Russell H. Belger, 33, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Belger, 4107 North 46th street, Milwaukee, former residents of Kewaskum, passed away on Monday, Oct. 3, at Misericordia hospital in that city after a long illness.

The young man was born in Kewaskum and graduated from the local public and high schools. The family moved to Milwaukee from Kewaskum in recent years. Russell was in the navy in World War II, serving overseas in the Mediterranean area. He was employed as a clerk in the Milwaukee office of the Union Pacific railroad, 212 W. Wisconsin avenue for the last eight years.

## Missionary from Honduras to Talk At Peace Church

The Rev. Walter Herrscher, furloughed missionary from Honduras, Central America, will be the guest speaker at Peace church on Sunday, Oct. 9, at 10:00 a. m. and at 6:00 p. m. at an informal meeting in the church parlors. He will also speak over Station WBKV at 8:30 a. m. on the same day.

The Rev. Mr. Herrscher has spent 28 years of his life in Honduras. During that time he has not only been in charge of the seminary and general missionary activities at Pinalejo, Dept. of Santa Barbara Honduras, but also has served the mission as its treasurer.

Mr. Herrscher sees in Latin America "The Continent of Hope." "She demands our respect and a place in the world," says Mr. Herrscher. He is aware of a new interest in Latin America. "It is about like a rising tide" but he adds, "Shall this new interest be commercial and diplomatic only? Will Christian men and women permit the lure of gain or chance for political advantage to be the chief expressions of North America's interest in her sister continent? Shall our churches permit the impact of the new commercial invasion of Latin America by our manufacturers, our merchants and our bankers to be delivered without seeking to christianize the impact? God has great designs of grace for the people of Latin America and it is for us to be wise in the day of His power."

The Rev. Mr. Herrscher was educated in Elmhurst college, Elmhurst, Illinois, Eden Theological seminary, St. Louis, Mo., Pacific School of Religion, Los Angeles, Calif. and Berkeley Divinity school, Berkeley, Calif. He was commissioned as a missionary to Honduras by the Board of International Missions of the Evangelical and Reformed church on Sept. 8, 1927, and arrived on the field on Oct. 5. He is married and has three children. Joanne, the eldest, is married and lives in Rio de Janeiro; Helen, together with her husband, the Rev. Eugene Braun, is serving as a missionary nurse at Picalqui, Ecuador. Walter, who graduated from Elmhurst in June of this year, married Margery, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Siebert of Hartford, Wis. and is serving with the armed forces of the USA.

### HUNTERS MUST HAVE FARMER'S CONSENT TO HUNT IN FIELDS

If you don't want hunters in your fields, there are two easy ways to let them know they aren't welcome, says J. H. Beuscher, University of Wisconsin farm law specialist:

One way is to put up "No trespassing" signs—two for every 40 acres protected. (They can be purchased at the Statesman office). To be legal, the signs must be at least a foot square and give the name of the person making the notice, whether it's the owner or occupant of the land.

Or, if you want to protect all the wild animals in your woodlot you can ask the Wisconsin Conservation Department to have the area declared a state game refuge. Then trespassers would face a state penalty.

A plain board sign lettered "no hunting" or "private property—keep out" won't be any special help, legally, for keeping strangers off your land. Of course, any person who walks or drives on your

farm without permission is technically a trespasser. But unless he has received notice not to be there, you don't have a strong case against him.

Beuscher says posting a legal sign, or simply telling a person to stay off your land, is sufficient "notice" under Wisconsin statutes.

On the other hand, if you're perfectly willing to let other persons hunt on your land, the Conservation Department will declare it a public hunting area and post signs on the land to that effect.

