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Indians Drub Lomira, 31-0, to Win Tri-County Championship

UNDEFEATED INDIAN POWERHOUSE ENDS PERFECT SEASON WITH 7 STRAIGHT VICTORIES

The Kewaskum High school Indians are the new football champions of the Tri-County conference, succeeding Brandon.

Coaches Ernie Mitchell and Walt Bade's Indians sewed up the undisputed title by blanking a highly regarded Lomira team Tuesday night by a surprising 31-0 score. The victory ended a perfect season for Kewaskum's powerhouse, which won seven straight conference games without a setback.

The championship is Kewaskum's first in several years and the sixth for Coach Mitchell at the school. The final game at Lomira Tuesday night was played on a cold night with a large number of local fans on hand to support the team and cheer them on to the title. The Lions proved stubborn at first but were completely outmanned by the Indians. They were out to upset Kewaskum and knock them out of the undisputed crown but the Indians' strength bewildered them and amazed the Lomira followers. The margin of victory would have been even greater except for the Indians having a touchdown called back and End Tom Peterson dropping a long pass on the goal line in the final quarter.

Kewaskum established a record of the best offense and the toughest defense in the circuit in whipping every team for a perfect season and clear title. The Indians rolled up 281 points in only 7 games and permitted just 52 points to their opponents, an average of just 7.4 points a game. Second spot Campbellsport scored 216 points, 65 less than Kewaskum, and allowed the opponents 90 points, 38 more than the champions. They had the second best record.

In its title game, Kewaskum was sparked by galloping Doug Wierman's three touchdown scamper. On the third play from scrimmage Wierman dashed 45 yards for the first of his three TD's and the team was off to its title-clinching win. Wierman scored on two short runs later in the contest. One of the chief weapons in Kewaskum's attack this season, the fleet-footed Wierman is left halfback and defensive safety on his team. He has averaged about three TD's a game and is one of if not the Tri-County's top scorer. He is fast, deceptive and does an outstanding job of following his interference.

All of the players on both the offensive and defensive platoons did a terrific job against Lomira with Gil Hammer again standing out on defense.

Kewaskum's other scoring in the Lion tilt came on a pass to Don Klein and Don Binder's 40 yard run through the Lomira defense for the fifth and final TD. Bob Stenman, quarterback, scored one point after touchdown. The half-time score was 19-0.

Lakes, Rivers Fives Open Season Sun.

MAYVILLE, THIENSVILLE PRY OFF BASKETBALL LID HERE; KEWASKUM TITLE FAVORITE

A full schedule of games this Sunday night, Nov. 13, will open the basketball season in the Land o' Lakes and Rivers leagues. Kewaskum's cagers will pry off the lid at home with the Lakes five taking on Mayville and the Rivers squad meeting Thiensville at 7:30 p. m.

A split season will be played with the first half ending Dec. 30. Other opening contests Sunday are Rosendale at West Bend, Beaver Dam at Campbellsport and Hartford at Horicon.

It is reported that Johnny Tessar will return to the Kewaskum lineup this season and this, plus the fact that the Kewaskum Chevrolets won the championship last year, makes them a pre-season favorite in the title chase. Tessar, a jump and hook shot artist, has led the league in scoring in previous seasons but was inactive last winter. His uncanny accuracy under the boards has proved almost unstoppable and he ordinarily averages about 25 points a game.

Even without Tessar the Chevs are well fortified with the all-around ability of guard Augie Bilgo, another high scorer, the height and scoring potential of George Hanrahan and Don Meisenheimer and the capabilities of Frank Krueger, Ellie Ramthun and other squad members. Hanrahan and Meisenheimer were both members of Kewaskum High school's championship team three years ago and Hanrahan was the loop's leading scorer. Bilgo also paced the Lakes league in scoring one season.

The league will be well balanced this year and Kewaskum will be hard pressed, especially by West Bend and Campbellsport, runners-up last season. Hartford, Land o' Rivers champs last season, could also be a contender with high school star Howie Hagen on the team. Rosendale should have one of its strongest teams. Little is known about Horicon, Mayville and Beaver Dam according to the new league director, Carl Kuss of West Bend, but Mayville, which plays here Sunday, will be tougher with the addition of Bob Herman, one of the top scorers in the Little Ten conference last year.

