Kiwanians Continue Efforts to Improve Hwy. 45; Official Talks

KONKOL POINTS OUT THAT AVAILABILITY OF FUNDS IS HELD MAJOR FACTOR

Edward J. Konkol, executive secretary of the Wisconsin Good Roads association, spoke Monday night at the dinner-meeting of the Kewaskum Kiwanis club at the Republican hotel. He summarized some of the major highway problems and needs of the state and nation and pointed out that "we are placing 1960 traffic on outmoded highways."

The Kiwanians invited Konkol to address the club in conjunction with their efforts to foster a program to improve Hwy. 45 in Washington county. Konkol emphasized the nation's tremendous output of new motor vehicles each year with an ever-increasing number of miles traveled per vehicle and the rising number of motor vehicle registrations in the state and county as some of the greatest contributing factors in our steadily growing traffic and parking problems.

The speaker said that the inadequacy of the state's highways is one of the major contributing factors in the ever-rising death toll in Wisconsin. Highway deaths are becoming commonplace and we are beginning to take them for granted. Konkol indicated fatal accident stories are a daily occurrence. In an effort to curb the rising death toll on highways, the state recently passed legislature to increase the number of traffic officers in Wisconsin to 250 from the present 70 men.

The state levied an additional 2 cents gasoline tax and increased the charges for drivers' licenses to raise additional funds to improve our highways. Tremendous increases in highway construction costs on only slightly higher revenues was given as one of the major reasons why our highway improvement program has not kept pace with the need for new roads. Konkol explained, highway construction costs today are approximately \$154,000 per mile for a one lane highway as compared with \$36,000 per mile 20 years ago.

Konkol told the Kiwanians that while there is a program under way to rebuild our state highway system within the next 10 years, many of our roads are breaking down faster than we can rebuild them. Referring to the possibility of an improvement program for Hwy. 45 in Washington county, the speaker said construction of a highway depends primarily on the availability of funds for such a project. Indicating that there are 8,000 miles of highways in the state that must be improved, Konkol asked his audience to "be good neighbors and wait" before considering projects which are not absolutely essential. He said the Wisconsin Highway Commission is faced with a tremendous problem and is doing its best to improve roads as quickly as funds are available.

Kiwanis President "Pat" Miller and E. M. Romaine also spoke briefly on the county's highway problems preceding Konkol's address.

Annual Kiwanis Turkey Shoot Is Big Success

DRAWS HUGE CROWD; 271 TURKEYS, OTHER POULTRY DISPOSED OF; PRIZES AWARDED

The third annual Kewaskum Kiwanis club turkey shoot at the Bar-N Ranch Sunday was a tremendous success all around, by far the most successful ever held. It attracted an exceptionally large crowd of people from near and far. The weather was warm and sunny and ideal for the event.

Several thousand persons attended the all-day shoot, which began shortly after 9 a. m. and lasted until dark. The largest crowd was present in the afternoon between the hours of 2 and 5 p. m. and there was a heavy flow of traffic through the village all day carrying persons to and from the Bar-N.

A total of 271 turkeys were disposed of, 246 of them on the shooting lanes and 25 by other means. Besides the large number of turkeys won, 40 ducks and 13 geese were also disposed of. There was shotgun trap competition, deer rifle target and other competition to win poultry.

The Kiwanians reported that the gross receipts of the shoot were \$3,331. The proceeds will not be known until all expenses are paid. All benefits of the day's event will be contributed for the benefit of youth programs in the community.

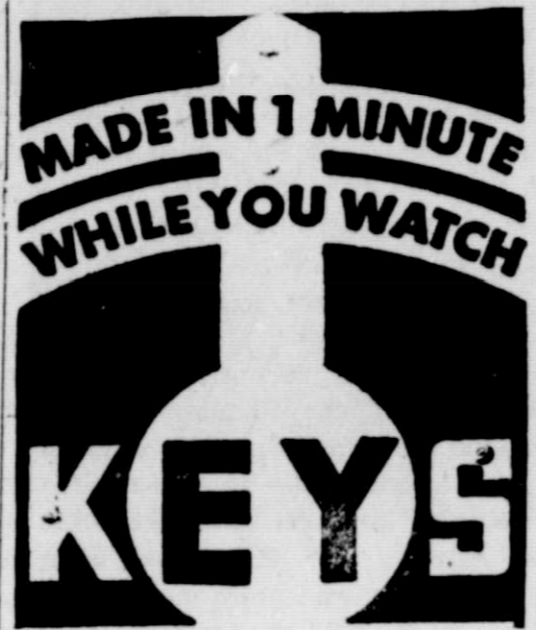

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Indians Rout Brandon in Upset, 38-6

In the biggest upset of the season, Coach Ernie Mitchell's Kewaskum Indians smared previously unbeaten and defending champion Brandon here Friday night, 38 to 6. It wasn't the victory that was surprising, because the Indians have a pretty solid team this season, but it was the margin by which they won.

