## Final Revaluation of Village Property Placed at \$6,979,780

ESTIMATE 1956 TAX RATE OF  
\$20 PER THOUSAND

Final revaluation of real estate and personal property in the village was placed at \$6,979,780, roughly \$7,000,000, Monday after "open house" sessions of the assessors and board of review hearings were completed last Friday. Revised figures on the assessed valuation of Kewaskum were scheduled to be submitted to the village board at a meeting Monday night.

The latest assessment figure, for tax purposes, was slightly over a half million dollars below the original tax assessment valuation placed during the reassessment, which totaled \$7,498,820. In the total assessment figure of \$6,979,780, real estate in the village was valued at \$5,220,460 and personal property valuations totaled \$1,759,320.

It was estimated Monday that the new valuation figure will result in a tax rate of \$20 per \$1,000 for the village.

The re-appraisal of property was carried out by the Doane Appraisal Service of Des Moines, Ia. at a cost of \$3,600 and was one of many throughout the county, which have been made during recent years in an attempt to bring properties closer to their actual value for taxation purposes.

The only damage was by the heavy smoke which backed up through stove pipe holes in the chimney.

## Seven Local High School Students Injured in Crash

Seven youths, all students at Kewaskum Community High school, and all passengers in one car were injured in a traffic accident at the intersection of Hwys. 45 and 28 at the north village limits at about 10:05 p. m. Wednesday following the Christmas program at school.

Driver of the car, owned by Richard Degnitz, R. 1, Fredonia, was his daughter, Evelyn, 17. According to Chief of Police Roland Pledl the auto was east-bound on Hwy. 28 and failed to stop for the arterial on Hwy. 45. The vehicle crossed 45, ran along an embankment and ditch on the opposite side of the road and crashed into a culvert.

Injured were Miss Degnitz, brain concussion; Cheryl Leonardelli, 14, Kewaskum, head injuries; Connie Rossow, 14, Wayne, back injuries; Joan Herriges, 14, R. 2, Kewaskum, bruises to face and sprained ankle; David Mueller, 14, Fillmore, head injuries, Karen Gruhle, 15, Fillmore, dislocated hip, and Sandra Gruhle, 14, Fillmore, deep lacerations and head injuries. The latter two are sisters.

Most seriously injured was Karen Gruhle, who was in a semi-conscious condition. Four of the injured, Mueller and the Misses Degnitz, and Gruhles were removed to St. Joseph's hospital, West Bend, in the firemen's ambulance.

Two other high school girls, also sisters, who were also passengers in the car, had already been taken to their home on Hwy. 28 about a half mile west of the scene of the accident, just before the crash occurred. The left front end of the auto was demolished.

Three cars and a station wagon were involved in two collisions on Saturday.

An auto driven by Vincent D. Kohn, 26, R. 3, Kewaskum, and a station wagon driven by Richard S. Boomer, 24, 110 Henry st., Beaver Dam, collided on Fond du Lac ave. at the intersection with North st. Kohn was in the act of passing the Boomer vehicle when his right front fender struck the left rear fender of Boomer's machine. Damage was estimated at \$125.

Cars driven by Arthur Backhaus, 34, R. 1, West Bend, and George Winckler, 65, R. 4, West Bend, collided on Hwy. 45, one mile south of Kewaskum at 3:30 p. m. Backhaus was passing the Winckler auto when his right rear fender struck the left front fender of Winckler's vehicle. Damage amounting to about \$50 resulted to the autos.

## Partial Final Payment Made on New Sewage Plant Construction

APPLICATION MADE TO HIGHWAY COMMISSION TO INCLUDE FOND DU LAC AVE. IN HWY. 45 IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM

The Village Board of Kewaskum, Washington County, Wisconsin met in regular monthly session with President C. Miller presiding and all board members present.

Upon motion by J. Stellpflug, seconded by M. Schaefer and duly carried, the minutes of the previous meeting were accepted as presented.

Upon motion by J. Stellpflug, seconded by W. Tessar and duly carried, the board authorized the commissioner to make partial final payment on the construction contract of the Sewage Treatment and Incineration Plant and the Lift Station, leaving a balance due the Bloomer Truck and Shovel Co. of \$500.00.

