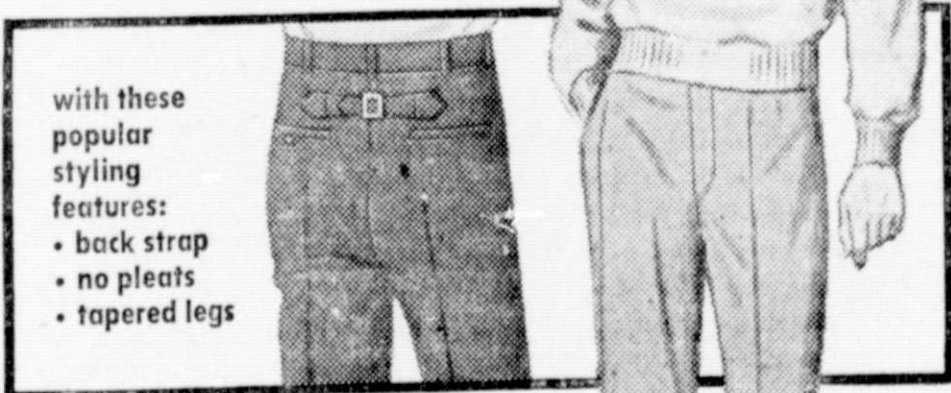
