## Only 1 New Polio Case; Outlook Better

CONDITION OF TWO VICTIMS STILL SERIOUS, ALL OTHERS REPORTED IMPROVED

One more polio case was reported in the village over the week end, bringing the total number of cases to 13 here during the present epidemic. He is Lloyd Klemke, 17, son of the Henry Weidmans, who was taken to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend.

This was the only new case in a week and Dr. R. G. Edwards, health officer, stated that the current outbreak of the disease seems to be tapering off. It was hoped that the village and surrounding area would soon see an end to the epidemic. However, September is still a bad month for polio.

It was reported that another 17 year old girl who lives outside of Kewaskum had polio but she was not listed as a local case because she is employed in West Bend.

The Kewaskum theatre has reopened, children again are allowed to attend church services, schools will be opened Monday and the restriction confining children to their yards has been lifted, but parents are urged to keep the boys and girls away from gatherings as much as possible.

The condition of Gilbert Reindl, town of Kewaskum, who was the third member of his family to be stricken with polio, turned critical last Friday at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend. An iron lung was rushed to the hospital from South View hospital, Milwaukee, and Reindl was placed in it. The iron lung probably saved his life. His condition was reported Friday to be slightly improved although he is still confined to the iron lung.

Over the holiday week end Reindl's brothers, sisters, in-laws, relatives and neighbors gathered at his farm to harvest the corn crop and take care of his other farm work in a neighborly gesture. The men did the farm work and the women did the cooking. With a large group busy, the work was easily completed.

Dr. Edwards reported at this writing that the only other polio patient whose condition was still quite serious is Steven Frazier. All of the other local patients are improving as well as can be expected and their condition is good. Another of the patients, Joel Peterson, returned home from the hospital this week.

## Yearling Girl Killed When Struck By Car

A seven year old Kewaskum girl was struck and killed by a car on Saturday morning bringing the Washington county accident toll for the year to 13.

Darlene Schladweiler Yearling, 7, of R. 1, Kewaskum, suffered a broken leg, fractured neck and multiple bruises when she was struck by a car driven by Mrs. Mary A. Jones, 31, of Random Lake, on Hwy. 144 in Boltonville.

According to the sheriff's report the girl had picked up the mail at the east side of the road and apparently was bringing it back to the home of her grandparents across the road when the accident happened. The grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. Peter Yearling, Sr.

The driver said she did not see the tot until she was thrown up on to the left side of the hood of her car. The girl's body fell to the highway about 180 feet from the scene of the impact. There were no skid marks on the highway. The left side of the car and hood were damaged. The family physician and the deputy coroner were called to the scene of the mishap.

Darlene, daughter of Mrs. Peter Yearling, Jr., and the late Erwin Schladweiler, was born in West Bend on March 17, 1948. She is survived by her mother (the former Catherine Peters), her stepfather, a sister, Donna, 2 years; her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Schladweiler of West Bend and Mr. and Mrs. Peter Yearling, Sr. of Boltonville, and many uncles and aunts, cousins and friends. Her father died in 1948.

The Rev. Urban officiated at funeral services in St. Michael's church, St. Michaels, at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning, Sept. 6. Burial was in the parish cemetery. The Miller Funeral home of Kewaskum was in charge.

A second accident victim over the week end, also on Saturday, the 14th of the year in the county, was Albert J. Rudnitski, 38, of Rubicon. He was injured at 6:20 p. m. Friday when he lost control of his car on Hwy. 60 about a half mile east of Hartford and the vehicle rolled over. He was thrown from the car and died at 11:45 p. m. Saturday in St. Joseph's hospital Hartford.

## State Beagle Club Trial Held Here; 115 Dogs Entered

The 33rd annual American Kennel club licensed championship field trial of the Wisconsin Beagle club was held at Kewaskum over the Labor Day week end. A total of 115 beagles were entered in the trial, one of the largest number of entries ever to compete in the event.

The trial was a marked success although the dryness of the ground greatly hindered the running of the dogs. Headquarters for the beagle hounds were the kennels of Joe Eberle, who serves as president of the club.

The club again held a bench show this year in conjunction with the trial. This event took place in the Modern Woodmen hall Saturday evening with 30 dogs participating, a larger number than usual.

Beagles from several states outside of Wisconsin competed in the trial, including some from a long distance. The dogs were run on cottontail rabbits in the fields and swamps surrounding Kewaskum. Trophies, ribbons and points toward championship were awarded the winning dogs.

Ordinarily held the last week in September or first week in October, the field trial was held earlier this year over the holiday week end to attract a larger entry and succeeded in doing so. Entries in both the trial and show were among the largest ever to participate in the affair.