### DEC. 31 LAST DATE TO REQUEST POLIO VACCINE

In order to meet its commitment to make available enough vaccine for use in public clinics to immunize 10 per cent of the children in the 0 through 14 age group, the State Board of Health must temporarily discontinue distribution of polio vaccine to physicians excepting to fill requests now on hand or received before Dec. 31. Requests of physicians received by the board before Dec. 31, 1955, will be filled before any vaccine is made available for public clinics.

Physicians will again be notified, probably some time next spring, when vaccine is once more available to them. All children whose order is in by Dec. 31 will be notified when to come for their polio vaccine injection by their respective family doctor.

## Local School District to Receive Additional \$1,000 in State Aid

NEW LEGISLATION INITIATED BY FOMER ASSEMBLYMAN HAEBIG PAYS OFF

For four years, the county superintendent of schools pioneered in the efforts of changing the state school aid payments to a more equitable basis. As it was previously, a district has to operate a high school as well as fulfill certain requirements before it could qualify for incentive aids.

During the 1953 legislative session, Assemblyman K. Wm. Haebig of Kewaskum initiated a bill and got it through the Assembly, but it was blocked by a Senate committee. With more public relations work and informing more of the legislators to the need for such legislation, this bill was unanimously passed by the 1955 legislature and signed into law by the governor. Much credit is due to Senator Panzer who sponsored the bill and to Assemblyman Schowalter who shared in the responsibility, working unselfishly until it became a law.

This bill now permits elementary school districts to obtain incentive or increased aids without operating a high school provided that the district meets the other requirements and has an 8 teacher staff. The 8 teacher staff requirement was appended to the bill by the Department of Public Instruction and was not in the original draft as presented by the author.

This new legislation will bring additional state aid monies of about \$2,500 to the Hartford elementary district and about \$1,000 to the Kewaskum elementary district.

Another feature of this legislation is the guarantee of continued incentive aid payments to an elementary district which was part of a grade 1-12 type of district, but which became a district operating grades 1-8 through the creation of a Union High School district.

The county superintendent's office received official certification by the State Department of Public Instruction of the above mentioned aids to the two elementary districts on Thursday, Dec. 15.

## Kewaskum Vo Ag and FFA Flashes

Norman Foerster, son of Henry Foerster, R. 3, Kewaskum, has been accepted for junior membership in the American Guernsey Cattle club. As a junior member of the AGCC Norman will receive a membership certificate and have the privilege of registering his Guernseys at the low member rate. This junior membership will be in effect until the new member reaches 21 years of age.

The Washington county Holstein breeders will again sponsor the

purebred Holstein calf sire project for FFA and 4-H club members. This is a good chance to get a good calf to raise for your 1956 project and a chance to obtain some valuable management, feeding and exhibiting experience.

All calves must be exhibited at the county fair and sold at public auction in October. There will be three age groups with the money divided when the animal is sold. Kewaskum FFA members that raised bull calves in this program last year were Jerry Schacht, Dave Fickler and Ervin Coulter. The October sale averaged \$238.50 for all twenty bulls. The three Kewaskum FFA boys averaged \$247.

On Monday night John Komlo of

Madison demonstrated welding techniques to the young farmers. Some of the boys are hard-surfacing plow shares, others sharpening tools, repairing equipment and welding to increase their skill.

Last week the young farmers lost to the FFA 41-29 in the first basketball game for both squads. Jerry Kleinke was top scorer for the FFA with 11 and Ray Kirchner led the young farmers with nine points. The two teams will play again Jan. 9 and the young farmers will face the West Bend young farmers Jan. 16.

The adult farmers at the Washington school class heard Duane Dickinson talk about the progress the A.D.A. has made and the importance of 100% dairy farmer participation in the American Dairy association.

The high school adult group discussed bulk milk cooling and hit on such points as prices, advantages and disadvantages for the producer and plant, types of bulk tanks, and most important of all, that vital question—'Does It Pay?'

Adult and young farmer classes will recess between Christmas and the New Year. Here's wishing all of my students, young and adult farmers and friends a very Merry Christmas!

