## 4 Guns Stolen from Car at Bar-N Ranch

Garber and a hunting companion had stayed at the lodge overnight. A window in the auto was broken and the guns removed. Among the loot were a .22 caliber lever action rifle, a 30-30 rifle engraved and carrying the initials, "J. Y. C.," near the hammer, another single-action .22 rifle with grip handle, and a third .22 caliber rifle along with a carton of long rifle .22 caliber bullets.

The sheriff said that clues are being followed in an effort to learn identity of the thieves.

## Indians Run Wild Over Oaks, 54-6; Fourth in Row

### UNDEFEATED LOCAL SQUAD SETS SCORING MARK; BATTLE BELLS FOR LEAD FRIDAY NIGHT

Kewaskum's unbeaten football powerhouse won their fourth game in succession Friday night on the home gridiron when they snowed under Oakfield by a one-sided 54 to 6 score. The Indians and Campbellsport, with a 5 and 0 record, hold the top spot in the Tri-County conference.

Kewaskum set a new season scoring mark in running up 54 points against Oakfield. The Indians now boast the best offensive record in the league while Campbellsport has the best defensive record. Kewaskum has scored 174 points to 40 for its opponents while the Bells have tallied 159 points while holding their foes to 31. However, the Bells haven't played Kewaskum or defending champion Brandon. They had a rough time getting past sixth place Lomira Friday, 13-6.

Last place Oakfield didn't belong on the same field with Kewaskum, which could have beaten them without the first team. In fact the first stringers only saw limited action against the Oaks. After building up a 40-0 halftime advantage, the first team sat out the rest of the contest and the rest of the squad finished the game, scoring 14 points to Oakfield's 6 in the second half. The breaks were also in the Indians' favor although they didn't need them in this tilt.

Dave Mertzog and Norbie Rohlinger each crossed the goal line for two touchdowns with Bob Stenman, Dan Binder, Tom Peterson and Doug Wierman each adding one TD. The slippery and fleet footed Wierman also ran 40 yards with an intercepted pass. Harold Pesch and Linebacker Gil Hammer of the defensive platoon played their usual good rock 'em, sock 'em game and broke up numerous plays.

The game of the season will be played here Friday night at 8 p. m. when the league's two undefeated teams, Campbellsport and Kewaskum, meet head on for first place in the Indians' homecoming tussle. This contest will most likely determine the conference championship although Kewaskum has two tilts left at Hustisford next Tuesday afternoon and a postponed game at Lomira. The homecoming dance will follow the game. Homecoming festivities began with a parade, bonfire and pep rally Thursday night.

The Indians will probably face the Bells with this offensive lineup:

Tom Peterson and Don Klein, ends; Dan Panzer and Eugene Bartelt, guards; Ronald Petermann, center; Bob Stenman, quarterback; Doug Wierman, left half, and Norbie Rohlinger, right half. On the defensive platoon, which has taken much pride in its success this season, will be: Harold Pesch and Curtis Prescott, guards; Peterson and Rich Schmidt, ends; Gilbert Hammer, linebacker; Dave Mertzog and Robert Sparks, defensive halfbacks, and Wierman, safety.

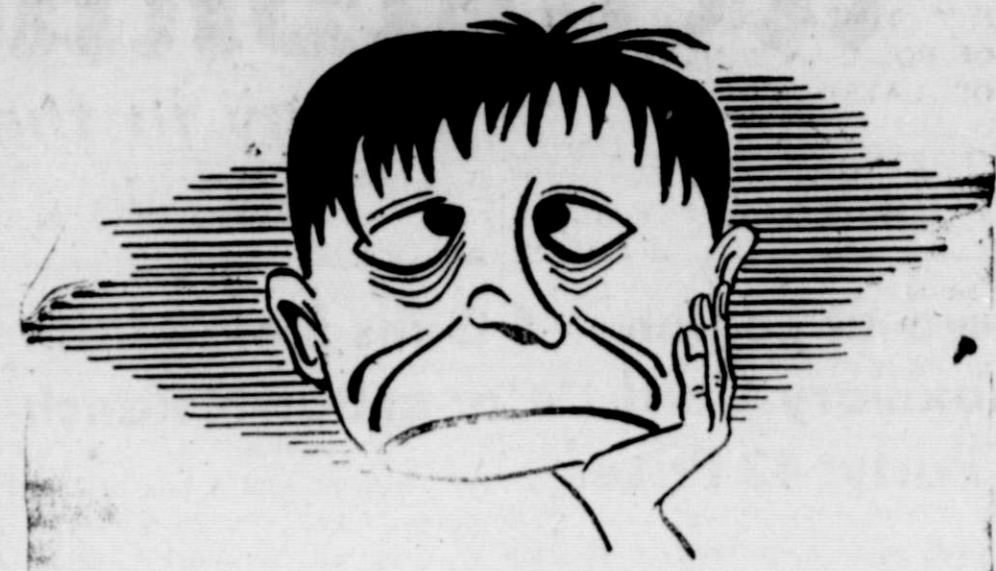

### Salk Vaccine Is Reported Success

**EIGHT TIMES FEWER CASES OF POLIO IN CHILDREN IN-OCULATED**

Eight times fewer cases of paralytic polio occurred in Wisconsin children who received Salk vaccine this past summer than in those in the same school group who did not receive the "shots," according to a preliminary report of the program released by the state board of health Monday. "Tentative information based on data received to date indicates that the Salk vaccine is highly successful in preventing polio," the board stated.