Brandon, conference champs last year with seven straight victories, and unbeaten this season until Friday, was expected to put up a tight, tough battle against Kewaskum. With a veteran squad, led by big Jon Mollien, they were expected to give the Mitchellmen their stiffest opposition to date. But Mollien was helpless against the Indian defense and the winners ran and passed circles around the invaders.

The Brandon's setback leaves only Kewaskum and Campbellsport in the undefeated ranks. The Bells have played one more game than the Indians due to a contest being cancelled because of polio. The Indian-Bell homecoming game here Oct. 28 now looms as the one which may decide the league championship.

It was amazing with what ease Kewaskum routed Brandon. Jerry Leu raced 60 yards with the opening kickoff to give Brandon a 6-0 lead. After scoring on the first play of the game, that was all for Brandon. From then on the Indians went to work and it was all Kewaskum.

In the second quarter, Doug Wierman scored two touchdowns for the winners, returning an intercepted pass for 30 yards for one of the markers. Halfback Bob Stenman passed to End Tom Peterson for the extra point. That gave Kewaskum a slim 13-6 halftime lead.

The Indians then exploded for four more TD's in the second half. Wierman hit pay dirt for the third time on a 45-yard scamper from scrimmage. Stenman flipped a pass to End Don Klein and the count was 20-6. Peterson tallied on a 20-yard pass play a few minutes later to make it 26-6. Stenman again fired the aerial.

It was Dave Mertzig's turn early in the fourth period as he plunged across the goal line. The final Kewaskum score came on an intercepted pass. Linebacker Gil Hammer grabbed the pitch and scooted across the goal line. Final score, believe it or not, Kewaskum 38, Brandon 6.

On Friday afternoon of this week the Indians played at Random Lake, newcomer in the loop, which has been coming strong of late. The Lakers upset Oakfield last week after a weak start this season. Kewaskum was expected to win al-

though Random could have given them trouble. Next Friday night Oakfield plays here.

This will be a great help to the Girl Scouts of Kewaskum because leadership training will be more easily available and the entire program will be improved.

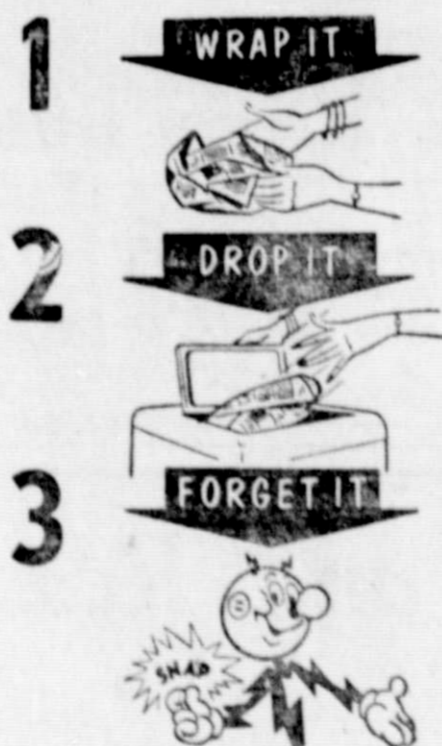

Open House at Child Guidance Center Oct. 17-23

The Washington-Ozaukee Child Guidance Center will observe "open house" during the week of Oct. 17-23 at the attractive quarters in the Regner building, 141 N. Main st., Room 215, West Bend.

All interested people are cordially invited to visit the center during the regular daily hours of 9:00 to 4:00 during the week as well as from 2:00 to 5:00 on Sunday, Oct. 23. Public parking is available at the rear of the building.

This bi-county guidance center is an outgrowth of many years of interest and participation by citizens of both counties. Its establishment was finally realized when, in November, 1954, the two county boards appropriated the necessary funds to provide for a psychiatrist, clinic quarters, and secretarial help. The bulk of the funds for the operation of the center comes from federal and state grants issued through the State Board of Health.

On the staff of the new Washington-Ozaukee Child Guidance Center are Dr. Jack J. Coheen, M. D., psychiatrist; William O. Brown, clinical psychologist, and Miss Marian L. Kerr, psychiatric social worker. They work together as a team of specialists to assist parents, churches and schools with the

emotional and behavior problems of children.