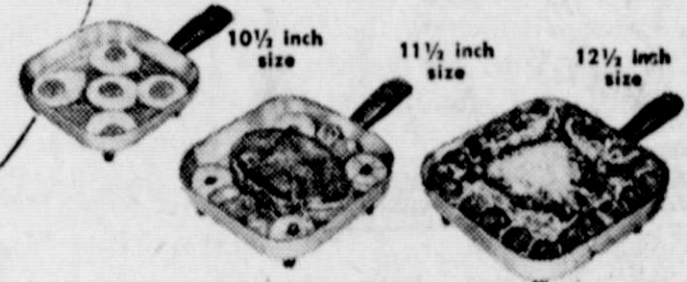

**To Basketball Fans of Kewaskum**

At the time of this edition the local Land o' Lakes basketball team holds undisputed first place in a fast, tough, top quality league, in which many former professional, university and high school stars are participating. But, unfortunately, the old adage (everybody loves a winner) does not hold true for the fans of the community. Except for a few dozen wonderfully faithful fans there are discouragingly few spectators present to witness the high scoring, spine tingling action displayed by the Lakes and Rivers teams.

Last Sunday night, in Hartford's beautiful, mammoth new gymnasium which seats over 2,000 people, Kewaskum came from behind in a red hot, brilliant second half to defeat the Hartford Stampers, 71-64, and knock that team out of a first place tie with the Chevrolets. As a result Kewaskum took over sole possession of the league lead as West Bend was upset at Campbellsport. Defeating Hartford was quite an accomplishment for the Chevs, defending champions, whose team is composed entirely of former Kewaskum High school stars. Hartford has Del Renzaglia, leading scorer in the league, with 124 points to date, an average of 24 per game. He is the sensation of the team, played on two Hartford High

school championship teams and was a member of the state tournament team a couple of years ago. Hartford has Howie Hagen, leading scorer in the Little Ten conference last season, who sparked the high school team to the conference title. He is an excellent dribbler and dead shot from out on the court. Hartford has Stracka, another former high school ace, and presently an end on the Marquette university football team. 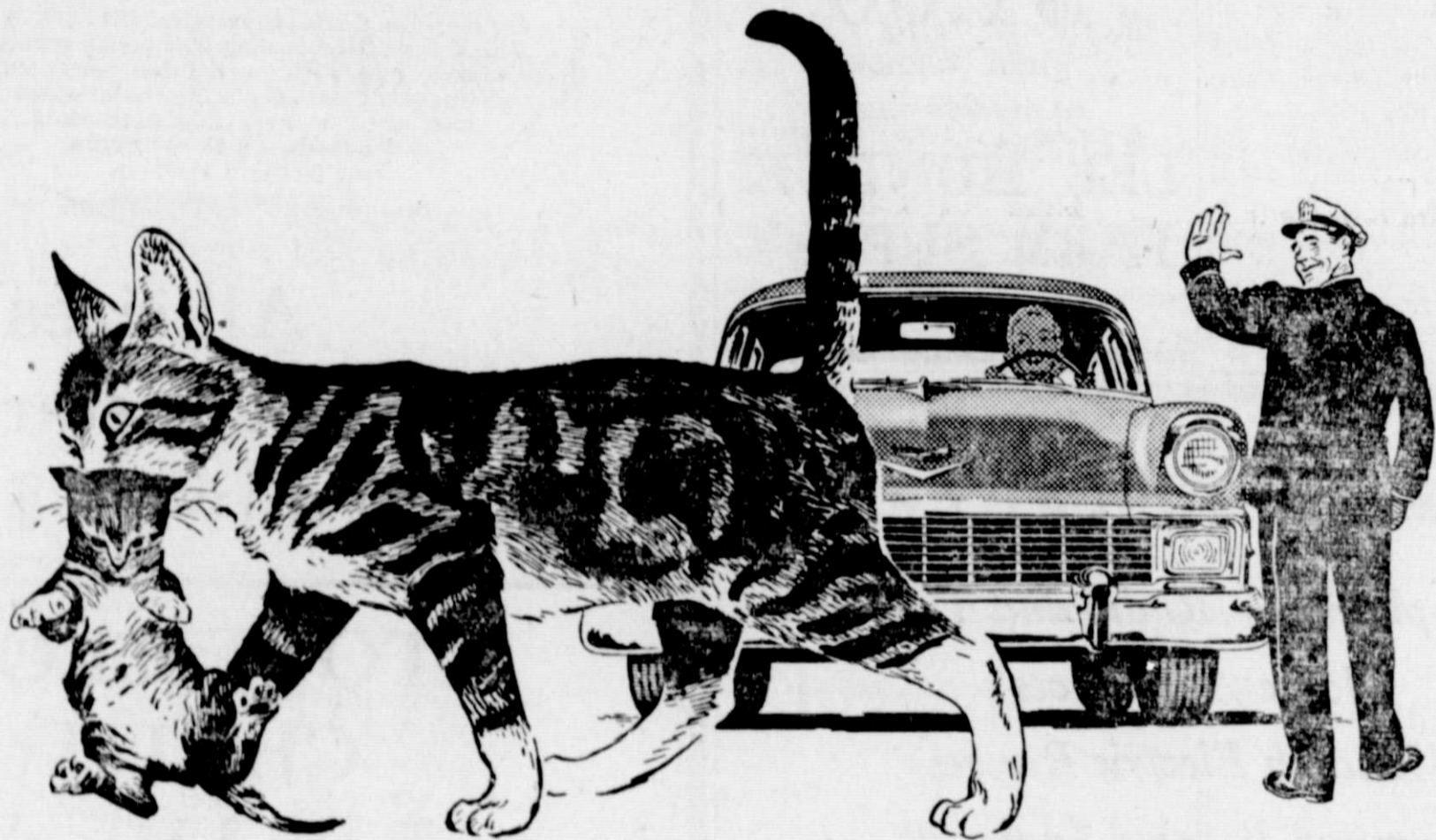

