Miller, who served as president of Kewaskum continuously since he was first elected in April, 1942, tendered his resignation last Tuesday.

Reigle was a trustee of the village. He was elected to that post in April, 1954. His term as trustee would have expired in April of 1956. The unexpired term of the village president runs until April, 1957.

The new village president was appointed last Thursday night at a meeting of the village board when the resignation of Miller was officially accepted. In tendering, his resignation, Miller said he was retiring from his post at this time because major projects undertaken by the village have now been completed and he thought the time, in view of his health, was propitious.