## Richard P. Ruplinger, 22, Dies of Polio

Richard P. Ruplinger, 22, of 922 Terrace drive, West Bend, a son of Mrs. Grace Ruplinger of Kewaskum and a former village resident, died of polio at 7:10 p. m. Saturday night, Sept. 3, at St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend. His was the third polio fatality in Washington county during the current outbreak.

The young man, whose case was diagnosed as bulbar polio, was ill only two days. He was stricken on Thursday and taken to the hospital Friday, where he passed away the next night. Ruplinger was employed as a leather cutter at the Amity Leather Products Co. in West Bend.

Previously a town of West Bend young man, Alvin Bumiller, Jr., 19, and a Hartford man, Henry Lentz, 23, died of the disease. Both deaths occurred in August.

Ruplinger was a veteran of 21 months service with the army in Korea. He was a member of St. Frances Cabrini parish, West Bend, and the Holy Name society.

The young man was born Dec. 5, 1932, at St. Killian, the son of Mrs. Grace Ruplinger and the late Arthur Ruplinger. He graduated from Holy Trinity school, Kewaskum and resided here until the time he was married. His marriage to the former Angeline Schladweiler took place at St. Michaels on Dec. 29, 1951. Following their marriage they resided in the town of Farmington prior to making their home in West Bend.

Mrs. Ruplinger survives her husband together with two small children, Edward, 3, and Sandra Lee, 7 months. He also leaves his mother, Mrs. Grace Ruplinger, Kewaskum; a sister, Crescentia, also of Kewaskum; four brothers, Wilbert, Roland and Marvin, all of West Bend, and Pvt. Sylvester Ruplinger, stationed in Austria with the U. S. army, and his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Mich. Feucht of LeRoy, Wis.

Funeral services were conducted at the Kapfer-Gehl Funeral home, West Bend, at 9 a. m. Wednesday, Sept. 7, and at Holy Angels church at 9:30, the Rev. Edmund Haen officiating. Burial was in Holy Angels cemetery. Members of the Adrian Neubauer VFW post of Barton formed an honor guard and conducted the graveside rites.

Pallbearers were Leon Krapf, Roland Flasch, Harold Ruplinger, Leo Schladweiler, Roger Spaeth and Alois Bremser.

## Schools Open Monday After Delay of Week

EXPECT ENROLLMENT OF 240 AT HOLY TRINITY FOR SIZEABLE INCREASE

The Kewaskum Community High school and grade schools and Holy Trinity Parochial school will open on Monday, Sept. 12, after a delay of one week due to the polio epidemic in the community.

Registration of high school freshmen was held on June 21. Freshmen who have not registered, transfers and other students not registered previously will register opening day. High school classes start at 8:25 a. m. and 1 p. m. The high school and grade school teaching staff of 20 teachers was announced in our last issue.

Kindergarten will again be held in the municipal building. The junior group will meet from 9-11:15 each morning and the senior group from 1-3:15 each afternoon. First grade this year will be held in the American Legion building. Grade school classes start at 8:45 a. m. and 1 p. m.

An enrollment of 240 pupils is expected at Holy Trinity school when classes are resumed Monday. This will be a sizeable increase in enrollment over last year when 208 pupils started the school term.

Five school sisters again will make up the teaching staff at the school. The sisters and the classes they will teach are as follows: Sr. M. Melissa, grades 1 and 2; Sr. Mary Donna, grades 2 and 3; Sr. M. Adolpha, grades 4 and 5; Sr. M. Carlotta, grades 5 and 6; Sr. M. Maurita, grades 7 and 8.

One of the sisters is new this year, namely Sr. M. Carlotta of Bronx, New York city, who succeeds Sr. Mary Roland, who has been transferred to St. Luke, Two Rivers.

There will also be a new domestic sister. She is Sr. M. Francesca of Decatur, Indiana, who succeeds the deceased Sr. M. Leonarda.