The report revealed that a total of 95,649 out of the 181,121 eligible Wisconsin youngsters had received at least one injection of Salk vaccine prior to July 31st of this year. In the group receiving the vaccine only 15 cases of paralytic polio were reported as compared to 115 cases among the non-vaccinated group.

As for non-paralytic polio, the report disclosed that four times as many cases occurred in those who

did not receive the vaccine than in those in the same school group who were vaccinated. Thirty-one cases of non-paralytic polio were reported among those vaccinated as compared to 123 among those who did not receive such protection.

Thus, the present tabulation indicates that only 46 cases of all types of poliomyelitis occurred among vaccinates as compared with 238 cases among the non-vaccinates of the same group.

Adding emphasis to these encouraging findings was the disclosure that only one case of paralytic polio and six non-paralytic cases were reported among the 10,500 children who were immunized by the three injections in the 1954 field trials in Wisconsin, the board stated.

In view of this preliminary information, the board urged parents of eligible children—those in the 0 through 14 year age group—to go to their family physicians as soon as possible to get inoculations against poliomyelitis under way. The first two injections are usually given two to four weeks apart, and a booster injection seven to eight months thereafter. Thus, an early start will ensure more com-

plete immunization before the next epidemic season, the board explained.

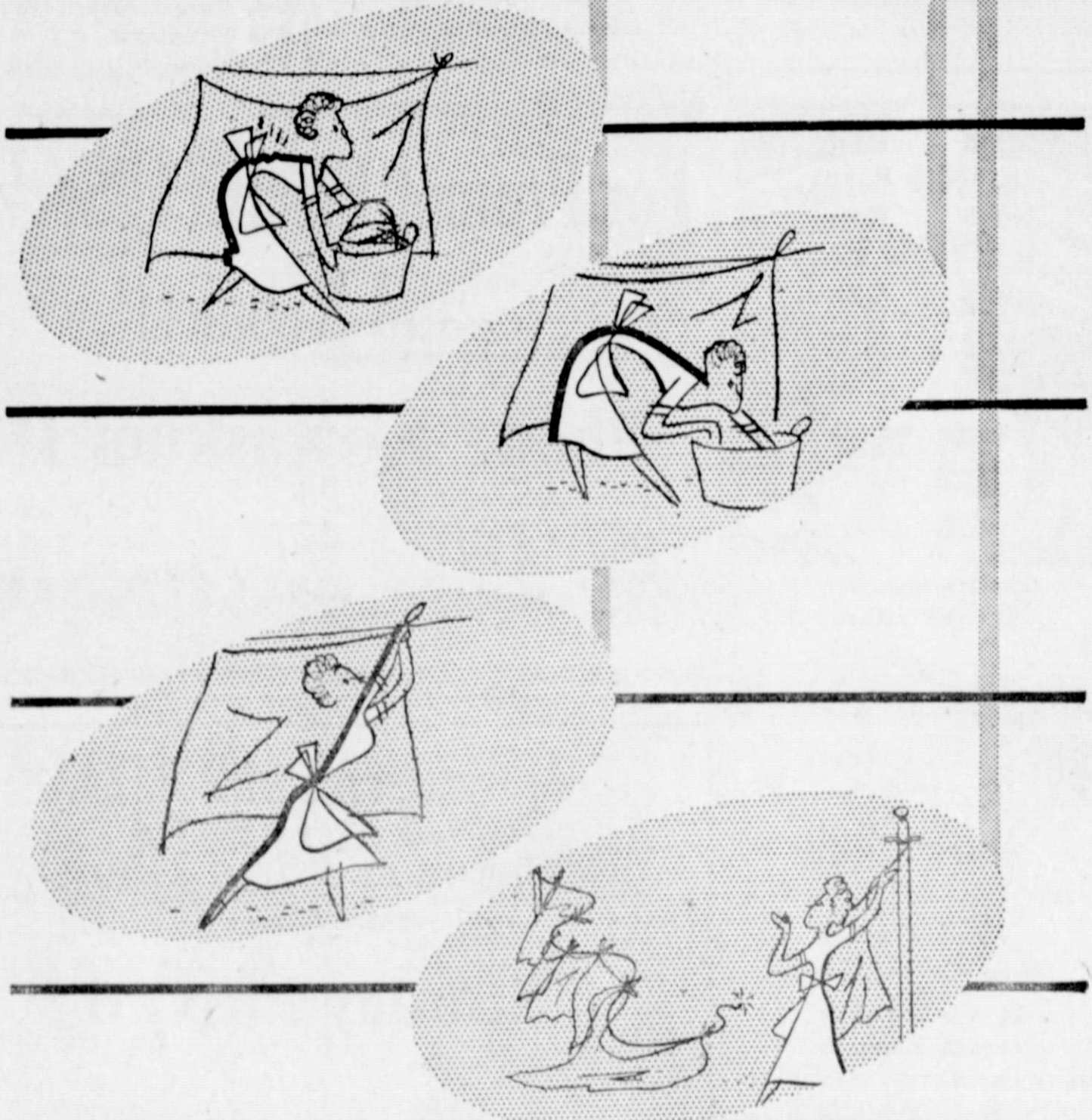

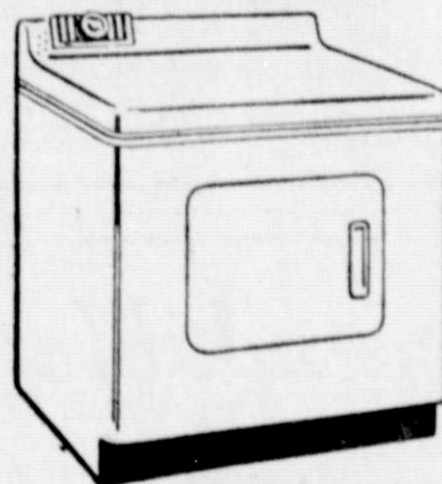

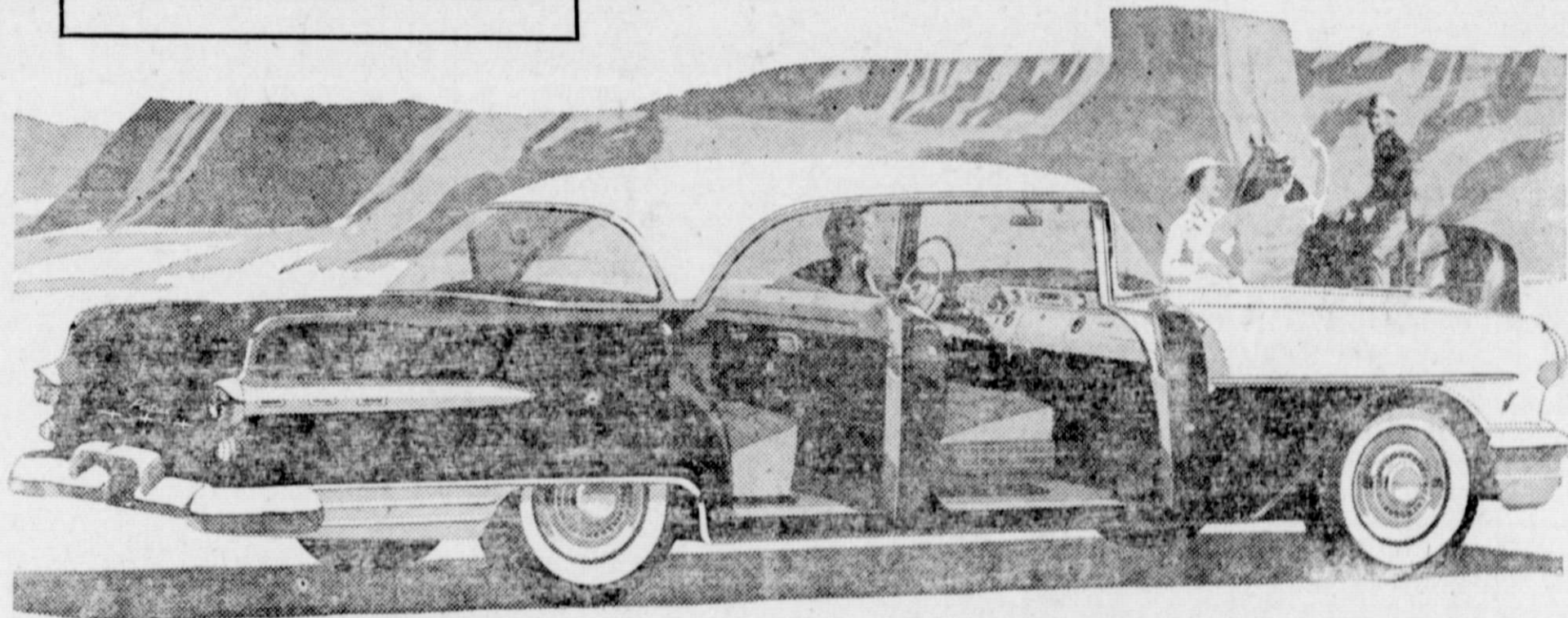

Delicious cup cakes baked by Eileen were served. The next meeting will be Wednesday evening, Nov. 9.