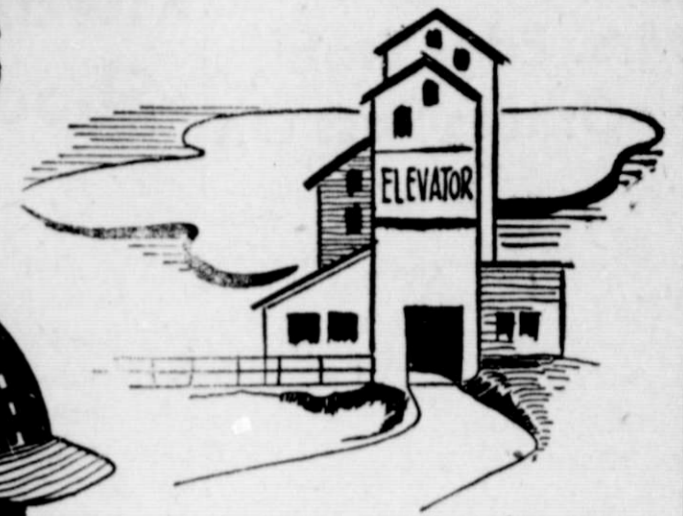

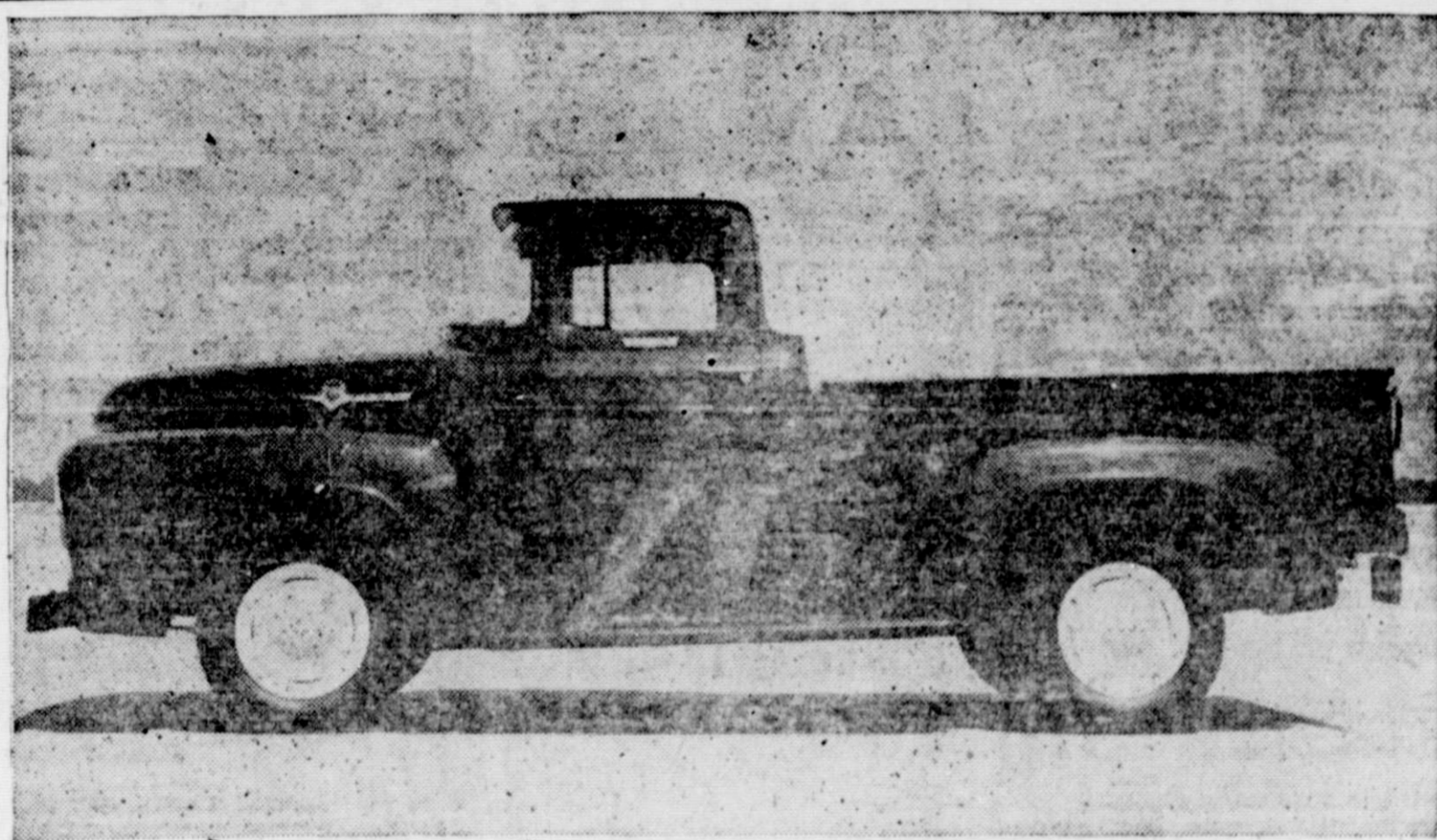

**X-Ray 96 Teachers At County Clinic**

A total of 96 persons were X-rayed by the Wisconsin Anti-Tuberculosis association at a special clinic for Washington county teachers in September at West Bend. Of that number, four persons were advised to consult their private physicians for further examinations.

The clinic, which is financed in part with funds gained through the annual sale of Christmas Seals, was planned by Miss Mary Cook, R. N., county nurse, and H. D. Sheski, secretary of the Washington county health committee.

Tuberculosis kills more persons each year than any other infectious disease, including polio. Last year TB caused the deaths of 216 persons in Wisconsin.

Chest X-rays are recommended annually for all adults, particularly persons 45 and above. Besides TB, chest X-rays help discover cancer, certain heart conditions and other chest disorders.



### Open House at Child Guidance Center Oct. 17-23

The Washington-Ozaukee Child Guidance Center will observe "open house" during the week of Oct. 17-23 at the attractive quarters in the Regner building, 141 N. Main st., Room 215, West Bend.

All interested people are cordially invited to visit the center during the regular daily hours of 9:00 to 4:00 during the week as well as from 2:00 to 5:00 on Sunday, Oct. 23. Public parking is available at the rear of the building.