During the "open house" week a library project, an extension of the center's services, will be initiated in the six public libraries in the two counties. State Board of Health pamphlets on subjects related to mental and emotional health will be on display and catalogued for lending purposes. Over 100 pamphlets on subjects dealing with children's habits and adjustment problems will be made available to the public.

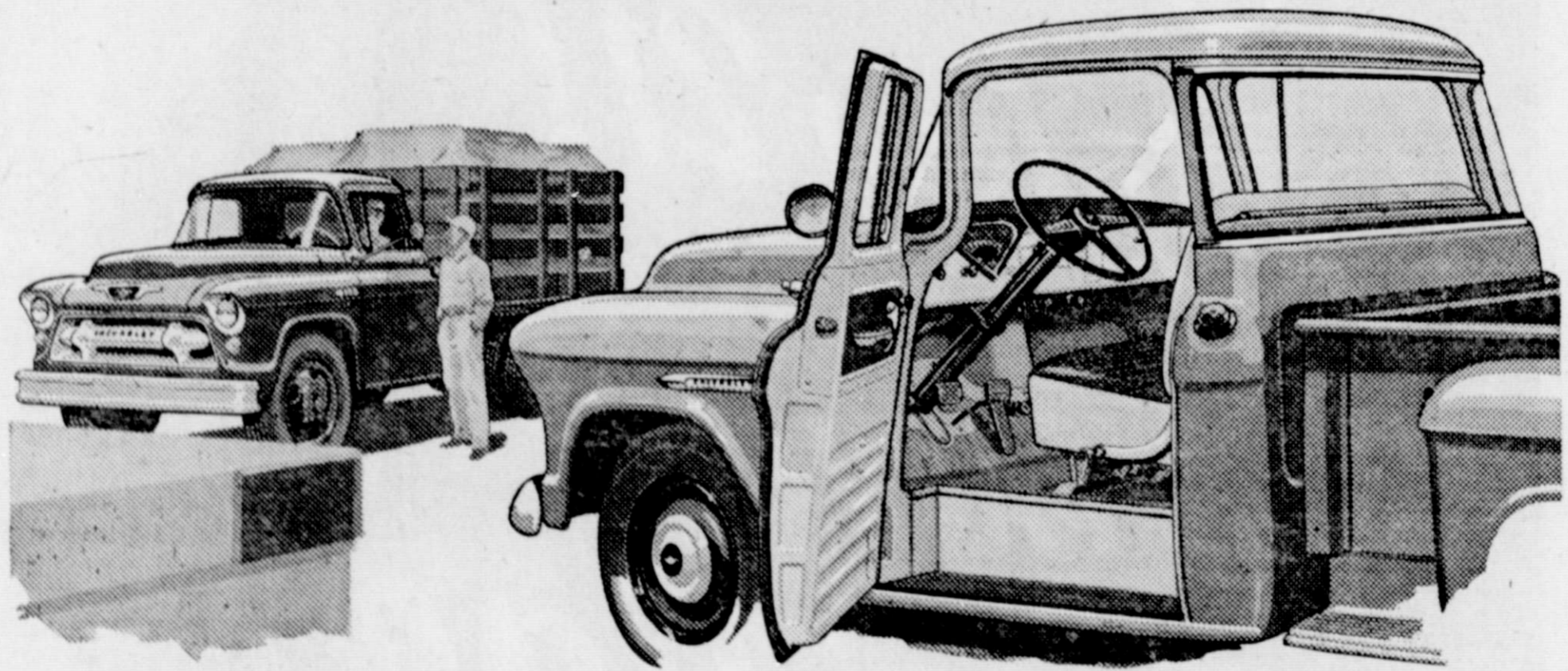

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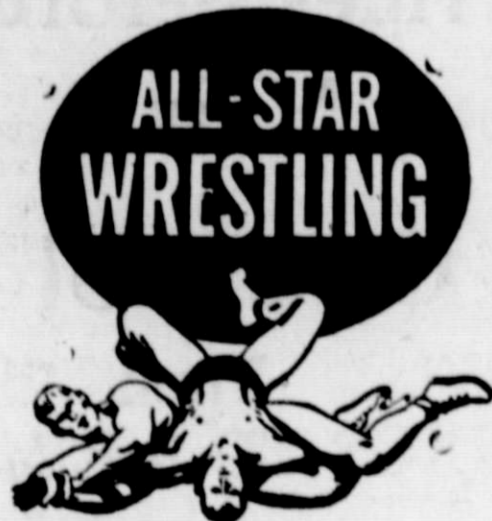
