## Public Schools Open With 478 Enrollment; 267 in High School

The Kewaskum Community High school and public school opened Monday with a total enrollment of 478 pupils, a slight decrease from last year's opening day figure. Opening of the schools was delayed a week because of the polio epidemic here.

Last year's enrollment on the first day was 491, 13 more than this year's total. The decrease occurred in the grades. Last term 224 started grade school compared to 211 this year. The high school enrollment is 267, the exact number which began school last year on the first day. Last year's total was a record high for the schools. The above enrollment figures do not include the pupils who are out of school with polio and who will not start school until they have recovered.

A class of 67 freshmen entered high school, 11 less than last year's class of 78. The sophomore class is the largest with 73 students. Only 11 pupils started the first grade, which keeps down the enrollment. The largest class in the grades is the senior kindergarten with 33.

## Good News! No New Polio Cases

No new polio cases were reported in Kewaskum and community the past week, according to Dr. R. G. Edwards, health officer. Apparently the outbreak is tapering off and it is hoped that this area has seen an end to the epidemic. In all Kewaskum had 13 cases to date.

Dr. Edwards stated that the children of this village were fortunate in being able to receive gamma globulin inoculations as there is an acute shortage of gamma globulin now. Over 300 children received the "shots" here recently. One of the local polio patients, Steven Frazier, 11, was transferred from St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, to a Milwaukee hospital, in the firemen's ambulance Saturday.

Another patient, Frank Schoenbeck, 8, has returned home from St. Joseph's hospital.

## 246 Enrolled at Holy Trinity Sets Record

Holy Trinity parish school opened Monday with another record enrollment of 246 pupils. Last year's enrollment of 212 set an all-time high and this term the figure far exceeds that of last year. The school shows an increase of 34 pupils in one year. Last year the increase was very slight but took a big jump this fall.

# 1956 Ford Offers Five Safety Features

Vincent Motors, Kewaskum, announced this week that as a result of its crash-injury research program, the Ford Motor Co. announced its 1956 models will incorporate a new safety concept of "packaging the passenger" as a means of limiting injury in accidents.

The 1956 models for the first time in automotive history will feature a five-part package of safety devices which include:

1. A deep-centered safety steering wheel which slowly gives way under crash impact, thus absorbing the energy and distributing it over the driver's chest.
2. Safety door latches, designed to prevent the door from springing open under impact, giving the passenger added protection against being thrown out of the car.
3. Safety belts structurally anchored to the vehicle with a steel plate.
4. Crash cushioning which will be available for the instrument panel and sun visors.
5. Safety rear-view mirrors with a specially prepared backing to reduce the possibility of glass shattering.

Auto crash research studies made

by the Cornell University medical college reveal that almost half of all injuries suffered in auto accidents are received on the steering wheel, instrument panel, mirror, or by being ejected from the vehicle. Ford engineers said their new steering wheel is much safer than those which collapse under impact, thus exposing the driver to the steering column. The company's "packaging the passenger" is based on the principle of first trying to keep the passengers within the vehicle during an accident, and then designing car components to help occupants absorb the energy of the crash. Each of the new safety devices was given numerous tests in the field, including simulated accidents with life-like dummies.

Research indicated a passenger's chances of escaping injury in an accident are twice as great if he remains within the protective shell of the vehicle. The safety door latches were designed for this purpose. Restraining seat belts not only help occupants inside the vehicle but also reduce the possibility of their being thrown against the instrument panel or windshield area. Belts will be available for both front and rear seats. Ford's crash padding for the instrument panel and sun visors will be five times more shock-absorbent than sponge rubber. Another Ford safety feature will come in a new design of the front and back seat supports which reduces the possibility of the seats coming loose under severe shock. For its 1956 models Ford will

stress "lifeguard design," in addition to "Thunderbird styling and Thunderbird power." Ford cars will have the powerful Thunderbird sports car engine for 1956.