This bi-county guidance center is an outgrowth of many years of interest and participation by citizens of both counties. Its establishment was finally realized when, in November, 1954, the two county boards appropriated the necessary funds to provide for a psychiatrist, clinic quarters, and secretarial help. The bulk of the funds for the operation of the center comes from federal and state grants issued through the State Board of Health.

On the staff of the new Washington-Ozaukee Child Guidance Center are Dr. Jack J. Coheen, M. D., psychiatrist; William O. Brown, clinical psychologist, and Miss Marian L. Kerr, psychiatric social worker. They work together as a team of specialists to assist parents, churches and schools with the emotional and behavior problems of children.

During the "open house" week a library project, an extension of the center's services, will be initiated in the six public libraries in the two counties. State Board of Health pamphlets on subjects related to mental and emotional health will be on display and catalogued for lending purposes. Over 100 pamphlets on subjects dealing with children's habits and adjustment problems will be made available to the public.

### Indians Defeat North Fondy in Opener, 33-21

After being held up due to the incidence of polio, the Kewaskum Indians finally got their football season underway last Friday night and defeated North Fond du Lac under the lights here in the opener, 33 to 21. Coach Ernie Mitchell's charges did a good job in prying off the lid. In other contests Friday Brandon and Campbellsport won their second games to share first place in the young season.

The North Fondy Orioles put up a game battle before finally bowing to Kewaskum. It was a see-saw battle most of the way with Fondy coming to within five points of the Indians in the final period. The Orioles were hurt by one touchdown being called back in the last quarter because of a backfield in motion penalty.

Halfback Doug Wierman had the best night of his prep career for Kewaskum, scoring a total of four touchdowns and adding an extra point for 25 points for the evening. His longest TD run was a 40-yard scamper and the other scores came on plunges. The remaining Indian touchdowns came on passes from Quarterback Bob Stenman to Wierman and End Don Klein. Halfbacks Tom Peterson and Dave Mertzig picked up extra points.

Quarterback Ron Andrews was the offensive ace for North Fondy, scoring touchdowns on a 45-yard

run and a five-yard plunge. Halfback Doug Ruedinger also picked up a TD for the Orioles. Points after touchdowns came on a pass from Andrew to End Bob Halle, a plunge by Halfback Norman Arenz and a pass from Halle to End Dol Palmer.

The Indians raced what probably was their stiffest test of the season on Friday night of this week when they tackled last year's champion Brandon gridders under the lights here. Brandon copped honors with 7 and 0 last season and have 2 and 0 to start off this campaign. Led by their giant star, Jon Mollien, they have a big, tough squad. With veteran Gil Hammer out of the lineup due to an injury (he did not play against North Fondy) the Indians chances did not appear good.

Next Friday afternoon at 2:30 Kewaskum plays at Random Lake, new team in the Tri-County conference this year.

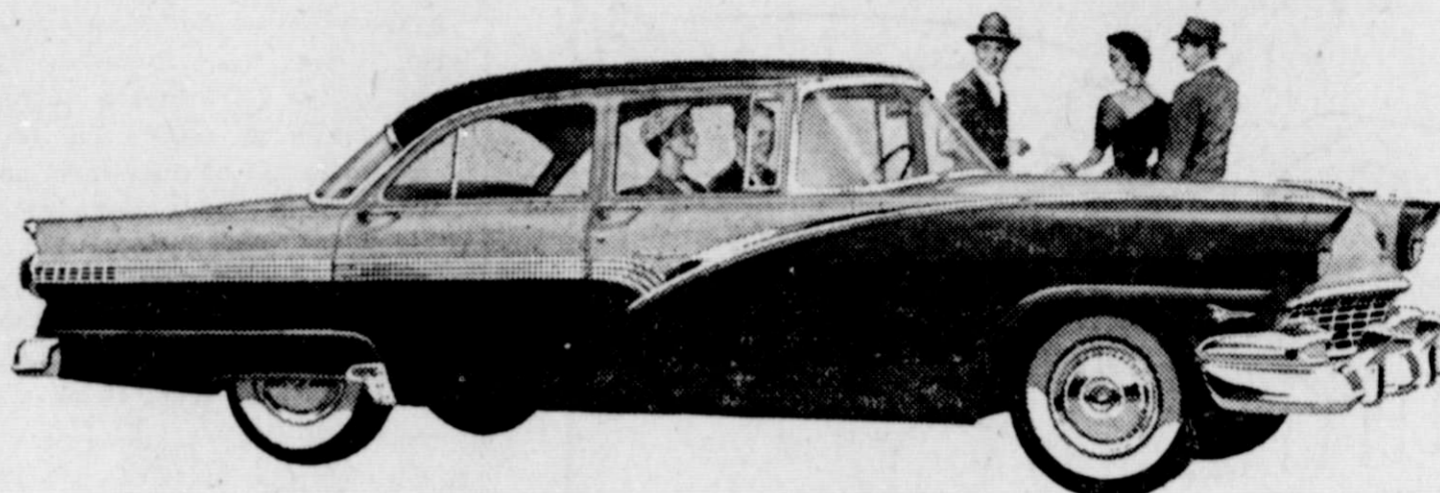
