Public Schools Open With 478 Enrollment; 267 in High School

The Kewaskum Community High school and public school opened Monday with a total enrollment of 478 pupils, a slight decrease from last year's opening day figure. Opening of the schools was delayed a week because of the polio epidemic here.

Last year's enrollment on the first day was 491, 13 more than this year's total. The decrease occurred in the grades. Last term 224 started grade school compared Koerble, to 211 this year. The high school enrollment is 267, the exact number which began school last year on the first day. Last year's total was a record high for the schools. 246 Enrolled at Holy Trinity Sets Record

Holy Trnnity parish school opened Monday with another record enrollment of 246 pupils. Last year's enrollment of 212 set an alltime high and this term the figure far exceeds that of last year. 

Worker on New **Plant Here Dies**

1956 Ford **Offers Five Safety Features**

Vincent Motors, Kewaskum, announced this week that as a result of its crash-injury research program, the Ford Motor Co. announced its 1956 models will incorporate a new safety concept of "packaging the passenger" as means of limiting injury in accidents.

The 1956 models for the first time in automotive history will feature a five-part package of safety devices which include:

1. A deep-centered safety steering wheel which slowly gives way under crash impact, thus absorbing the energy and distributing it over the driver's chest.

2. Safety door latches, designed to prevent the door from springing open under impact, giving the passener added protection against being thrown out of the car.

3. Safety belts structurally anchored to the vehicle with a steel plate.

4. Crash cushioning which will be available for the instrument panel and sun visors.



The company's 'packaging the passenger" is based on the principle of first trying to keep the passengers within the vehicle during an accident, and then designing car components to help occupants absorb the energy of the crash. Each of the new safety devices was given numerous tests in the field, including simulated accidents with life-like dummies.

Research indicated a passenger's chances of escaping injury in an accident are twice as great if he remains within the protective shell of the vehicle. The safety door latches were designed for this purpose. Restraining seat belts not only help occupants inside the vehicle but also reduce the possibility of their being thrown against the instrument panel or windshield area. Belts will be available for both front and rear seats. Ford's crash padding for the instrument panel and sun visors will be five times more shock-absorbent than sponge rubber. 
