## Property Value of Kewaskum Placed at Over \$7 1/2 Million

Through the reassessment which was recently completed by Doane Appraisal Service of Des Moines, Iowa, and St. Louis, Mo. in Kewaskum, the new assessed valuation of the village, set up through the reassessment, is now \$7,498,820. This figure is a huge increase over the previous valuation of \$2,512,000 which prevailed in 1954 for tax purposes.

The tax rate in 1954 was \$45 per \$1,000. The new tax rate is expected to be approximately \$20 per \$1,000. The actual tax rate for 1955 purposes will be determined at a special budget hearing on Monday, Dec. 19.

A meeting of the board of review was held from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m. on Wednesday of this week, Dec. 14, to further adjust property valuations where necessary.

"Open Book" on the new valuations set up on Kewaskum properties was held last Thursday and Friday at the municipal building. Very many property holders availed themselves of the opportunity to check on valuations placed on their properties through the reassessment. The valuation of most of the properties was increased, many of them three times as high as formerly.

## TWO MISHAPS IN AREA RESULT IN INJURIES

A car driven by Kenneth Link, R. 2, Campbellsport, was badly damaged when the driver missed a sharp turn in the road and ran into a woods on a town road about two miles southwest of Kewaskum at about 7:45 p. m. Saturday, according to the sheriff report. Link was shaken up and suffered from shock and his wife Louise, a passenger in his car, suffered cuts and bruises. Both were taken to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance for treatment.

In another mishap at 11:50 p. m. last Wednesday, Joyce Boyd, 19, R. 1, Hartford, suffered a back injury when she apparently lost control of her car on County Trunk H about 3 1/2 miles west of Kewaskum. The auto skidded and entered a ditch on the south side of the road, where it struck a tree, then rolled over on the right side. Miss Boyd was driving west on H at the time.

## DEC. 31 FINAL DATE TO REQUEST POLIO VACCINE

According to information received from Dr. R. G. Edwards, health officer for Kewaskum, the State Board of Health has announced that the last date for requesting polio vaccine will be Dec. 31, 1955.

A special committee recently considered a proposal to limit temporarily Salk polio vaccine inoculations to a single shot, to spread the supply among as many children as possible. Surgeon General Leonard A. Scheele of the public health service named the group after a finding that a single shot was 75 to 80% effective last summer in preventing paralytic polio.

Supplies of the vaccine are still very limited. An increased flow is expected in January or February but it is impossible to predict in advance amounts that will be available.

### Indians End Brandon Winning Streak at 14, 63 to 43; Take Lead

The Kewaskum Indians halted a Brandon 14-game winning streak by solidly upsetting the defending champions, 63-43, in the feature game in the Tri-County conference played on the local floor Friday night. The margin of defeat over the big Redmen came as a big surprise.

It was the first loss since the 1953-54 season for Brandon and dropped them into a second place tie. Kewaskum now has won three straight and moved into a tie for first place with Campbellsport, which also is undefeated to date in conference action.

The "hot" Indians opened with a 26-point blast in the first quarter and pulled away to a sizable 26-11 lead. Each team scored 13 points in the second quarter to make the halftime count at 39-24 in Kewaskum's favor. The Indians outscored the Redmen in the third stanza, 14-9, to bring the score to 53-33. They maintained their 20-point advantage in the last quarter in which each team netted 10 points.

Center Tom Peterson and Guard Bob Stenman each collected 14 points for the victors and Forward Dave Mertzig and Guard Doug Wierman each added 10. Center Mollien was high for Brandon with 11 points and Forward DeBoer had 10.

On Friday night of this week Kewaskum travels to Rosendale to try for the fourth in a row and next Tuesday evening they will

play a non-conference contest against the strong West Bend team of the Little Ten loop at West Bend.