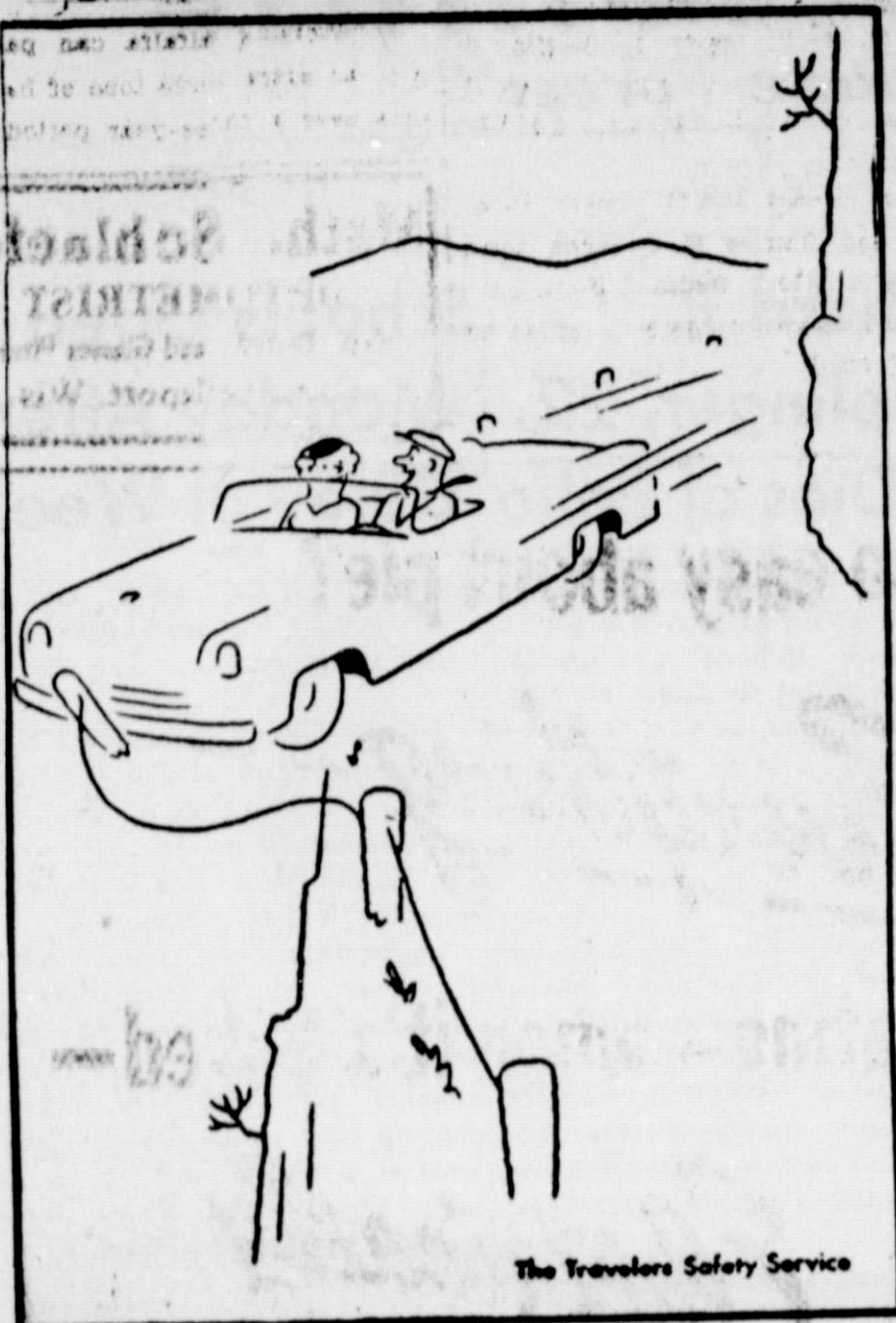



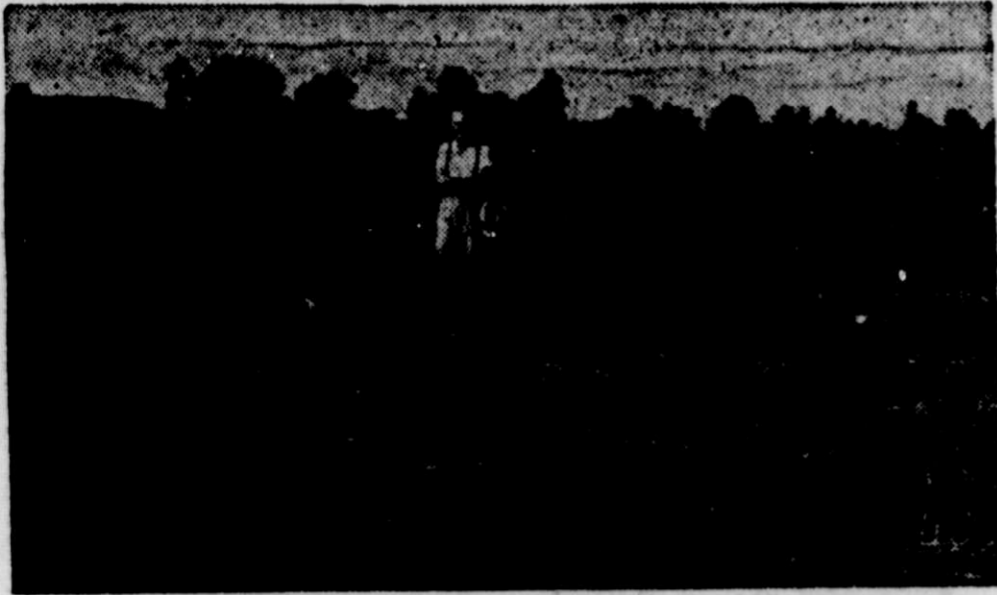

## Top-Dress Alfalfa This Fall For Extra Tons of Hay in '56



Annual fall top-dressings since 1950 are maintaining alfalfa yields at 3½ and 4 tons per acre, on this Barron county, Wis., field.

Top-dressing legume-grass meadows late this summer with phosphate and potash fertilizer can pay off in extra tons of higher quality hay next year.

Another dividend will come in added protection against damage to the legumes from winter killing, reports the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee.

To obtain fullest benefits from the top-dressing, the fertilizer should be put on as soon as possible after the last cutting of hay, says the committee.

"Plant food added late in the summer or early in the autumn," says the committee, "will help increase the fall growth of the legumes."

"It will also enable the plants to store up nutrients in their roots. This is important in tiding the legumes over severe winter weather. Strong, well-nourished roots anchor themselves more solidly in the soil. Thus they are

able to withstand the effects of heaving during alternate periods of freezing and thawing.

"When legumes are fed plenty of phosphate and potash, they come through the winter with enough nutrients in their roots to start growth vigorously in the spring."

The committee points out that it pays, also, to top-dress new legume-grass seedings with phosphate-potash fertilizer in cases where they did not receive enough plant food at seeding time. Here again, the nutrients provided by the top-dressing will help the legumes develop deeper, thicker root systems to carry them safely through extreme winter conditions.

Applications of from 300 to 500 pounds per acre of a fertilizer such as 0-20-10, 0-20-20, 0-10-20, or 0-10-30 are recommended by some agronomists, depending on the soil's need for phosphate and potash, says the committee.

## Like to Join a Homemaker Club?

It's easy to become a member in one of our homemakers clubs in Washington county. Since September of 1954, seven new clubs with a 100 member increase has become a part of the county group.

If you would like information about forming a club or joining one, you may call home agent FEDERAL 4-4746, West Bend or contact the county president, Mrs. Donald Roemer of R. 3, Hartford. In case you live near any of the center chairmen, you may talk to them. They are Mrs. Wilbert Roemer, R. 1, Hartford; Mrs. Casper Schmitt, Hubertus; Mrs. John Gerner, R. 5, West Bend; Mrs. Sylvester Bales, R. 2, Kewaskum; Mrs. Henry Beuscher, Rockfield.