The Rivers northern division is expected to be better balanced with the withdrawal of Hartford's champions and the loss of key players by second place Slinger. Opening tilts in the Rivers loop Sunday besides Thiensville at Kewaskum will have Slinger at Campbellsport, Fillmore at West Bend, Hustisford at Horicon.

80 Children Given Salk Vaccine Here

About 80 children were given the Salk polio vaccine in the office of Dr. R. G. Edwards last Saturday morning. Dr. Edwards expects to hold such clinics each Saturday morning until all of the children between the ages of 0 and 14 years are protected against polio. Up to press time there have been no reactions among the children immunized.

The Salk vaccine available to all Wisconsin children from birth through 14 years through their family physician is being shipped out by the state board of health in increasing quantities. It is being given on a first come, first served basis.

Dr. Carl N. Neupert, state health officer, advises parents to arrange for immunization of their children at the earliest opportunity as there may not be enough vaccine to go around at this time. Parents should avail themselves of this opportunity and remove all doubt from their minds of the protection afforded by the vaccine. Contact your physician at once so that he may requisition the doses needed for your child.

ARLENE BACKHAUS FOLLOWS FROSH ILS PROGRAM AT UW

Arlene E. Backhaus, Kewaskum is among 210 freshmen who are following the Integrated Liberal Studies (ILS) program at the University of Wisconsin.

Prof. Robert C. Pooley, chairman of the ILS program, reported that freshman enrollment this fall reflects a general trend toward increased enrollment in the broad field covered by the program.

Integrated Liberal Studies, which was inaugurated at UW in 1948, offers a general education through a specially designed and closely-knit sequence of courses.

The student pursues the ILS course for two years, at which time he is ready to specialize in a major field before receiving a bachelor's degree.

The program is particularly directed toward the liberal professions—teachers, doctors, social workers, newspapermen, lawyers, government officials, diplomatic officers, librarians and ministers—as well as to those who desire a liberal foundation for business careers.

The 210 freshmen in ILS at UW

include 134 from Wisconsin and 76 from 17 other states and from Hawaii and Mexico.

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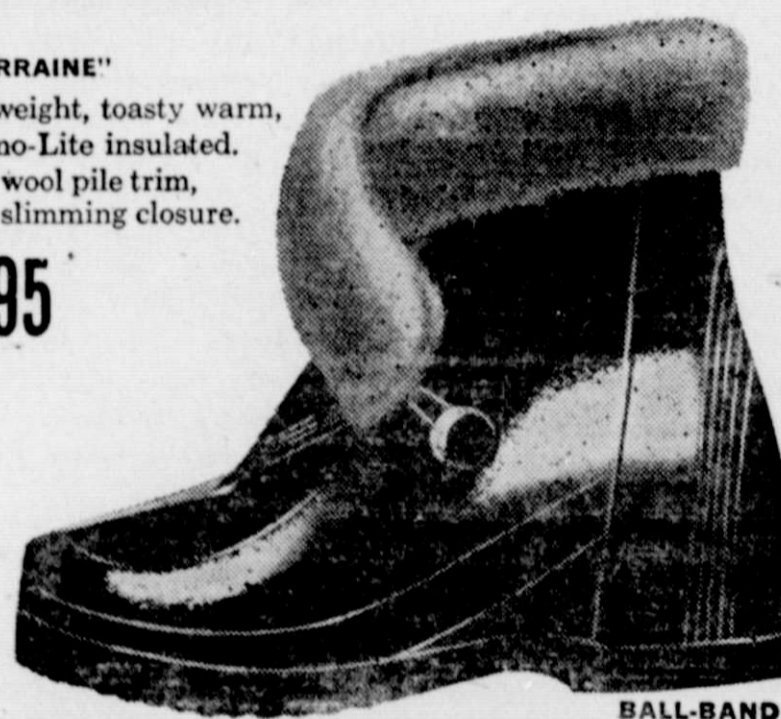