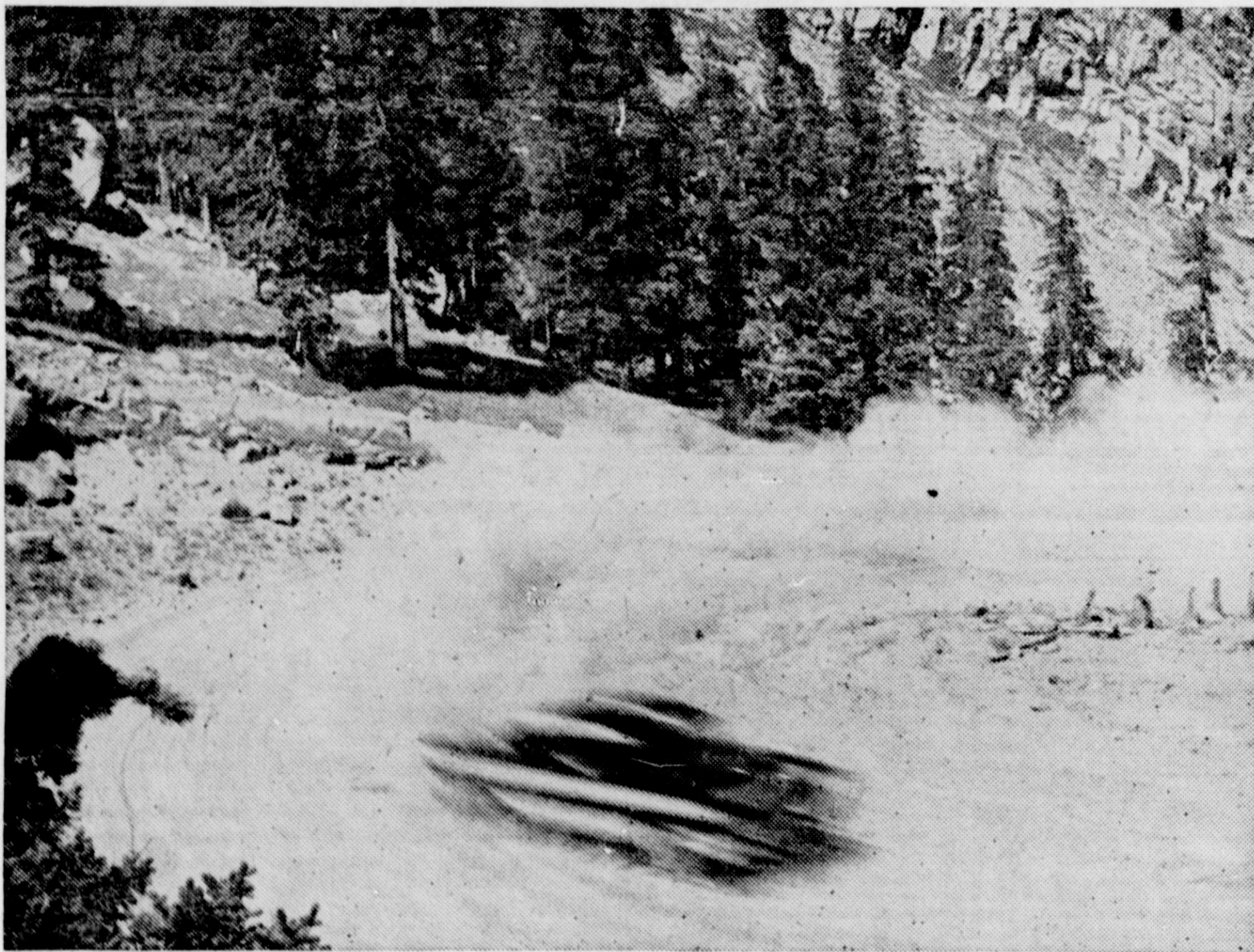

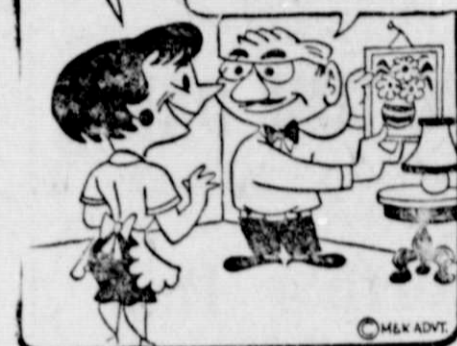