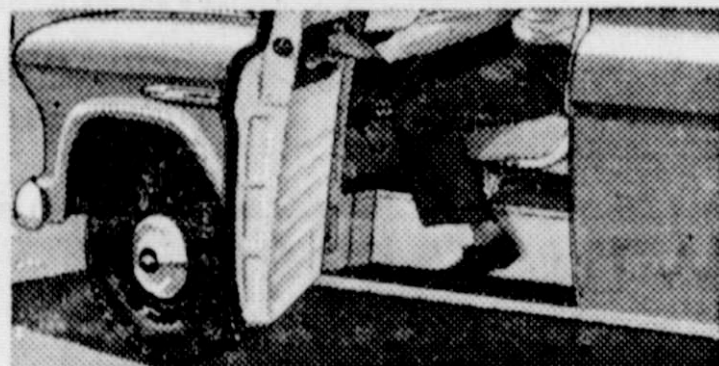

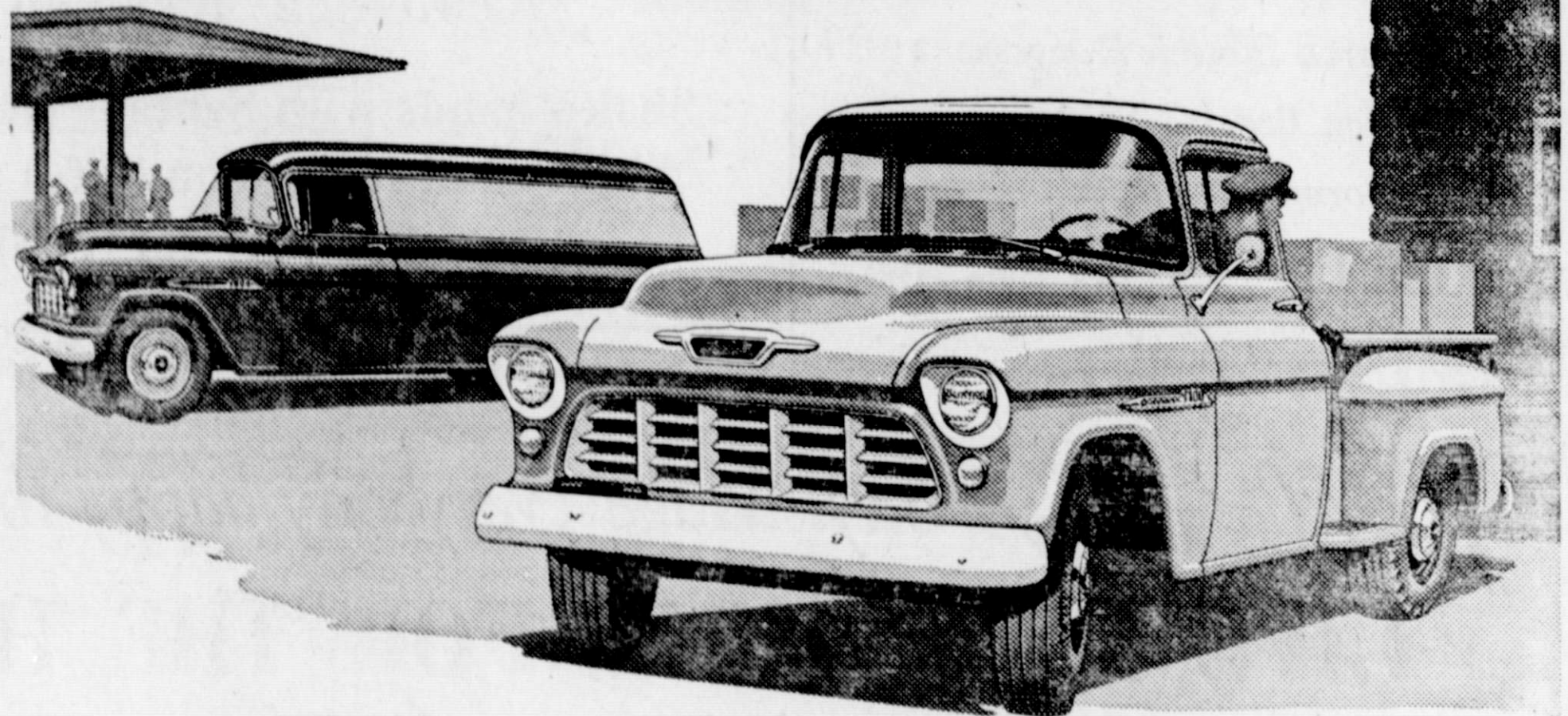

### Chevs Again Score 106 Points to Trim Dalers; Tie for League Lead

The Kewaskum Chevrolets duplicated their score of the previous Sunday when they soundly drubbed last place Rosendale here Sunday night, 106-71. The win was Kewaskum's third in four starts and boosted them into a tie for first place with West Bend and Hartford.