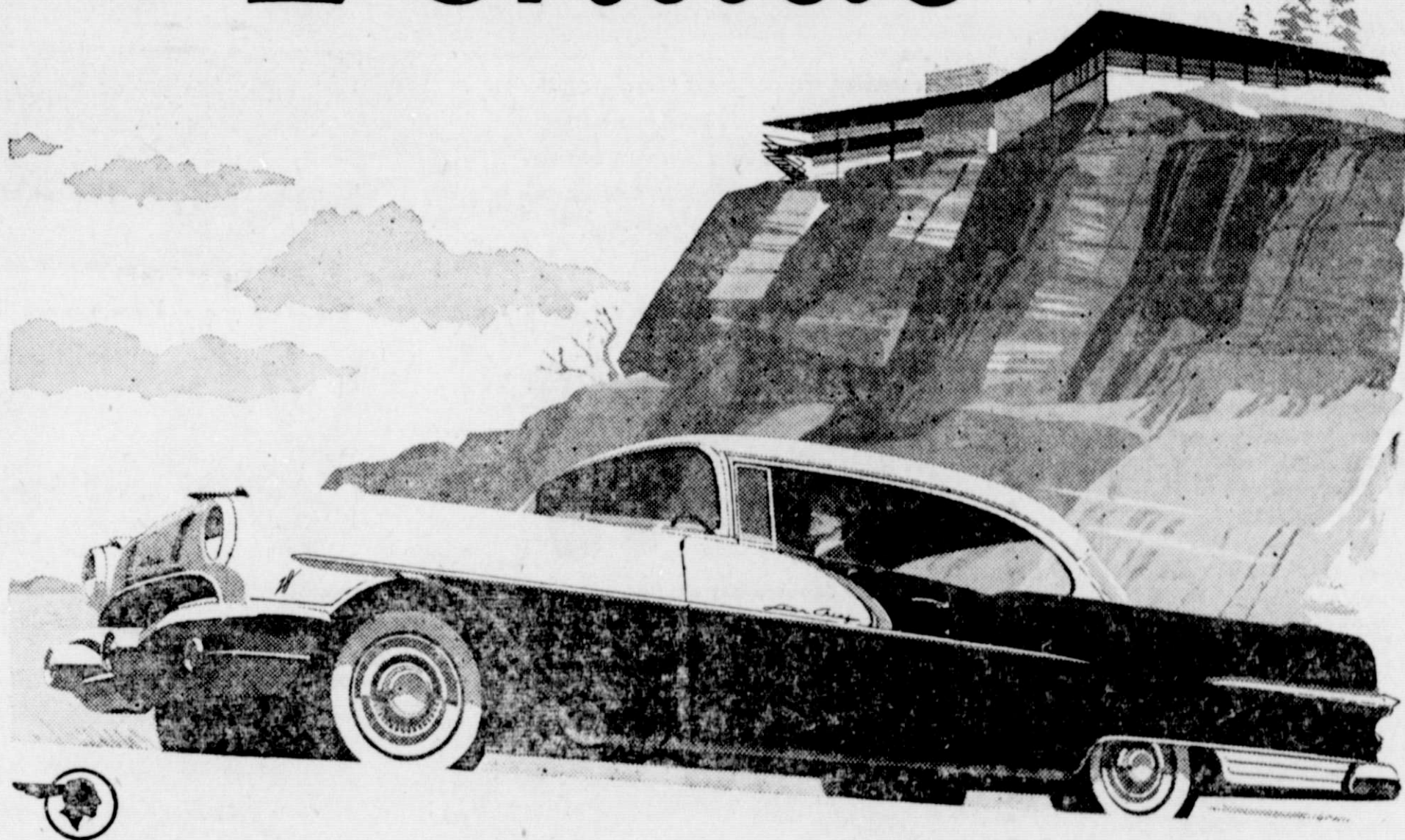
COUNTY FARM BUREAU RENEWAL MEMBERSHIP AHEAD OF LAST YEAR