There are several clubs in the county which would like to increase their membership. Some meet afternoons and others during the evening. You may receive the names from the home agent's office.

Membership in the clubs is completely voluntary. Any woman may join a club and is not obligated to

remain a member unless she finds it satisfying and enjoyable.

Clubs meet once a month from September through May. Most meetings are held in homes but a few meet in public places due to space.

Each club has a group of officers who conduct the meetings which include both an educational and social period.

Two project leaders are trained at a center training meeting each month and bring helpful tips to the homemakers at the club meetings.

Project meetings will start in October with "centerpieces"—how to arrange them, making original centerpieces, and combining the right colors, designs, and textures in making them.

"County Government"—how the various departments function, services performed, and county laws will be included in the November project to improve ourselves as citizens.

In January a project phase on "Weight Control" will be studied. Improving family health through good planning of food, exercise and rest, how to cut down weight, what causes under and over weight and determining what our weight should be will be included.

Homemakers will study figure types and different patterns to determine the styles best for certain figure types. Things to look for when choosing patterns and styles will be a part of "Selecting Patterns for Figure Types" in February.

"Children's Toys and Entertaining Children" will be the March project with a study of selecting toys, making simple and inexpensive toys, and choosing good activities for children's spare time.

April will bring "Milk and Egg Cookery" to coordinate with the 4-H foods project for 1956. Homemakers who have 4-H daughters can work together in preparing easy and attractive meals using eggs and milk, and study the importance of these foods.

People who aren't members of homemakers groups are welcome to attend any or all of the project training meetings. Dates and places of meetings are announced on the radio and in news articles. More information can be obtained from the home agent's office. Feel welcome to drop a card or call anytime.