The Chevs gained a tie for the loop lead as a result of West Bend losing their first game of the season to Mayville 79-69. Hartford handed Beaver Dam, the only team to beat Kewaskum, its second setback. This also gave Hartford a record of 3 and 1 and dropped the Beavers to a tie for second with Mayville. All five of these teams are in the running for the first half title and the race has developed into a wide open scramble.

Scoring 106 points in each of its last two games makes Kewaskum one of the highest scoring squads in the Lakes league. A total of 212 points in two tilts shows real scoring punch. Although the Chevs have no individual scorers leading the loop at present they have a well balanced scoring team with all of the players being good point makers, especially the big boys, Don Meisenheimer, George Hanrahan, John Tessar and Augie Bilgo.

Rosendale was no match for the hot Kewaskum squad Sunday. They took a comfortable lead in the first quarter and increased it as the game went on. The Chevs' height took its toll over the small but fast Dalers. The score at the first quarter was 26-12 in Kewaskum's favor and

at the intermission it was 46-30. The Chevrolets were 33 points ahead at the end of the third stanza, 82-49.

Scoring honors in the tilt went to Hanrahan of the winners who added 28 points to his total. He was pressed for honors by Guard G. Smit of Rosendale who dropped in 27. Rohre added 17 and Madigan 11 for the losers. Other top marksman for the Chevs were Meisenheimer with 16 points, Tessar with 14, and Bilgo and Frank Krueger with 10 each.

This Sunday either Kewaskum or Hartford will be knocked out of the league lead when the two meet each other in an evening game at Hartford. This contest was scheduled for Saturday night but because the gym will not be available it was rescheduled for Sunday evening.

A "Peanuts for Polio" day is tentatively being planned sometime in January. The proceeds from this extensive sale of peanuts would go to the March of Dimes fund. Other special events will be planned in an

effort to help the March of Dimes campaign of the state of Wisconsin.

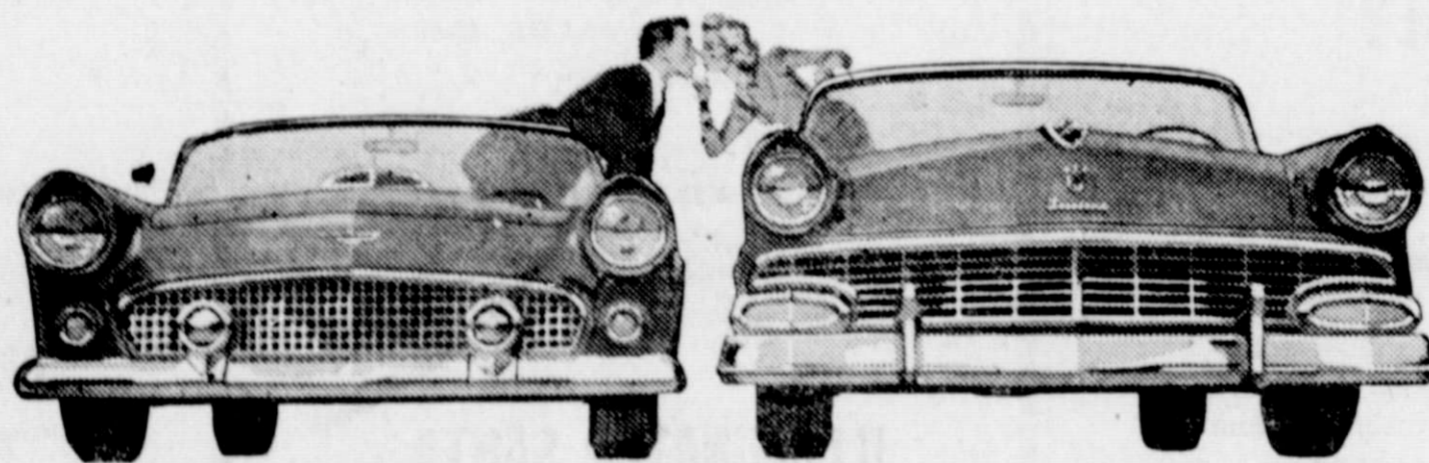
