## Indians Near Title; Tip Bells in Homecoming Game, Rout Hustisford 57-0

UNBEATEN KEWASKUM TEAM NEEDS ONLY WIN AT LOMIRA TUESDAY NIGHT FOR UNDISPUTED CHAMPIONSHIP

The undefeated Kewaskum Indians moved a step closer to the Tri-County conference championship by knocking off previously unbeaten Campbellsport, 19-14, in the Indians homecoming game here Friday night. The setback dropped the Bells, who had played one more game, out of first place and moved Kewaskum into the undisputed lead.

The contest was played in the rain and mud. It rained almost steadily and conditions were anything but ideal for football. Despite the unfavorable weather, a crowd estimated to be the largest ever to witness a game here braved the elements to witness this important encounter.

It was a typical, bruising battle that was closely contested. The victory could have gone either way with a break at the right time. The Bells were on the march in Kewaskum territory when the tilt ended.

Mitchell's charges scored in the opening period on a pass from Dave Mertzig to Bob Stenman. The ball was deflected by a Campbellsport player but ended up in Stenman's arms in the end zone. A pass from Stenman to Doug Wierman was good for the extra point and made the count 7-0. In the second quarter, Campbellsport's Charlie Del Ponte scored but the conversion attempt was unsuccessful and the Indians still led 7-6.

Opening the third period, the Bells' Dreikosen took the kickoff and scored to put Campbellsport ahead, 12-7. But then Kewaskum exploded for two touchdowns with Wierman getting credit for one TD and Norb Rohlinger the other. This made the score 19-12 and that's the way it stayed. Both conversion attempts after the TD's were no good.

Kewaskum made it six victories in a row Tuesday afternoon when they slaughtered last place Hustisford there to the tune of 57-0. The Indians scored almost at will and shoved Hustisford all over the field. This rout gave the Indians the best offensive and defensive records in the conference. They have scored a total of 250 points to only 52 for their opponents in six starts. Campbellsport, which has completed their season, scored 216 points to their opponents 90 for the second best record. But Kewaskum still has another game to play.

Mitchell cleared the bench Tuesday as his Indians, who have dominated play since the start of the season, ran wild over Hustisford. All the squad members got into the fracas and still the score mounted. Players who scored points for the Indians are "too numerous to mention."

Next Tuesday night's game at Lomira will bring the season to an end. But it is a very important one for the Indians. A win will give them undisputed crown but if they lose they will have to share it with Campbellsport. Follow the team to Lomira and help them to the title.

## Kewaskum Young Man Admits Theft Of Guns from Car

Arrested as the result of an investigation by Sheriff George J. Lemieux of Fond du Lac county, a 24-year-old Kewaskum man was penalized by Municipal Judge Hazen W. McEssy last Friday for stealing four guns from a car parked at the Bar-N Ranch the previous week end. He was fined \$50 and costs and ordered to make restitution in the amount of \$20 for one gun not recovered.

The defendant admitted stealing the weapons and a box of .22 cartridges from the car of Glen Garber, Milwaukee. Three of the firearms were recovered last Wednesday in a ditch near the Bar-N Ranch. They were covered with vaseline and were wrapped in a pair of old army fatigue pants. A fourth gun and the bullets still were missing.

Sheriff Lemieux followed clues he got when he first checked the larceny and evidence pointed to two possible suspects. By a process of elimination, the sheriff concentrated on the Kewaskum young man, and Thursday he came to this village to ask Chief of Police Roland Pledl to arrest the man for him.

The man readily admitted the theft when confronted by the sheriff. He said he had dumped the three guns in the ditch after covering them with vaseline because he feared he would be caught with them. The vaseline was to preserve the weapons from the elements while simultaneously wiping off any fingerprints the young man may have made.

Recovered were one 30-30 rifle and two .22 caliber revolvers. Still missing is a .22 caliber weapon. The man told the sheriff that he had taken the gun with him on a hunting trip to Horicon marsh Sunday morning but that some "thief" stole it from his car. Judge McEssy directed the defendant to make restitution for the weapon. The recovered guns and money will be turned over to Garber.

## Highway 45 to Be Improved Through Kewaskum in 1957

PAVING CONFIRMED AT MADISON SESSION ATTENDED BY LOCAL REPRESENTATIVES

Plans for the improvement of Highway 45 in Washington county were revealed last Thursday morning to a group of West Bend and Kewaskum residents and Washington county officials who made the trip to Madison to confer with state highway department officials.

Resurfacing and minor reconstruction of Hwy. 45 is scheduled for 1956 for the stretch of roadway from West Bend south to the Hwy. 41 interchange, it was revealed by Harold L. Plummer, state highway commissioner. The section of Hwy. 45 north of West Bend (through Kewaskum) will be improved in 1957, Plummer stated.

Plummer said that a more extensive highway project had been contemplated for Hwy. 45 at a later date, but that the resurfacing program now planned for 1956 and 1957 may delay a more elaborate program several years.

Interested citizens from Kewaskum and West Bend have been conferring with state officials for some time in the hope that Hwy. 45 might be improved. Because of the poor condition of the road at present, it was felt that some immediate action to repair and improve the highway is essential at this time. Present plans call for the resurfacing of most of the highway south of West Bend and the reconstruction of most of the road north of West Bend because of the hazardous condition of the highway through the Kewaskum swamp.

Among those attending the session at Madison Thursday were County Highway Commissioner Al Rettler, and Ruben Schmah, town of Jackson and Adolph Lofy, town of Richfield, members of the county highway commission, Assemblyman Elmer Schowalter of the town of Jackson was also present. Others who attended included Ken Rohde, Les Schutt, Fred Sager Roland Jaeger, John Plout and Mark Huber of West Bend, and Pat Miller, Jim Reigel, Henry Rosenheimer, Killian Honeck Jr. and Vince Piccoli of Kewaskum.






