

Unbeaten Beaver **Dam Hands Chevs** First Loss, 73-65

The undefeated, league leading Beaver Dam team won their third Chevs with one win and one loss. straight game in the Land o' Lakes Sunday afternoon when they rallied in the last quarter to hand Kewaskum its first loss, 73-65. The contest was played at Beaver Dam with a very large crowd of several hundred howling spectators in attendance. The Beavers now hold sole possession of first place while Kewaskum dropped to a tie for third with Horicon and Hartford.

The game at Beaver Dam was exceptionally close with only one, two or three points separating the teams all the way until the last two minutes of the final quarter when the Beavers forged ahead on several players got behind the Kewaskum 86. guards for layup shots just before the game ended. The howling fans went wild in the final, hectic stages of the game.

The Chevs outplayed Beaver Dam in the first three quarters but accuracy on free throws and long shots kept the loop leaders on even terms. The Beaver's defense under the basket had the Chevs tied up and more shots from the free throw circle and beyond might have been more successful.

The scores at the end of the quarters show just how closely contested the game was. At the end of the first period BeaverDam held a 16-14 lead. It was even tighter at the half, which ended 32-31 in the Beaver's favor. One point still only separated the teams when the third period ended, 50-49, with the Chevs in one lead. The final stanza also was close until those last couple of minutes.