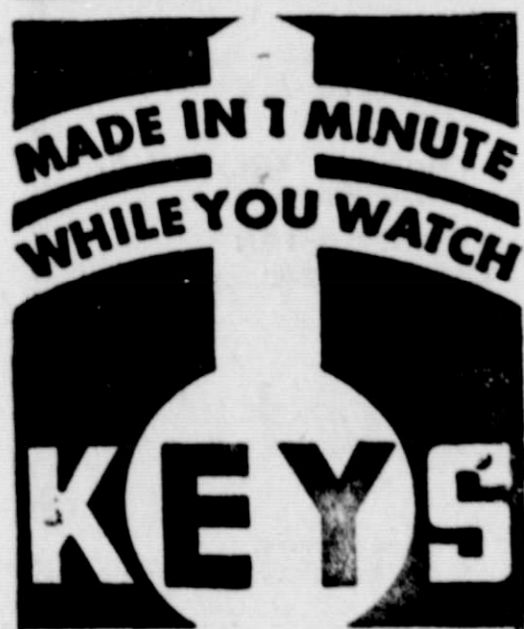

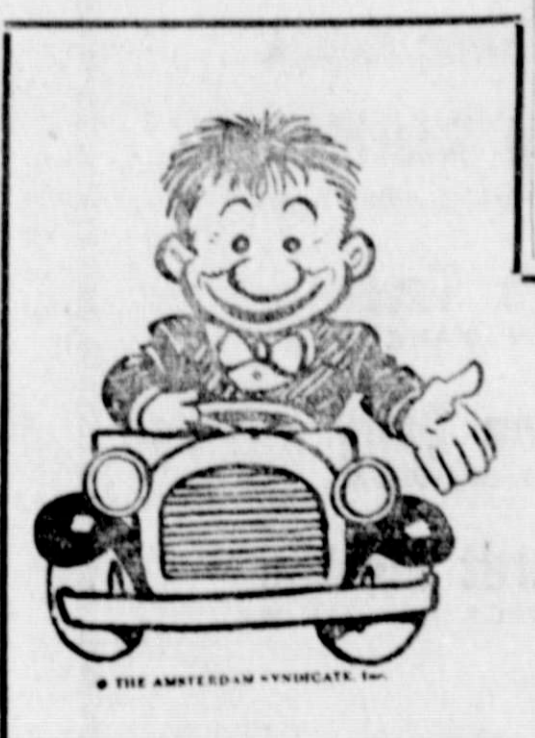
